## Storms Reek Havoc In Area

Storms have continued to dance around our area leaving heavy damage in their wake although they have brought with them some much needed rain for which we are thankful.

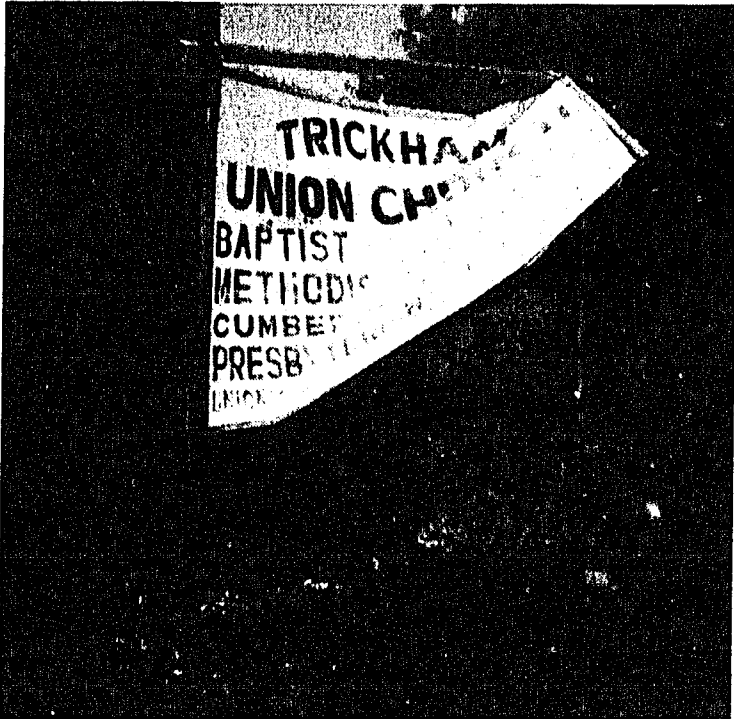
According to Teresa Absher who records rainfall for the National Weather Service, the total rainfall in Santa Anna for May is recorded at 11.1 inches. From Wednesday through Sunday evening we received 3.69 inches. Prior to May our recorded rainfall had totaled a little over 5 inches. The year to date total is now 16.59 inches with the year half over. Average rainfall for this area is somewhere in the neighborhood of 27 inches. Rural areas have reported more in places and less in other spots.

Heavy rains and several unconfirmed tornadoes reeked havoc in Coleman and surrounding counties from Wednesday of last week through Sunday night.

On Wednesday a storm caused severe damage to barns and trailers at Lost Track Auction Company near Talpa. Thursday, the rural community of Trickham received lots of damage from wind and hail and a possible tornado. Trees were felled and a 100-year old building was destroyed in the town. Several nearby dwellings had considerable roof damage.

The Trickham and Cleveland areas were hit again Sunday when thunderstorms again roared through causing more damage. Rain and large hail accompanied the storms Sunday. Roofs of barns were blown off. At the Dale Herring and Terry Fleming homes windows were broken by golfball size hail.

R.W. Cupps reported rain and hail which broke a pickup window. He also reported having seen a funnel

cloud while traveling north of Coleman on F.M. 1176 on Sunday night. Several utility poles were either toppled.

A Santa Anna storm watch unit reported a funnel cloud between Winchell and Trickham at approximately 10 p.m. It was about that time that a storm caused lots of damage in Brown County. Last Thursday night the small community of Concord, just over the county line into Brown County, was virtually wiped away, according to people who live in that area.

## Medical Clinic P.A. Small Town Boy At Heart

Richard "Bud" Isbell says he is a "small town boy at heart," and is happy to be in the Santa Anna area where he can live that small town life even though he had hardly heard of Santa Anna until he was offered the position as Physicians Assistant at the Santa Anna Medical Clinic located in the "old Cabansag Clinic" building near Ranger Park Inn.

Isbell has 20 years experience as a P.A. and previously served as a Medical Trainer in Alaska and in Vietnam as an Independent Aidman, a member of the U.S. Special Forces where he reached the rank of Chief Warrant Officer Second Class. Isbell was the first P.A. from a civilian school to come into the U.S. Army. He received his degree from the University of Florida. He was reared in High Springs, Florida.

