Crappie are starting to slow down again. You are having to search more these days. They are moving further up the rivers and backs of creeks. Spring spawn should be just around the corner, depending on some warm days.

Several good keepers are still being caught up the Concho and Colorado Rivers. Most fish being caught in 25 to 35 ft. of water. On the warmer days, shallow water action is really starting to pick up. Any water that is 4 to 5 degrees warmer in the backs of creeks is really starting to hold fish. Spinner bait action trends to be fast and furious on these warmer days.

Coleman County District Court Handles Number of Cases

District Attorney Ross L. Jones presented the following cases for disposition to John Weeks, 42nd District Judge at the Coleman County Courthouse on Thursday, Feb. 24, 1994:

Joe Riley Caldwell, Possession of Controlled Substance. He pled guilty and was sentenced to four (4) years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, probated for a term of four (4) years and was ordered to pay a \$500.00 fine, court costs, court-appointed attorney fees, probation fees of \$30.00 per month, and restitution totaling \$140.00 to the Texas Department of Public Safety Crime Laboratory for the costs incurred for substance analysis in connection with this offense. Caldwell was represented by court-appointed defense counsel Stephen Ellis.

Daniel R. Podlevski, pled guilty to Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle and was sentenced to five (5) years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, probated for a term of five (5) years, and was ordered to pay a \$500.00 fine, court costs, court-appointed attorney fees, and payment of restitution in the amount of \$3,935.00 to Cody Golsen. The sentence imposed in this cause will run concurrently with the sentence imposed in cause no. 665, burglary of a habitation, 42nd District Court, Coleman County, Texas. Podlevski was represented by court-appointed defense counsel James Bowen.

Daniel R. Podlevski pled guilty to Burglary of a Habitation and was sentenced to five (5) years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, probated for a term of five (5) years, payment of a \$500.00 fine, court costs, court-appointed attorney fees, and probation fees of \$30.00 per month. The sentence imposed in this cause will run concurrently with the sentence imposed in cause no. 664, unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, 42nd District Court, Coleman County,

Texas. Podlevski was presented by court-appointed defense counsel James Bowen.

Ray Dale Ogles pled guilty to Criminal Mischief and was sentenced to ten (10) years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, probated for a term of ten (10) years, and was ordered to pay a \$1,000.00 fine, court costs, court-appointed attorney fees, probation fees of \$30.00 per month, and restitution totaling \$4,200.00 to the Coleman Business People's Association. Ogles was also ordered to serve not less than 200 hours of community service under the supervision of the Adult Probation Service. Ogles was represented by court-appointed counsel Dana Smith.
