James 3:6 The words of this text reminds me of a story I read sometime ag It was Friday, March 13, 1959 when it happened and it was in the midOlympia, Washington. The switching crew uncoupled fifteen cars from the Locomotive and placed them on a siding for Olympia. The remainder of the cars were pulled into the Olympia Brewing Company yard. For some reason no one thought to set the hand brakes on the fifteen cars. At about five forty-two p.m. the fifteen cars began to move. Soon
nearly two million pounds of steel and wood were rolling down the track at a mile a minute, headed for the back of the Fourth Avenue Station. At approximately $5: 45$ p.m. the runaway train crashed through the steel bumper guard at the end of the line. It tore through the concrete platform out the opposite wall into the street It plowed into the Sta-Well Health Store and came to rest in a tangled mass of brick, lumber and health-food Some of the cars were slammed into other shops. Others overturned in the street. Behind the station still others lay in a jumbled mass of steel What a lot of damage was done within a few
ne forget to put on the brakes. Even one small block beneath the wheels could have prevented the tragedy. One small mistake took the life of one man, woundéd twenty others, and did thousands of dollars' worth of damage to at least eight buildings.

## Fall Electrofishing On Area Lakes

 CompletedThe Texas Parks and Wildifie
Department (TPWD) fisheries man agement crew from San Angelo completed electrofishing surveys on E.
V. Spence O. H. liee O. C. Fisher, Moss Creek and Champion Creek reservoirs. TPWD electrofishes in the fall to sample the largemouth bass, sunfish and shad populations in the lakes to determine how well they are doing.
The electrofisher uses electricivy io stun fish in the water. The fish are then captured by dip net, counted, measured, weighed and returned to the lake. A few fish are retained to analysis. Many people think thal electrofishing (or shocking) fish hurts the fish. This is not tue. In fact, the hatchenies colect electrofishing boats.
The electrofisher
ating a field of pulsed direct current (DC) in the water. The DC actually attracts the fish and the pulsing stuns them. The fiel dony reaches about six
feet donly shallow water can be sampled. Because of this, not many large fish are coliected because the larger tish tend to stay in deeper water. Electrofishing is done at night