A physician assistant is a health care professional who has completed an accredited training program consisting of the basic medical sciences on such topics as anatomy and physiology, pharmacology, physical diagnosis, biochemistry and medical sciences.

The clinical portion of a P.A.'s training consists of experience in such areas as internal medicine, surgery, pediatrics, geriatrics, obstetrics and gynecology, psychiatry and family practice.

Isbell comes to this area from near Texarkana where he worked as a P.A. with the Federal Bureau of Prisons. Bud has no family connection here except for his wife, Shirley, whose nickname is "Buck", and their teenage son, Joshua, who goes by "J.T." They are looking forward to finding a

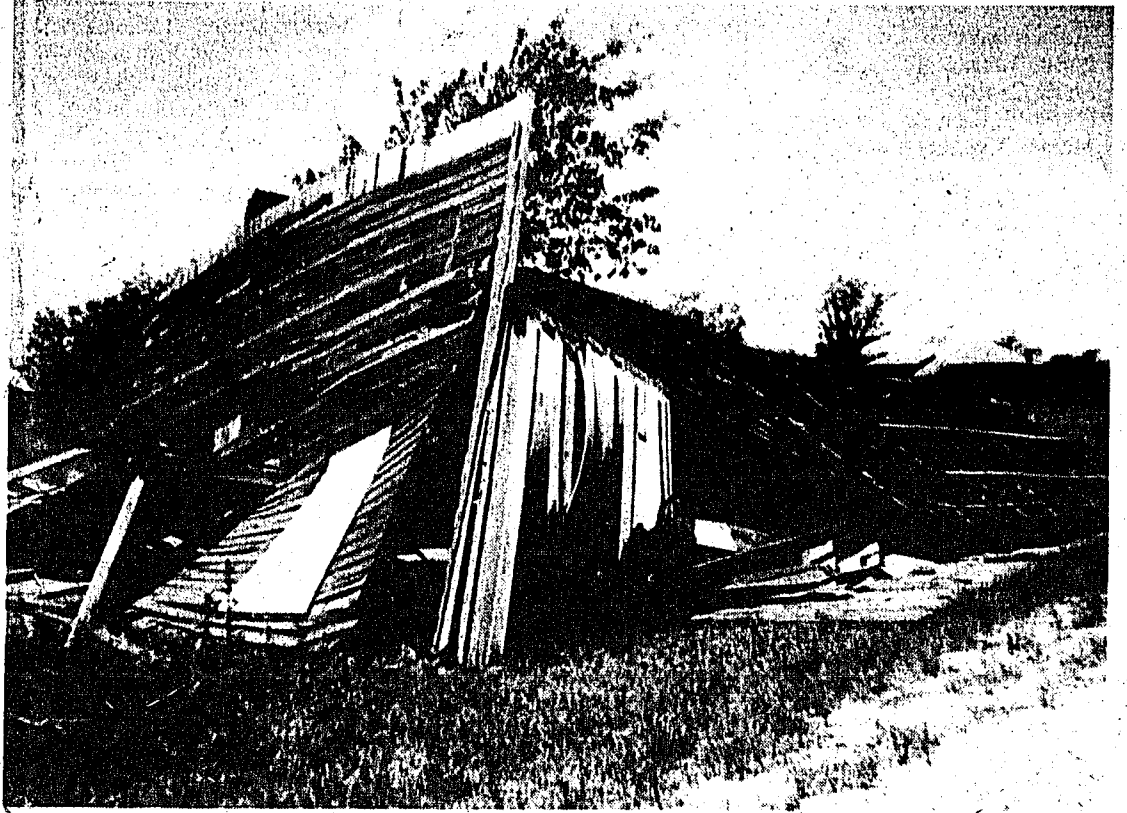
home in the country in the Santa Anna School District where they can have their horses and a few cows.

According to a report, Stevens, a 1966 graduate of Sam Houston State University, has had experience as management administrator of three rural hospitals, contact manager in a Houston Hospital and is presently employed as health services representative of Methodist Hospital, Dallas.

He will begin work in Coleman in about a week. Stevens, and his wife, Jan Carruthers Stevens, a math teacher

in Fairfield, have five children—a daughter, Kim Moore who resides in Kansas, and sons Richard, 19, David, 17, 14-year-old James and Charles 11.

