Council Makes Offer In Lawsuit, Plans Building Acquisition

The Santa Anna City Council met on May 10, 1994 in their regular monthly meeting.
Two citizens appeared before the council to request the City's assistance in taking care of the trash problem at the Section 8 Government Apartments on Jefferson and South Lee Streets. The trash is not being placed in the dumpsters and dogs and cats are tearing it up and then it is blowing in area yards. The council suggested that contact be made with the new director and housing board members.
New Nutrition Director Betty Sue Cupps reported that all is going well at the nutrition center. The center is operating in the black. Cupps presented a petition signed by the senior citizens asking that the telephone be placed back in the center. Mayor Gale Brock said the phone had been done removed so people at Funtier Days could not make long distance calls.

New Park Director Doris Haak asked for a signature card at the bank on the park fund to require two signatures before money can be withdrawn. This will be taken care of immediately. Willard Allen of the DRD in Coleman informed the council and Haak of a program to apply for grants for trees, grass, etc. for parks. The cost to join in this program will be \$25.00 per year. The park board has asked Jim Laubhan to paint the rules and regulations of the park on the side of the restrooms.
City Attorney Sam Allen recommended to the council that the city offer *Brownwood Bulletin* a settlement of \$750.00 for out of pocket expenses, \$120.00 filing fees and \$40.00 for service costs for a total of \$910.00 in a suit filed earlier in which the *Brownwood* newspaper alleged violations of the Texas Open Meeting Act.

On Saturday they attended a birthday party for four-year-old granddaughter, Erin, of Oklahoma City. The party was held at the

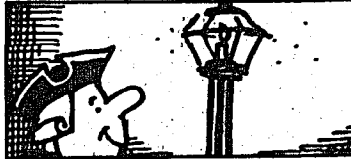
home of Erin's other grandparents in San Angelo. Erin and her parents, Paul and Michelle Voss, were in San Angelo to attend the ASU graduation.

computer technical services, and Math Science contracts with Region XV Service Center.

Board member Gary Absher made proposals affecting exchange students attending SAHS. The board approved a proposal to issue diplomas and graduating status to those exchange students who meet the same requirements as resident students. They also approved a proposal to issue honorary diplomas to all exchange students who complete a years work at SAHS.

One agenda item concerned under-expended funds in special program areas. Supt. Jim McPherson explained that not all funds received for vocational and Gifted/Talented

programs have been spent and according to guidelines, 85% of the funds must be expended by the end of August or the school must return the remaining federal monies allotted for those programs. Plans are being made for utilization of the funds.

The board set Tuesday night of this week to interview the top four candidates for the secondary principal position being vacated by the retiring of Frank Gray at the end of the school year.

The board rejected bids from General Services Commission for a new school bus and opted for a recommendation for lease/purchase agreement from Blue Bird Bus for a bus that can seat from 41 to 71 students depending on seating arrangements. The bus can accommodate three to a seat if needed.

The group heard the Superintendent's report on information items and also took care of paying bills.

Appraisal Board Hears Report On Collections Up

The Coleman County Appraisal District Board met Monday, May 9, at the District office in Coleman for their regular session. Present were Barbara Kingsbery, D. G. Allen and Charles Yarbrough. Absent were Billy McCrary and Harold Skelton.

Routine business included approval of minutes of the last meeting, approval for payment of bills and accounts for March and April, and a review of the budget status that showed all categories within the budget.

Bill Jones, Chief Appraiser, presented the tax collection report for the past two months, with Panther Creek ISD leading with 90 percent collected and an average for the nine taxing entities of 86.70 percent. The figure is higher with the inclusion of the collection of delinquent taxes from prior years. The total tax collection through April is almost \$122,000 over the same time last year.

Jerry Allen was nominated for the Appraisal District Agriculture Advisory Committee, replacing Tommy Connelly who is no longer eligible to serve. Other members of the committee are Don Rhone and Bruce Pittard. Also discussed was an appointment to the Appraisal Review Board to fill the vacancy of T. J. Dalton, recently deceased. Other members of that group are James Hunter and William Brown.

The 1995 budget was studied, with adoption set for the next meeting for Monday, June 13, at 5 p.m.

Meetings of the Appraisal District are open to the public, and visitors are welcome to attend.

Attempted Murder Conviction Upheld By Appeals Court

On May 5, 1994, the Eleventh Court of Appeals affirmed the attempted murder conviction of David Michael McClure, Jr. sentencing McClure to 20 years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

McClure was convicted by a Coleman County jury in 1992 of shooting his former wife, Kala McClure, in the back of the head and leaving her in a remote spot near Burkett in Coleman County, Texas.

The Court of Appeals rejected all of the thirteen points of appeal asserted by the attorneys for McClure. He was represented on appeal by court-appointed attorney Melissa Romine of Abilene and thereafter by retained attorney Bennie House, Jr. of Houston. The State was represented by District Attorney Ross L. Jones and acting Assistant District Attorney John Graves.

All in all fishing is looking real good at Lake Ivie.

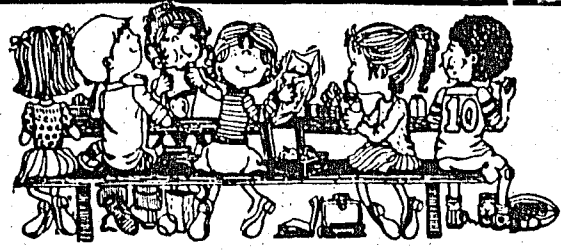
