position being vacated at the retirement of Frank Gray who started his tenure as Santa Anna High school principal in 1986. Gray is retiring after having been in

the school profession for 36 years as teacher, coach and administrator. He plans to stay busy with his farming and ranching interests.

Huffman, 39, is a native of Comanche. He earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Industrial Education and Masters degree with counseling and mid-management

The 28th annual Little George Havens' Cowboy Camp Meeting will begin next Friday, June 17 and continue through June 26.

The Cowboy Camp Meeting will take place at the Flying H Acres, alongside Highway 84, between Coleman and Santa Anna. Young and old are invited to attend this unique family camp, patterned after the frontier Camp Meetings of yesteryear which were begun by those early day circuit-riders to make the Gospel real and to provide needed fellowship for the ranchers

and their families of this sparsely settled country. The camp's purpose is still the very same.

There will be two services daily under the big, brightly colored vinyl tent. Services times will be 10 a.m. and 8 p.m.

Near the big tent will be the cook tent, under which the campers and visitors will gather to share the "pot luck" type evening meal. On both Saturdays the Camp will sponsor the big chuck wagon suppers with mesquite barbecued meat, sourdough biscuits, creek bank cof-

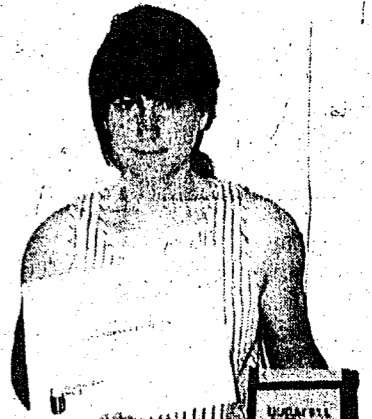

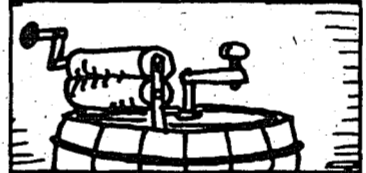

KERRVILLE— The Cowboy Artists Museum in Kerrville will feature the exhibit, "Cowboy Comedy - The Cartoons of Ace Reid," from now through August 8 at the museum, 1550 Bandera Highway.

Reid's "Cowboy Cartoons" first went syndicated in January, 1954. A cowboy turned artist, Reid was a shrewd observer of human nature and used his observations of life in the "modern" west as fodder for his art.

His characters, Jake, Zeb, Maw and Slim of the Draggin' S Ranch mirrored real life situations that Ace saw around him.

Reid's cartoon was eventually syndicated in more than 500 newspapers, including the Santa Anna News.

Santa Anna people feel a certain kinship to the late cowboy artist since his parents lived in Santa Anna for number of years. We are still fortunate to enjoy his cartoons, compliments of the Santa Anna National Bank.

The museum is open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday, and

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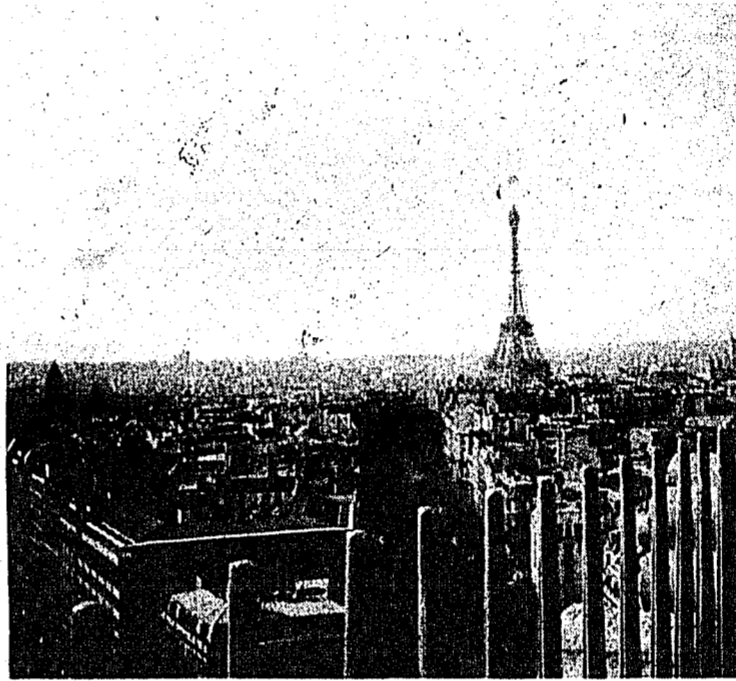
April In Paris.....

