The site of their project is a plant 17 miles northeast of Amarillo. Known as Pantex, it has been the only place in the United States where nuclear weapons have been both assembled and disassembled.

It was at the Pantex plant that plutonium was added to nuclear warheads. This element, chemically related to uranium, is the force used to trigger atomic instruments of destruction.

With the end of the Soviet arsenal. This requires destroying the weapons and recovering the plutonium. The Department of Energy has authorized the project, which can take as long as three years.

Meanwhile, a consortium of university scientists believe that plutonium has uses far more beneficial to mankind that destruction. They want to establish a research facility

Dr. Dale Klein, associate dean for research at the University of Texas at Austin College of Engineering, is among those spearheading the project.

He argues that plutonium is a much maligned element that has great potential as a fuel for commercial reactors. He believes that additional research could turn up other constructive uses for the material that is being removed from the weapons.

Klein is not alone. Joining him in the effort are Dr. Lee Peddicord, interim vice chancellor for engineering at Texas A&M University, and Dr. John Borrelli, associate dean for academic affairs at Texas Tech-University.

The three will head a task force to examine how the universities can work with the Department of Energy during the disassembly of the nuclear weapons. Other task force members will be selected from each institution.

"We have a unique opportunity to dismantle weapons of destruction and turn them into benefits for mankind," Dr. Klein told 150 Panhandle business and professional

The groups agrees that the Pantex nuclear weapons complex should not be destroyed but reshaped. The Amarillo Economic Development Corporation put up \$325,000 in an effort to keep Pantex in the area and will focus on turning Pantex into a major research facility.

Destruction of the warheads means that up to 20,000 plutonium cores from the weapons will be stored at Pantex for up to 10 years. This caused some environmental concerns early on, but these have been allayed by the Los Alamos National Laboratory in New

The lab assumed that a hypothetical airplane crashed into a Pantex storage area, exploded and spread contamination over an 80-mile area.

The conclusion was that such a dispersal accident posed no significant threat to the area or its aquifer.

Dr. Klein explains why. He says the radiation from plutonium can be stopped by a piece of paper or even the skin. Thus exposure is not a health concern.

If the proposed research consortium becomes a reality, it could mean up to 1,000 new jobs for this area of the Panhandle.

CALLING MINORITY WOMEN--Doctors in Texas and across the nation are looking or minority women in a country-wide effort to prevent breast cancer.

White women are responding. Minorities are not. Physicians at institutions like the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Union, America is down-sizing its Center in Houston don't know why. Anderson is one of 222 centers involved in the study.

When the study began in April 1992, researchers hoped to enroll 16,000 women nation-wide. Thus far, 8,000 have signed up, but only 240 are black, Hispanic, Asian or other minorities.

Needed are volunteers who have had a personal or family history of the disease. By studying them, researchers hope to determine whether the drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer in women age 35 or older who are in this high-risk cate-

Dr. Victor Vogel, who is directing the study at M.D. Anderson, says minorities may be uncomfortable discussing breast cancer with male doctors. Some may be unwilling to contribute to a health care system "that has not served them well in the past."

BELIEVE IT OR NOT---Texas A&M University and the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio are starting a cooperative education program.

Promising biomedical and social " science students from Texas A&M soon will be getting a taste of research in the laboratories of the Health Science Center.

Not only that, but they'll get paid for doing it.

Students in the program must have enthusiasm and plans to attend a professional or graduate school. They will alternate semesters, studying at College Station for one and then working the next at a coop site like the San Antonio Health Science Center.

They'll be paid as laboratory technical assistants or social science research assistants.

NOTE WORTHY---Scientific journals aren't among the large circulation publications, but they're of special interest of faculty at Rice University.

A recent survey shows that chemistry research papers from Rice are among those most cited in academic publications devoted to science.

Harvard ranked first is the survey, followed by Cal Tech, Yale and the University of Chicago. Rice came in at fifth---the only

years from now. We are not only changing centuries but our methods and lifestyles are now changing daily. As we prepare to break into the year 2000, maybe we should stop and take inventory of where we think we will be.

Wheat Problems?

Recent rains have improved the outlook on wheat pastures and small grain fields. This has increased the interest or concern about greenbugs. Greenbug control is a difficult decision which requires some thought about several variables. Spraying decisions must weigh-out the cost of pesticide application versus the outlook for the

spring. The economic threshold for greenbugs (or the amount of greenbugs required to do sufficient damage to wheat that will cause an economic) loss is 100 to 300 greenbugs per linear foot of drill row. This should be an average of several areas checked over the entire field. One should remember that greenbugs are difficult to see and find especially on a cold day when they may be underneath loose topsoil.

The most economical means of greenbug control is heavy grazing and producers who plan to graze out wheat probably don't need to spray for greenbugs unless populations are excessively high. However, on ungrazed, small grain fields, spraying of wheat field may be justified if 100-300 greenbugs are found. Some of the products labeled for greenbug control include Lorsban 4-E, Cygon or Methyl Parathion.
