

Born Feb. 3, 1929 in Berkeley, California, he was the son of Joseph F. Bertoni, Sr. and Angela Sordi. He married Shirla "Sheri" Taylor on July 4, 1960 in Reno, Nevada. He had been a resident of Coleman County since 1974 and was the owner and operator of the Trade Winds restaurant in Coleman. He was a member of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church.

Mr. Bertoni was preceded in death by his parents; a sister, Dolores Avalos; and a son, Michael Wayne Bertoni.
