DirectTv Installation Has Begun, Wireless Cable To Be Ready In September

Expanded television viewing is all but here for citizens of Coleman County and surrounding area. With the installation of a 300 foot transmission tower in late April subsequent wireless cable and DirecTv equipment, folks around here will soon be able to enjoy state-of-the-art programing.

Coleman County Broadcasting Systems, a fully-owned subsidiary of Coleman County Telephone Cooperative with offices in Santa Anna, is managed by Jerry Ellis, who says wireless TV cable will be operational by September 1st, barring unforeseen delays in equipment arrivals. "We are trying to provide extra channels for our rural people," he said. He commented that it will be more of a service than a money-making operation, and an alternative to the cable TV in town.

Earlier this year, the F.C.C. allotted Coleman County Systems

frequencies. They are presently in the process of obtaining two more frequencies. On March 29th the F.C.C. approved the building of the 300 foot transmission tower on top of Santa Anna Mountain, that is visible from far and near. The tower construction was completed in late April. The tower has space for 15 transmit antennas, two for wireless transmission, two for the Telephone Cooperative, two used by Coleman County Water Supply Corp. and the remainder available

for leasing. The basic package for wireless Cable TV includes nine channels, CNN, Fox Network, ESPN, Learning, Discovery, Family Channel, TNT, KTVT, CMTV, and an optional premium of Showtime. Tentative prices are \$15.00 monthly for nine channels and \$10.00 monthly for the optional premium. There is a \$300 charge for the equipment plus installation.

of approximately 150 channels of popular programing," Jerry Ellis says. He is especially enthusiastic about the DirectTV, which is a new satellite television service from Hughes Electronics with sports, education, and more. He says its all delivered through an 18inch satellite dish so small it can be mounted on the eaves of your house. Two units are already in operation. One is set up at the Telephone Cooperative office and Ellis says the reception is remarkable. The franchise and exclusive programing rights were purchased from National Rural Communications Cooperative. According to Ellis, Coleman County Broadcasting Systems will be the exclusive providers for subscribers in Coleman, Brown, Runnels, Callahan and southern Taylor counties. Equipment is

The basic package offered by C.C.B.S. will cost \$15.95 per month with additional charges of packages ranging from \$21.95 to \$29.95, the latter to be offered sometime in the fall of the year.

Ellis explained that three technological "firsts" make DirecTv different and highly appealing, especially to rural residents. He says the satellite's signal is digital, which means, "it will produce crystal clear TV pictures and compac disc quality sound." "Secondly," he says, "the signal is compressed, meaning each satellite can carry more channels than ever before possible, and, thirdly, the signal's strength eliminates the need for a large motorized dish to bring in the signal." The dish is mall enough to mount under an eave, on a railing or any convenient location. "Its also virtually maintenance free," says Ellis. "Once its installed, you may never need to adjust it again." Cost for the dish and decoder box is expected to be in the neighborhood of \$700.

Coleman County Broadcasting Systems office is located at 801 South Santa Fe. The present staff includes Jerry Ellis, manager, James Allen, installer, and Janice Fellers, office manager. More employees will be added as business gets into full swing.

The proposal surfaced during an emergency Senate Criminal Justice Committee hearing ordered by Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, saying he feared the state jail program, scheduled to begin Sept. 1, was starting off badly.

"This is a real opportunity to get back to the concept we intended for state jails and to do some real community justice," said committee Chairman John Whitmire, D-Houston.

Passed by the Legislature more than a year ago, the state jail system will divert nonviolent inmates - such as drug offenders, hot check writers and car thieves from hard-core prisons. Instead, they will be subject to a variety of community-based programs, including job training, public works projects, boot camps, literacy programs and family counseling.

Carol Vance, chairman of the Texas Criminal Justice Board, which oversees prisons, told the committee that there were no real problems with the program.

He said the Beaumont prison unit, whose construction has been hampered by rail delays, would be opened by October. By that time, about 100 to 200 offenders would be sentenced to the state jails program, Vance said.