Check It Out

I love books and old-really old books stir my imagination. Do you think both of those traits are lost to the younger generation? We older folks gained the love of books as the family sat around together. Now they sit together and enjoy TV or videos.

Anyhow one of the books that came into my hands last week was written in 1897. **The Latimers: A Tale of the Western Insurrection of 1794** by Henry Christopher McCook. ## Texas Agricultural Extension Service

Another Saga in the Cutting Board Debate

Which is the best—plastic or wooden cutting board? The debate still on, but the USDA Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) has reaffirmed its recommendation for plastic cutting boards.

Last year, the controversial report of the Food Research Institute at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, which concluded that antimicrobial properties of wooden cutting boards make them safer than plastic ones, touched off a fury of consumer and industry questions. In response, FSIS called on the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) of USDA to conduct more research on the questions of the safety of cutting boards.

Scientists from the Eastern Regional Research Center of the ARS report that findings from their recent study support the use of plastic cutting boards for food preparation. These scientists found that bacteria consistently survived better on wooden boards than plastic. They also were not able to find evidence of antimicrobial activity in various types of wood, except for white ash which is popularly used for baseball bats, not for cutting boards.

Despite these findings, as expressed in an abstract submitted to the Institute of Food Technologists, Dr. Arthur Miller, the principal investigator of the new study, cautions that the debate is far from clear-cut. He makes the point that there are many variables to be considered in judging between the two types of boards. These include the age of the cutting board, the type of food product being cut, and the type of knife used. Miller's study "Comparison of Wooden and Plastic Cutting Boards of Bacterial Attachment and Removal Potential", measured bacterial counts on wooden and plastic cutting boards after 90-minute exposures to temperature-abused samples of beef chuck. The previous research, conducted by Dr. Dean Cliver of the University of Wisconsin, looked at the survival of organisms transmitted to boards via inoculated juices or liquids. Furthermore, the research done by Cliver was modeled more after what may occur in the home kitchen, while Miller's was modeled on an in-plant scenario.

Miller's study also studied the effectiveness of cleaning products used on the boards. Plastic cutting boards appeared to be more consistently cleanable than wood, he said. So, it seems that the jury may still be out on this topic. Until more conclusive research findings are released, the safest recommendation for safety of cutting boards is two-fold. First, use separate cutting boards for raw foods of animal origin and for foods that will be eaten fresh or not cooked further. Second, wash boards with hot soapy water, followed by a hot water rinse and sanitize with a chlorine solution after each use. Allow to air dry. Finally, it's best to replace any boards that become cut, heavily grooved or split.

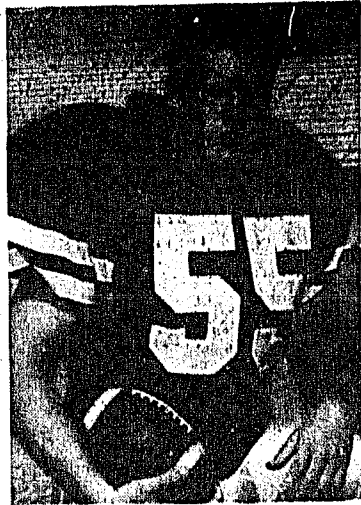

## Capitol Comments by BOB TURNER State Representative - District 73



With the primary and run-off elections and city/school elections now over, those of us in government can now resume tending to the business of the state in a more effective manner. Before I leave the subject of elections and voting I must take the following observation: The low voter turnout during all of these elections is simply not acceptable! When, in some instances, the turn-out was as low as 11-12% and the state average was 20%, then it is no wonder to me that government on all levels is currently in such a bad state of affairs. Those citizens who show so little interest in the business of the state—which is really the business of us all and financed by us all—cannot blame anyone but themselves when public policy does not turn out the way they wish. It is a deep and worrisome problem to me as to how to raise the consciousness level of the citizenry so that they will accept the responsibility of voting. In a democracy, public participation is absolutely necessary and should be a treasured privilege. How we can make willing participants of our citizens in the voting process is a puzzle to me. After that comment, I want to take up with my readers the controversial topic of health care.