EDITOR'S NOTE: David and Margaret Karthaus are sharing another trip with us. This time we can envy them as they spend April in Paris. The following is the first in a series of articles regarding their trip.

On April 3, 1992, David and Margaret boarded the American Airlines nonstop flight to Paris, France. We had been planning to do something big for our anniversary, which would be the next day, ever since our 29th anniversary. Every year since the 29th, about the time of our anniversary we had some minor or major family panic going on. Since most of our grandchildren were born in the first part of the year, this was the cause of some of the panics. So our trip got postponed at 30, 31, 31 and so on. As we got close to our 40th, we thought that we should wait and go then.

But as our 39th anniversary approached we decided it may be now or never. We made our normal reservations, only a car. We left on the 3rd of April as it was Friday and our anniversary was Saturday. Thirty nine years to the day! We had a car waiting at the Orly Airport to be picked up on Monday or Tuesday. We thought that even though Paris is a big city, we can stand it for 2 days. (If you have read some of our other articles, you know that we seldom go to big cities except to a certain place and then out again). So three days in Paris was really stretching our normal pattern.

After we landed in Paris, we checked our reservations with the auto leasing company and made arrangements to pick up the car in a few days. Our intent was to drive south of Paris in a wide circle covering the Loire valley which is chock full of castles and large estates. Also in this area were lace and crystal factories and of course these were on the agenda. These are the normal things we like to see as we take a trip. We were having so much fun in Paris that we called Monday and postponed picking up the car until Wednesday. We called Wednesday and cancelled the car.

We really enjoyed Paris so much that it is high on our list of places we would like to go back and spend a week or more, and sometime really go to the Loire Valley.

You might be familiar with the song, "April in Paris". It sounds so romantic and beautiful that Paris must be the place to be in April. As we left the Orly airport about 10 a.m., the temperature was in the low 30's and the evening before when we left DFW the temperature was in the 80's. Our first thought was "It's too cold to be romantic".

We caught an airport bus to downtown Paris at the airport. We

were heading to a small hotel that was recommended to us by our daughter's friend. Martha and her friend came to the airport to see us off. The friend asked "Where are you staying?" and we started mumbling something about looking for a B&B (bed and breakfast) signs or whatever they are called in France. The friend gave us the name of a hotel that was a few steps from the Arc de Triumph. Being that close to such a famous landmark we had visions of very high prices, but you only have your 30th anniversary on your 39th just once. So why not? David (who had studied French in high school and college) thought that with the help of our handy translator, that he could navigate in French. He did fairly well and got better and better as the week went on, but that first day he had to resort to finding a telephone booth to get the address and telephone number. A call to the front desk secured us a room but trying to give the cab driver the address was a chore.

The cab crossed the Seine River within a few blocks of the bus station and in another block took a left turn onto the Champs Elysees. As we drove down the Champs toward the Arc de Triumph, we thought back to the very hot and dry day on Saturday, April 4, 1953 in Santa Anna. We noticed a little difference in the scenery. True to Martha's friend's word, the cab entered the circle that goes around the arch and took the second right which took us to our hotel. It was indeed just a few hundred feet from the Arch.


The hotel was very pleasant also warm and friendly but fairly small. The rate for the room seemed astronomically high since you could buy 580 francs for the dollar. Five or six hundred of anything sounds high. We asked the friendly desk clerk what was the best way to see Paris. He suggested that we go around the Arch (we really had to go underneath) to a street almost opposite of us to the Tourist Information Center. So after going to our room and changing out of our travel clothes, we went immediately to the Tourist Center. When we found the correct street the third or fourth building on the left was the Tourist Information Center. There after reading the sign and advertisements we decided to purchase three day metro passes which enabled us to ride the public transportation in Paris as often and as far as we could. We also bought a three day Museum pass. This Museum pass enabled us to go in almost every museum and historical site free of charge. This was such a good deal that we bought the museum pass in England on our next trip. We think we saved money in both places but in Paris we really got our money's worth.