Campaign Spending Reports The campaigns of Democratic Gov. Ann Richards and Republican George W. Bush have filed new campaign finance reports with the Texas Ethics Commission.

Richards reported raising \$3.1 million and spending \$1.75 million between Feb. 27 and June 30.

During the same four-month period, Bush raised \$3.7 million and spent \$1.4 million. Both candidates appear to have wellfunded bank accounts for the fall campaign.

Reports filed by the governor since July 1991 show her having raised more than \$12 million and spending about \$6.7 million.

Bush, who announced his campaign last fall, has reported raising about \$7.4 million and spending more than \$2.6 million.

Prussic Acid Poisoning By Marty Gibbs

Several cases of prussic acid poisoning have occurred in Taylor County in the last few weeks of cattle grazing forage sorghums. We are experiencing prime weather conditions for prussic acid poisoning if we get some rainfall on our drought stressed forage crops and in pastures with lots of johnson grass.

Generally we associate prussic acid poisoning with livestock grazing sudan, sorghum-sudan hybrids or Johnson grass which has been subjected to a killing frost in the fall. However, prussic acid may also accumulate to toxic levels in these plants when rain causes new growth in drought stressed plants.

Prussic acid (hydrocyanic acid) is not found in large quantities in healthy growing plants. The acid develops only when the normal growth of plants has been retarded or stopped by drought, wilting, trampling, bruising or following a frost. New growth of drought stressed sorghums stimulated by rain showers may become especially dangerous if eaten by animals. Highest prussic acid generally occurs about a week about showers stimulate new growth of stunted plants.

Producers should wait about two weeks after a rain shower before grazing to let the plants become healthy again and allow the prussic acid to dissipate. When cutting sorghums for hay during drought stress periods, allow the hay to sun dry for three or four days before baling into air-tight bales. Sun drying of sorghum hays will allow the acid to dissipate.

There is a test to determine the prussic acid content of sorghum forages. The sample should be taken from across the field making sure to collect forages from several different stages of plant growth until you have a bundle about five to six inches thick. Take a knife and cut a half inch slice across the leafiest section of the bundle and place the cross section in an air-tight plastic bag inside a styrofoam

cooler. The accuracy of the test depends on the freshness of the sample. Test forms are available at the county extension office. These tests will tell you the prussic acid content of that sample on that day. Therefore, the tests are not that reliable. The recommendation for producers is to keep livestock out of sorghum forage fields for two weeks after a rain or after a killing frost in the fall to allow the prussic acid to dissipate. For more information or to have a sample tested, call the county extension office.

Pasture To Packer Program Planned By Marty Gibbs, CEA-AG

The second edition of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's popular Pasture to Packer Program starts September 6-8 at the Denis Feedlot near Vancourt. The program gives sheep producers a look at the performance and carcass characteristics of their lambs and the factors influencing the animals' value. It also familiarizes producers with lamb feeding and retained ownership as an alternative marketing method. Over 1,200 lambs completed last year's test.

Animals must be nominated by August 10. A non-refundable \$3.00 per head charge is due at time of nomination. Individual lambs must weigh at least 60 pounds at delivery. Consignors may enter a minimum of 10 and a maximum of 20 lambs. Only wether and ewe lambs will be fed.

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, the Texas A&M University Department of Animal Science and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are sponsoring the program in cooperation with Denis Feedlot, Monfort, Inc. and Angelo State University.

Food Safety Tips For The Summer By Carol Katzer, CEA-H.E.

Consumers should be very aware of food safety precautions during the summer when outdoor activities such as picnics, campouts and cookouts are popular.

Often these activities involve food. Unfortunately, the incidence of foodborne illness also seems to rise during these months. Bacteria that cause foodborne illness grow best at warm weather temperatures, specially at "danger zone temperatures" between 40 degrees Fahrenheit and 140 degrees

Fahrenheit.

Foods that are most perishable are called "red flag" foods. They are such as poultry, meats, eggs, milk products, seafood, cream pies and custards. Red flag items also include such foods as fried chicken and hard-cooked or deviled eggs-foods that are sometimes misunderstood as being non-perishable.
