

Walleyes Stocked in Lake O. H. Ivie

In the latest report from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials, personnel have been reported stocking 400,000 walleye fry in Lake Ivie. The Ivie stocking is a portion of the 8.2 million walleye released in three Texas lakes. In addition to 210,604 rainbow

trout stocked in numerous water bodies during the year, TPWD personnel have stocked 30,571,547 fingerlings (fry and adult fish) into Texas public waters from January 1 through April 22.



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
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

Coleman Saturday in connection with a narcotics investigation that netted a quantity of suspected mariiuana.

The suspects were taken into custody after officers searched four locations in Coleman, Sheriff Wade Turner said.

Arrested were Emilio Diaz. William Lee Isbell and Patsy Karen Slayton, all of Coleman. Diaz was charged with felony possession of marijuana and Isbell and Slayton were charged with first degree possession of controlled substance with deliver to intent (methamphetamine). All three are being held under \$25,000 bonds.

Blythe has been administrator and respiratory therapist of the center since September, 1992. The board accepted the resignation unanimously.



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

Your children first begin forming an opinion of themselves by the manner in which you talk to them. How they feel about themselves affects all areas of their lives. Is much of what they hear from you positive or negative?

*Make ordinary, every-day experiences pleasant for your child.

*Set aside special times for each of your children. Allow them to choose an activity that they would like to do. *Catch your child being good and

praise the behavior. *Move physically closer to your children when you talk with them. Hold them.

*When you talk with your children or when they talk with you, stop what you are doing and look into their eyes.

*Remember, they are their own person and may do things differently than you.

*Respond to your child with patience and understanding. Scolding or criticizing your child in front of others shows a lack of sensitivity and respect.

*Share your positive feeling with your child often.

*For a heart-to-heart talk, go to the child's room or to a quiet place. *Comments such as "That's no big

deal" or "You shouldn't feel that way" makes your children believe their feelings are not important to you.





We've had some read good luck this past week catching some real nice size bass. One day I was fishing with Pete Churchwell of Abilène and Harry Maddison of Dallas, and we boated 60 fish, among them a 6 lb. bass, two over 5 lbs. and one 4 lb. We were using crank baits and worms.

Crappie fishing has been fair. The larger crappie are pretty scattered. We caught a good batch of crappie Sunday, the largest being 15-3/4 inches. We found them in 24 feet of water suspended at about 18 feet.

I've had some good reports from trotliners catching yellow catfish in the Colorado and Concho rivers using perch for bait. Also heard of successful trotlining for blue and channel cat using shad and cut carp.

For the kiddoes fishing from the ramp, the perch are biting great. They're running a little larger than an adult's hand and the youngsters are having lots of fun catching them while learning the enjoyment of fishing! Call me at 357-4785 or 357-4466.




