Morris, Campbell, Morgan Winners In Council Election



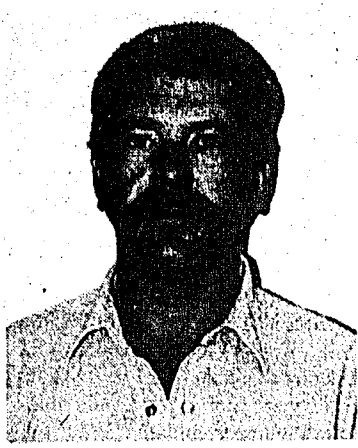
Karen Morris

Guthrie And Simmons Return To School Board

As Santa Anna School District voters went to the polls in the trustee election this past Saturday, they sent incumbents Sharon Guthrie and Barbara Simmons back to second terms on the school board. Guthrie was the leading vote getter with a total of 124 votes. Simmons was close behind with 118 votes. Contenders Gay Abernathy and Terry McIver received 63 and 39 votes respectively.

Rain!

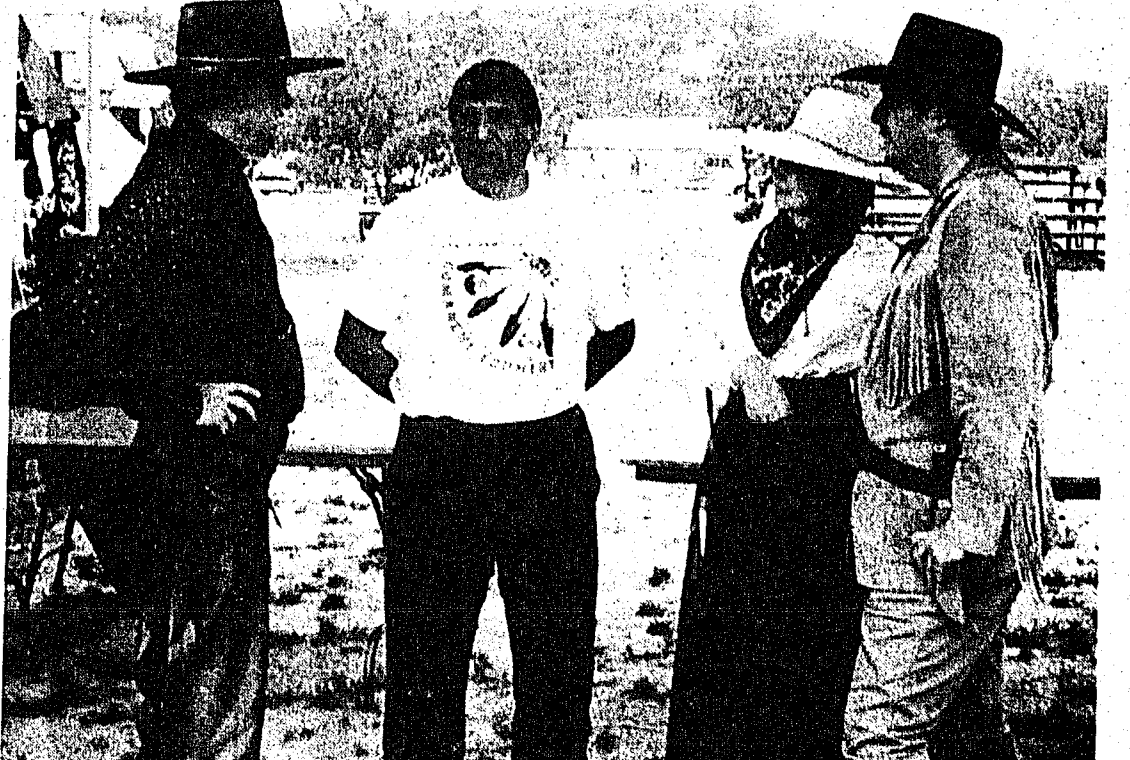
According to Teresa Absher, our official

resident rain reporter for the National Weather Service, Santa Anna has received 2.71 inches of much needed and long awaited rain over the past week or so. May 2nd rainfall measured .06; Sunday, May 8th, .20 and Monday, May 9th, 1.75. Tuesday rainfall added another .70 inches bringing the May total through Tuesday night to 2.71 inches.

Rainfall in rural areas of the county varied from one inch to three or more inches on Monday.

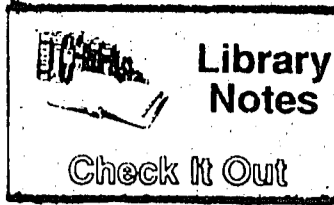

Walleyes Stocked in Lake O. H. Ivie

In the latest report from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials, personnel have been reported stocking 400,000 walleye fry in Lake Ivie. The Ivie stocking is a portion of the 8.2 million walleye released in three Texas lakes.

In addition to 210,604 rainbow trout stocked in numerous water bodies during the year, TPWD personnel have stocked 30,571,547 fingerlings (fry and adult fish) into Texas public waters from January 1 through April 22.

