Storms Reek Havoc In Area

Storms have continued to dance around our area leaving heavy damage in their wake although they have brought with them some much needed rain for which we are thankful.

According to Teresa Absher who records rainfall for the National Weather Service, the total rainfall in Santa Anna for May is recorded at 11.1 inches. From Wednesday through Sunday evening we received 3.69 inches. Prior to May our recorded rainfall had totaled a little over 5 inches. The year to date total is now 16.59 inches with the year half over. Average rainfall for this area is somewhere in the neighborhood of 27 inches. Rural areas have reported more in places and less in other spots.

Heavy rains and several unconfirmed tornadoes reeked havoc in Coleman and surrounding counties from Wednesday of last week through Sunday night.

On Wednesday a storm caused severe damage to barns and trailers at Lost Track Auction Company near Talpa. Thursday, the rural community of Trickham received lots of damage from wind and hail and a possible tornado. Trees were felled and and a 100-year old building was destroyed in the town. Several nearby dwellings had considerable roof damage.

The Trickham and Cleveland areas were hit again Sunday when thunderstorms again roared through causing more damage. Rain and large hail accompanied the storms Sunday. Roofs of barns were

blown off. At the Dale Herring and Terry Fleming homes windows were broken by golfball size hail.

If confirmed by the Senate, Vietnam as an Independent Aidman, Cheaney will serve his term until Feb. 1, 1999.





Another Saga in the **Cutting Board Debate** By Carol Katzer, CEA-H. E.

Which is the best--plastic or wooden cutting board? The debate still on, but the USDA Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) has reaffirmed its recommendation for plastic cutting boards.

Last year, the controversial report of the Food Research Institute at the University of Wisconsin. Madison, which concluded that antimicrobial properties of wooden cutting boards make them safer than plastic ones, touched off a fury of consumer and industry questions. In response, FSIS called on the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) of USDA to conduct more research on the questions of the safety of cutting boards.

Scientists from the Eastern Regional Research Center of the ARS report that findings from their recent study support the use of plastic cutting boards for food preparation. These scientists found that bacteria consistently survived better on wooden boards than plastic. They also were not able to find evidence of antimicrobal activity in various types of wood, except for white ash which is popularly used for baseball bats, not for cutting

Despite these findings, as expressed in an abstract submitted to the Institute of Food Technologists. Dr. Arthur Miller, the principal investigator of the new study, cautions that the debate is far from clear-cut. He makes the point that there are many variables to be considered in judging between the two types of boards. These include the age of the cutting board, the type of food product being cut, and the type of knife used. Miller's study. "Comparison of Wooden and Plastic Cutting Boards of Bacterial Attachment and Removal Potential", measured bacterial counts on wooden and plastic cutting boards after 90-minute exposures to temperature-abused samples of beef chuck. The previous re-

search, conducted by Dr. Dean Cliver of the University of Wisconsin, looked at the survival of organisms transmitted to boards via inoculated juices or liquids. Furthermore, the research done by Cliver was modeled more after what may occur in the home kitchen, while Miller's was modeled on an in-plant scenario.

Miller's study also studied the effectiveness of cleaning products used on the boards. Plastic cutting boards appeared to be more consis-

tently cleanable than wood, he said. So, it seems that the jury may still be out on this topic. Until more conclusive research findings are released, the safest recommendation for safety of cutting boards is two-fold. First, use separate cutting boards for raw foods of animal origin and for foods that will be eaten fresh or not cooked further. Second, wash boards with hot soapy water, followed by a hot water rinse and sanitize with a chlorine solution after each use. Allow to air dry. Finally, it's best to replace any boards that become cut, heavily grooved or split.

> Picking A Frozen Dinner By Carol Katzer, CEA-H.E.

Today's healthful eating guidelines have set numerical goals of less than 30 percent of a day's calories from fat as well as specific guidelines for sodium. Picking frozen dinners that meet these guidelines can be a challenge. Here are a few suggestions for what to search for in selecting a healthful frozen dinner or entree:

*Single-serving dinners should be 300 calories or less. Complete your dinner by adding a salad or fresh fruit. *Less than 800 milligrams of

sodium which is about one-third of the recommended daily maximum for most people. If you are on a sodium restricted diet, even that will be too much.