Health care is a very major topic of interest and discussion, not only in the media, but in every coffee shop in Texas. All sorts of proposed national health care reform plans are being brought out and discussed. Now, before I proceed further, let me say that I feel well qualified to make the following observations on health care reform, and the impact it will have on all of us as Texans and Americans.

For three years I chaired a National Rural Health Care Advisory Committee for the American Farm Bureau Federation, as well as serving for five years as a chair of a statewide Health Advisory Committee for the Texas Farm Bureau. More recently I served 13 months on Governor Richards Health Care Task Force. As a military commander before my retirement I had medical personnel in my command, and have observed, first hand, the nationalized health care systems in several European countries. So, first, I personally do not believe that a national, universal health care plan will work in the United States. I base this on the ineffectiveness of both Medicare and Medicaid, as well as the understaffing and poor handling of our veteran health care facilities, all direct products of the federal govern-

ment. I would like to offer my observations and the corrective actions that if taken, with our current health care system, I believe will make substantial improvement.

Self-employed persons should be able to deduct 100% of their health insurance premium from their federal income tax form, in the same manner that major industry does, at this time. This would provide incentive for an increase in the insuring of the self-employed. I believe that potential health care purchasers should be able to obtain prices for the procedures they need or require, as well as outcome results from health care delivery products. This would enable the purchaser to shop for, not only the best price possible, but to evaluate how effective that provider has been in providing that particular service in the past. I am further convinced that some sort of caps must be set on the exposure of health care providers, whether they be physicians, hospitals, dentists, nurses, or any other of the host of health care providers. This in turn will minimize a large portion of "CYA" in the matter of ordering unneeded tests, and multiple opinions that are costing unnecessary millions in today's health care system. It is further my opinion that medical providers (doctors, hospitals, etc.) should be exempt from malpractice exposure when providing public service, or free health care services. This would greatly reduce the cost in providing health care for the indigent and needy.

I further believe that the United States Internal Revenue (IRS) Code should be amended to allow "individual health care savings plans (health care IRA's)", which would be tax exempt to the purchaser. With the accumulation in this "IRA", the individual could

cover up-front and minor health care costs. A low cost, high deductible health insurance policy could then be purchased to cover those major medical and catastrophic type health care costs. The unused portion could then become a tax free savings account for the purchaser. It is obvious that if the individual covers the up-front costs, many abuses of the health care system are eliminated.

Free enterprise and competition is the factor that drives research and development of new procedures as well as the development of new and advanced facilities and equipment. For private enterprise, the hope for an increased share of the market and an improved profit picture is required to enable development of new and improved health care delivery techniques, as well as adequate availability of these systems and facilities. This would prevent rationing of health care, such as is being practiced in, not only Canada, but many European nations today. It is my observation that in a governmentally owned and managed health care environment where the tax payers are paying for new equipment, facilities, and techniques, the development will be limited. In turn the adequate availability of health care facilities will become more and more limited, as time goes on.

We should keep a few important factors in mind, as we mull this issue of health care and it's costs over in our mind. First, we are a rapidly growing and aging population. Both of those factors make health care cost more. Secondly, we now live with diseases and malfunctions that killed our parents and grandparents must a few years back.

Thirdly, infant mortality rates that are published, should be taken in proper context. Every birth, be it live or still born is reported and becomes part of our averages in the

United States. Live births and infants living after a prescribed number of days of life, only, are reported in the birth numbers in many other nations. This method of reporting statistics is why our infant mortality rate appears so shockingly high in comparison to other leading countries of the world.

To be quite honest, we in the United States have one of the best health systems in the world and definitely some of the finest physicians, nurses and health care providers. Also we have among the most modern and innovative equipment and facilities known. This has come about primarily because of the free enterprise system and the possibility of profit on investments. Our American health care system does have problems and is in need of repair, but it is my opinion that it should not be scrapped and it should definitely not be replaced by an ineffective, federally operated system—a system which is currently proving daily, with the operations of Medicare and Medicaid, to be loaded with fraud and problems of administration, and which is proving generally ineffective.

My opinion as a member of the State Legislature and not of the U. S. Congress are probably of little significance, however, I know that all of us are keenly aware and interested in the developments that are taking place in the area of health care in our nation. Please let your thoughts be known to your representatives, both House and Senate, in the United States Congress. The topic is urgent, and the time is now, that each of us become actively concerned.