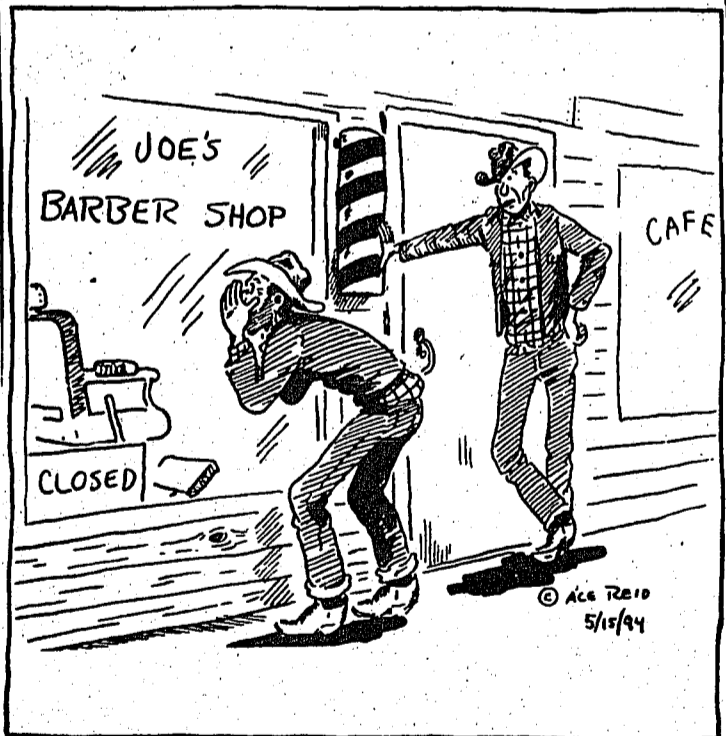

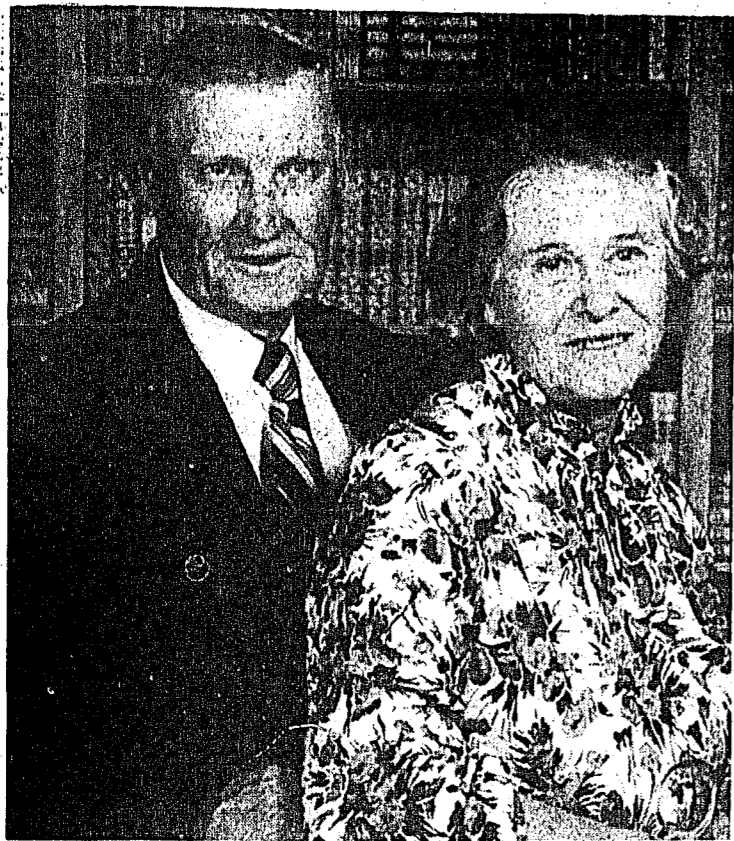

District Court Hears Pleas

District Attorney Ross L. Jones presented for disposition the following cases to 42nd District Judge John Weeks at the Coleman County Courthouse on Thursday, May 5, 1994:

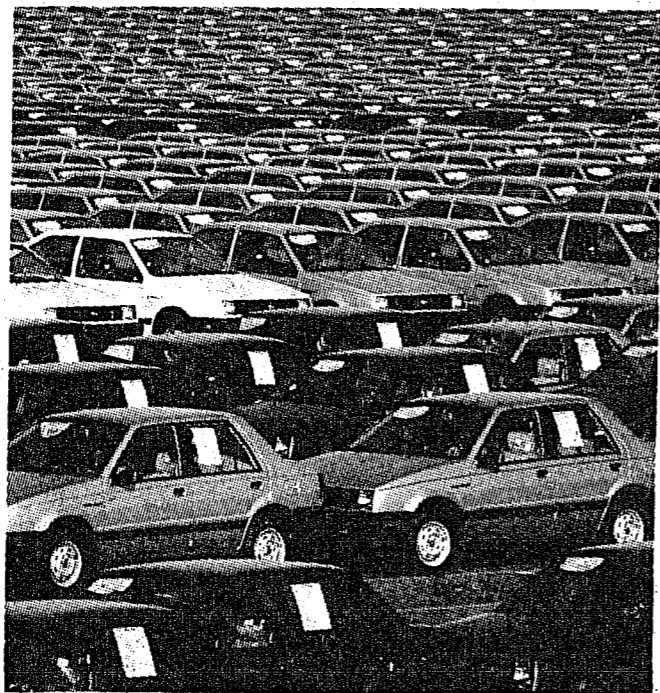

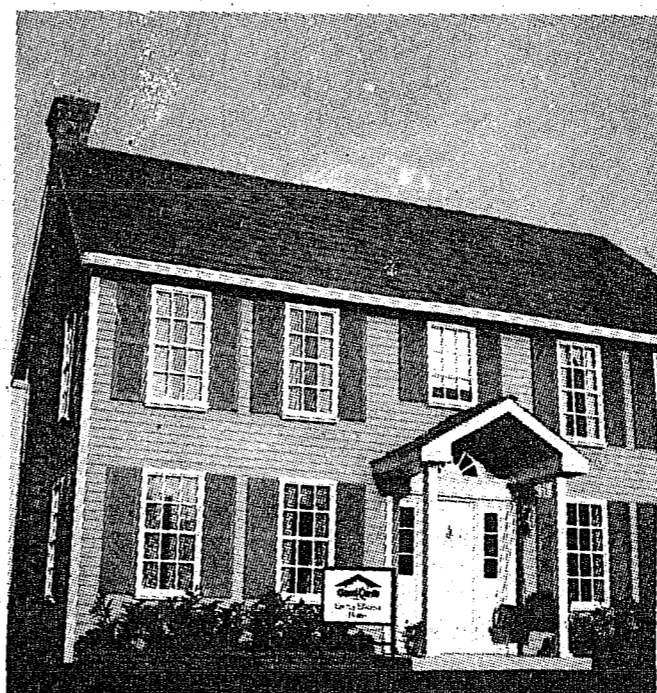

Pond Management Seminar

A farm pond management seminar will be held on Tuesday, May 17 beginning at 10:00 a.m. at the Coleman City Park. This program is designed to answer questions on farm pond management and will cover topics such as aquatic weed control and the best types of fish to stock tanks with. Licensed private applicators will receive 1.5 hours of continuing education units with a .5 of those hours in law and regulations.

Last years program drew a crowd of 120 people who enjoyed a complimentary noon fish fry. This years program should be as enjoyable with guest speaker Dr. James Davis, Extension Fisheries Specialist from College Station, Texas. Dr. Davis will be discussing weed control in and around ponds and encourages anyone with questions to bring in a sample of a weed they would like to control. Also during the morning program, a discussion of dry fire hydrants and how rural citizens can work to get a dry fire hydrant on their property will be covered by Larry Seymour of the Soil Conservation Service and Willard Allen, chairman of the Coleman County RC&D committee.

Following the morning program, a complimentary noon fish fry will be served sponsored by Johnson's Feed Barn, Federal Land Bank, The Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District and the Coleman County Extension Ag Committee. Since there will be a meal served, we do ask that you call the County Extension Office at 625-4519 or the Soil Conservation Service at 625-2151 by 5:00 p.m. Monday, May 16 and reserve your place—that way we will have enough fish for everyone.

Rabid Skunk Attacks Pet Near Voss

According to information received recently from local veterinarian, Kathy Pearce, a pet puppy was attacked by a rabid skunk which climbed up on the porch of the Loggin home in the Voss community.

Dr. Pearce warns pet owners to be sure their animals are protected with the rabies vaccine. She says its a misconception that animals have to be six months or older to receive the rabies vaccination. They can be vaccinated as early as three months old.

And "don't forget your livestock, especially saddle horses," she warns. Dr. Pearce said that several "strange acting" skunks have been

killed in Santa Anna and a rural man reported last week that a fox tried to attack his son. The animal bit at the son's boot. They killed the animal and game warden Steve Vail was that day investigating the incident. No word has been received as to whether the fox was believed to be rabid, but the word when

dealing with unfamiliar animals is CAUTION. To date there have been no confirmed cases of rabid animals in or near Santa Anna. There have been several confirmed cases in McCulloch and Runnels Counties.

We've had some real good luck this past week catching some real nice size bass. One day I was fishing with Pete Churchwell of Abilene and Harry Maddison of Dallas, and we boated 60 fish, among them a 6 lb. bass, two over 5 lbs. and one 4 lb. We were using crank baits and worms.

Crappie fishing has been fair. The larger crappie are pretty scattered. We caught a good batch of crappie Sunday, the largest being 15-3/4 inches. We found them in 24 feet of water suspended at about 18 feet.

I've had some good reports from trotliners catching yellow catfish in the Colorado and Concho rivers using perch for bait. Also heard of successful trotling for blue and channel cat using shad and cut carp.

For the kiddoes fishing from the ramp, the perch are biting great. They're running a little larger than an adult's hand and the youngsters are having lots of fun catching them while learning the enjoyment of fishing!