*Less than 10 grams of fat per 300 calories serving. That means that fat will contribute less than 30 percent of the calories. Fish, poultry and lean beef are low in fat but not if they are deep-fried. Pasta is also low-fat, unless it's topped with butter or a cream sauce. Vegetarian dishes don't always meet the criteria for low-fat because they can be loaded with oil and high-fat ingredi-

*Few additives. Some brands doesn't tell you anything. Check the ingredients.

*Little or no added sugar. Sugar in its variety of forms (sucrose, dextrose, corn syrup, honey, molasses, etc.) shouldn't rank high on the ingredients list. It adds unnecessary calories.

Perry Criticizes Government Overregulation, EPA **Worker Protection Standard**

HOUSTON--Agriculture

Commissioner Rick Perry recently lation of agriculture that "can be so about the safe use of pesticides, but

Perry said the burden of paperwork streaming from national, state and local bureaucracies has created inefficient, unresponsive government and a skeptical electorate.

He spoke to about 400 aerial applicators attending the Texas Agricultural Aviation Association convention at the Adam's Mark

Perry cited the federal Worker Protection Standard from the Environmental Protection Agency as an example of "regulation by the government for the government." He accused the EPA of not allowthe farm community about the regulations and not providing the resources to implement the regulations properly.

The WPS regulations go into effect April 21.

"EPA has been late with everything right down the training manuals," Perry said. "They sent us a. compliance manual in September that was due in July--120 copies to distribute to 180,000 farmers and ranchers. Other materials we need to get started are not even out yet, but EPA wants agriculture revved up and ready for takeoff April 21."

In an effort to make government more efficient and customer friendly, Perry said the Texas Department of Agriculture is streamlining pesticide laws to make compliance easier. TDA staff is also rewriting Texas Right-To-

o'clock last night. Vinegar: It's The Spice of Life

(NU) - In some parts of the country, the secret's been out for years: Don't put salt on your french fries, use vinegar instead. At boardwalk concession stands, the bottle of vining states enough time to educate egar is right beside the salt shaker and it's used more often.

Maybe people strolling along the boardwalk munching fries aren't thinking about healthful alternatives to salt. But the robust flavor of aged red vinegar can add spice to life with less than a milligram of sodium per ounce.

One ounce of vinegar has just four calories and less than one gram of

cover up-front and minor health care costs. A low cost, high deductible health insurance policy could then be purchased to cover those major medical and catastrophic type health care costs. The unused portion could then become a tax free savings account for the purchaser. It is obvious that if the individual covers the up-front costs, many abuses of the health care system are eliminated.

Free enterprise and competition is the factor that drives research and development of new procedures as well as the development of new and advanced facilities and equipment. For private enterprise, the hope for an increased share of the market and an improved profit picture is required to enable development of new and improved health care delivery techniques, as well as adequate availability of these systems and facilities. This would prevent rationing of health care, such as is being practiced in, not only Canada, but many European nations today. It is my observation that in a governmentally owned and managed health care environment where the tax payers are paying for new equipment, facilities, and techniques, the development will be limited. In turn the adequate availability of health care facilities will become more and more limited, as time goes on.

We should keep a few important factors in mind, as we mull this issue of health care and it's costs over in our mind. First, we are a rapidly growing and aging population. Both of those factors make health care cost more. Secondly, we now live with diseases and malfunctions ents must a few years back. Thirdly, infant mortality rates that are published, should be taken in proper context. Every birth, be it live or still born is reported and becomes part of our averages in the

United States. Live births and infants living after a prescribed number of days of life, only, are reported in the birth numbers in many other nations. This method of reporting statistics is why our infant mortality rate appears so shockingly high in comparison to other leading countries of the world.

To be quite honest, we in the United States have one of the best health systems in the world and definitely some of the finest physicians, nurses and health care providers. Also we have among the most modern and innovative equipment and facilities known. This has come about primarily because of the free enterprise system and the possibility of profit on investments. Our American health care system does have problems and is in need of repair, but it is my opinion that it should not be. scrapped and it should definitely Not be replaced by an ineffective. federally operated system--a system which is currently proving daily, with the operations of Medicare and Medicaid, to be loaded with fraud and problems of administration, and which is proving generally ineffec-

My opinion as a member of the State Legislature and not of the U. S. Congress are probably of little significance, however, I know that all of us are keenly aware and interested in the developments that are taking place in the area of health. care in our nation.