The three day passes seemed ideal since we would be able to see Paris Saturday, Sunday and Monday and use the ticket for the last time going back to the airport to pick up the car. What we did Monday instead was to go back and buy another set of 3-day passes. After these purchases we noticed that it was mid afternoon.

We spent the rest of the first day visiting the Arc de Triumph and the nearby vicinity. We were still not hungry even at dinner time because of all the food on the plane, so our anniversary spread comprised of a bowl of soup. Even the few crackers we had for lunch seemed to be too much. Since this had been a fairly long day, we returned to the hotel about dusk and got things ready for the next day.

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
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

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Social Security Conducts Test Mailing Of Earnings, Benefit Estimates

Don't be surprised if you find a statement from Social Security in your mailbox showing your earnings record and giving you estimates of the benefits for which you and your family might qualify, both now and in the future, says Eric Johnagin, Social Security Manager in Brownwood.

The Social Security Administration (SSA) is sending Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statements to approximately 600,000 randomly selected persons between 25 and 64 who are not currently receiving Social Security benefits. This mailing began in early April and continue into June.

Johnagin says the purpose of the test mailing is to gauge the resources needed to manage future earnings and benefit estimate mailing workloads, and to obtain early public reaction to the statements.

Next year, Social Security will begin mailing annual earnings and benefit estimate statements to ap-

proximately 6.7 million people who are 60 or older and not receiving Social Security benefits based on their own earnings record. In each year from 1996 through 1999, Social Security will send statements to individuals as they reach age 60.

And beginning in the year 1999, about 123 million people of all ages—majority of the American workforce—will receive an earnings and benefit estimate statement from Social Security each year. The information contained on the statement can be of great value in financial planning. Workers can see the level of financial protection immediately available for themselves and their families should they die or be-

come disabled and unable to continue working.

The statements also allow workers to make retirement plans based on a knowledge of what Social Security benefits they will receive and what additional income they will need to supplement those benefits.

"Anyone can request a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement by calling Social Security's toll-free number 1-800-772-1213," says Johnagin.

Johnagin noted that it's also a good idea for workers to check their earnings information at least once every three years to verify that what has been reported for their record is correct.

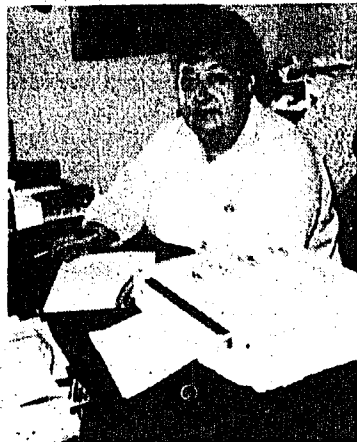

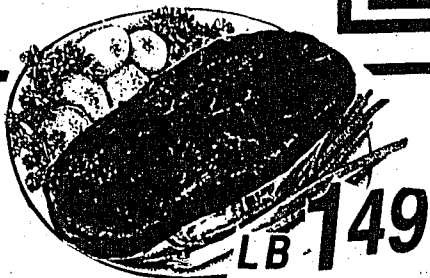

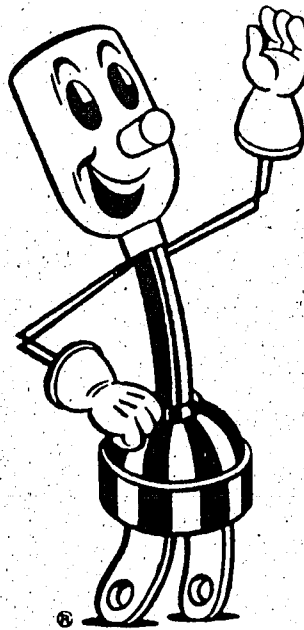
