



The Coleman County Appraisal District Board met Monday, May 9, at the District office in Coleman for their regular session. Present were Barbara Kingsbery, D. G. Allen and Charles Yarbrough. Absent were By Appeals Court Billy McCrary and Harold Skelton.

Routine business included approval of minutes of the last meeting, approval for payment of bills and accounts for March and April, and a review of the budget status that showed all categories within the budget.

Bill Jones, Chief Appraiser, presented the tax collection report for the past two months, with Panther Creek ISD leading with 90 percent collected and an average for the nine taxing entities of 86.70 percent. The figure is higher with the inclusion of the collection of delinquent taxes from prior years. The total tax collection through April is almost \$122,000 over the same time

Jerry Allen was nominated for the Appraisal District Agriculture Advisory Committee, replacing Tommy Connelly who is no longer eligible to serve. Other members of the committee are Don Rhone and Bruce Pittard. Also discussed was an appointment to the Appraisal Review Board to fill the Santa Anna vacancy of T. J. Dalton, recently deceased. Other members of that group are James Hunter and William Brown.

Lake Coleman, according to lake warden Billy Matthews, is about 20" above the morning glory. It was 8 feet low before catching about 9-1/2 feet last week.


Manager Tommy Halfman said Monday morning that Hord's Creek lake is 13" from being completely

Set an example by eating a wide variety of nutritious foods yourself. Children learn from adults. If you snack on empty calorie foods, your child is likely to do the same. If you drink water or fruit juice more often than soda, your child will learn to enjoy these beverages.

Take time to look more closely at your own eating habits and decide how you might change them to set a better example.

Involve children in planning and preparing meals and snacks. This helps them feel that they can make a real contribution.

Help your child develop an open, adventurous attitude toward trying foods. Be relaxed about it.





Other prizes are being contributed by area businesses. There will be Open, Women






