





Thoughts From Our Pastors

Waide Messer First Baptist Church "The Works of the Flesh"

An alcohol-related traffic death occurs every 20 minutes. Alcohol causes almost 100,000 deaths per year. About 90 percent of unwanted pregnancies occur as a result of the influence of alcohol. Up to 36 percent of suicide victims have a history of alcohol abuse or were drinking shortly before their suicides. One snort of cocaine can kill a person. The World Health Organization predicts that in the next three decades, the number of women who die of smoking will more than double to over 1 million per year. And we could go on and on.

But that's not the half of it. Alcohol and other drugs are spiritually dangerous! In Galatians 5:19-26, Paul contrasts the "works of the flesh" with the "fruit of the Spirit". The works of the flesh (the sin nature) are expressions of the cravings of an unregenerate heart. He describes three classes of activities of the flesh: impurity ("sexual immorality, impurity, debauchery"), paganism ("idolatry, witchcraft"), and intemperance ("hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of range, selfish ambition, dessensions, factions and envy, drunkenness, orgies and the like"). Alcohol and other drugs are mentioned twice. First, in verse 20, the word for witchcraft is the word from which we get the word "pharmacy". Drug use and the occult have also been friends to each other. Second, in verse 21, drunkenness or intoxication is associated with the use of alcohol or other drugs.

Frighteningly, Paul declares that those persons whose lives are characterized by these practices "shall not inherit the kingdom of God." A lifestyle of intoxication is evidence that a person is not a child of God! Paul echoes this important warning in 1 Corinthians 6:9-10 and Ephesians 5:5. Alcohol and other drugs are both physically and spiritually deadly. But the fruit of the Holy Spirit is, among the other characteristics listed, "self-control." Attempting to master our sinful appetites and passions is a mark of a person who is a Christian and who is, therefore, indwelt by the Holy Spirit. Christians possess the power of the Spirit to resist the use of intoxicating and disease-causing substances.

Likewise, those who belong to Jesus Christ should resist the "mediahype" that alcohol and other drugs need to prosper in our society. We ould also

*Support federal, state and local legislation aimed at restricting ads for alcohol and cigarettes.

*Support school groups that emphasize and reinforce abstinence.

*Call on legislators, athletes and others not to accept money from death-producing substances.





Teen Inhalant Abuse Rising One of the greatest threats to manent and severe brain damage. To Regional UIL Literary Events your child's health may be right under your nose. Use of inhalants among children to get high is on the rise. The physicians of Texas

Medical Association want you to realize that inhalants are lethal poisons, with effects potentially more devastating than other drugs, including cocaine. A recent national survey revealed that a little more than one of every 10 eighth-graders in the survey had inhaled glues, solvents and acrosols to get high.

In Texas, the problem may be even worse. According to the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, 23 percent of secondary students in Texas have used inhalants, and 10 percent of seventh-graders have used them in the past month. A recent position paper on teen-age substance abuse by Texas Medical Association's Adolescent Health Task Force states that the age of first use of inhalants in Texas fell from 14.4 years old in

1988 to 13.3 years old 1990. Inhaling substances, also known as "sniffing" or "huffing", is an easy way for adolescents to get high. About 600 legal products exist which can be misused as inhalants. They include glue, paint, gasoline, typewriter correction fluid, hair spray, cooking spray and hundreds more adhesives, aerosols, cleaning agents and solvents. Young people use inhalants for many reasons: they are universally available, inexpensive, and easy to conceal. Inhalants also do not carry legal consequences, like other drugs and provide a fast and pleasurable high.

All chemicals, whether for agricultural or household use, carry detailed labels that discuss what the, and precautions to take. By following directions, people can safely achieve the desired results, whether it's getting rid of pests or fertilizing crops or lawns, Perry said.

Other safety tips include: *Choose the proper chemical for

the task and use specified application equipment.

*Know and comply with federal and state regulations.

*Train workers on the proper use of chemicals and the need to follow label instructions.

*Wear proper protective clothing and gear as prescribed on the label. Work in a well-ventilated area. Remove children, pets and unneces-

*Apply only when drift or runoff will not occur.

*Have a plan for emergencies. Know what to do if a toxic substance is swallowed, inhaled or splashed on skin. If medical help is required, take the product label to the doctor.

*Store chemicals in a building or cabinet that can be locked so chil-
