House Foundation Damage May Not Be Covered By New Insurance Law by Sandra Haverlah

During the 1993 legislative session, Texas lawmakers passed legislation that of Insurance and affected many other areas of insurance. Among the legislative changes was a law passed
giving insurance companies the giving insurance companies the
ability to disallow damages to a homeowner's foundation, even if the homeowner has insurance coverage.
Termed the foundation exclusion rule, this move by homeowners off-guard and may leave many Texas homeowners stranded and in possible financial ruin. The foundation exclusion rule,
supported by insurance supported by insurance
companies, allows insurance companies to exclude from homeowners. . coverage damages to the foundation of a home that is at least ten years old. Many homes that are built on clay or mud areas and older
homes have problems with their foundation after several years. These problems include pipes leaking, causing water
damage and requiring the damage and requiring the
foundation to be tom up, pipes replaced and have the foundation rebuilt. Other homeowners have experienced
problems with severe cracking problems with severe cracking
or shifting. or shifting.

and producers who plan to graze out wheat probably don't need to spray for greenbugs unless population are excessively high. However, on ungrazed, small grain fields, spray ing of wheat field may be justified
if $100-300$ greenbugs are found. Some of the products labeled for greenbug control include Lorsban 4
E, Cygon or Methyl Parathion.
