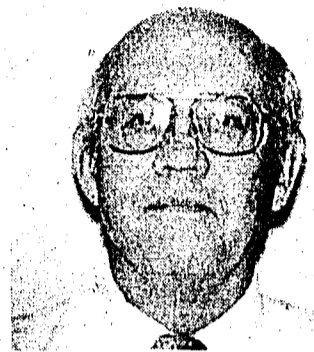

1994 Homecoming Honorees



Elvis Cozart
 Ex-Student of the Year

Elvis Cozart has been named Ex-Student of the Year for the 1994 Homecoming.

Following his graduation from Santa Anna High School in 1944, he enrolled at Texas A&M University where he attended college until enlisting in the U. S. Navy in 1946. Following his discharge from the Navy in 1948, Cozart returned to A&M where he obtained a Bachelor of Science degree in Agronomy in June, 1950.

Elvis immediately enrolled in graduate school at A&M where in September of 1952 he completed the academic requirements for his masters degree in Soil Chemistry/Soil Fertility.

He worked as a summer employee with the Coleman County Soil Conservation Service in 1948.

Following his graduation in 1952 until 1955 Elvis was employed as an assistant agronomist by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Angleton.

In November 1955 he began work as a research agronomist for the Organic Products Division of the then Bioproducts Division of the Dow Chemical Company in Freeport and Lake Jackson where he remained until January of 1967. At that time Cozart accepted employment as a research agronomist with Gulf Research and Development Company in Harnesville, Pennsylvania. He was transferred in January of 1970 to the Crop Protection Chemicals Division of Gulf Oil Chemical Company in Merriam Kansas until July of that year, when he was promoted to Research and Development Representative. He was subsequently transferred to Albany, Georgia. The new position entailed a close liaison with the Land Grant Universities in the southeast United States.

In June of 1980, Elvis accepted employment with the Texas Department of Agriculture as a Research Specialist. His initial assignment was to assess the impact of the recently enacted Federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act on agriculture. Other assignments dealt with state regulations affecting the use of pesticides.

He ended his career with the Texas Department of Agriculture as Coordinator, Special Pesticides Registrations on September 30, 1993.

For service to agriculture/supporting industries during his employment with the Texas Department of Agriculture, commendatory plaques were awarded to Cozart by the West Texas Agricultural Chemicals Institute, Texas Agricultural Aviation Association, Texas Vegetable Association, Texas Corn Producers Board and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Cozart has been married to the former Reba Fay Haynes 46 years and they are the parents of three children, Philip Donovan, Grethryn Fay and Linda Louise.

Elvis and Reba are dividing their retirement between their home in Round Rock and their farms in the Trickham and Whon communities of Coleman County.

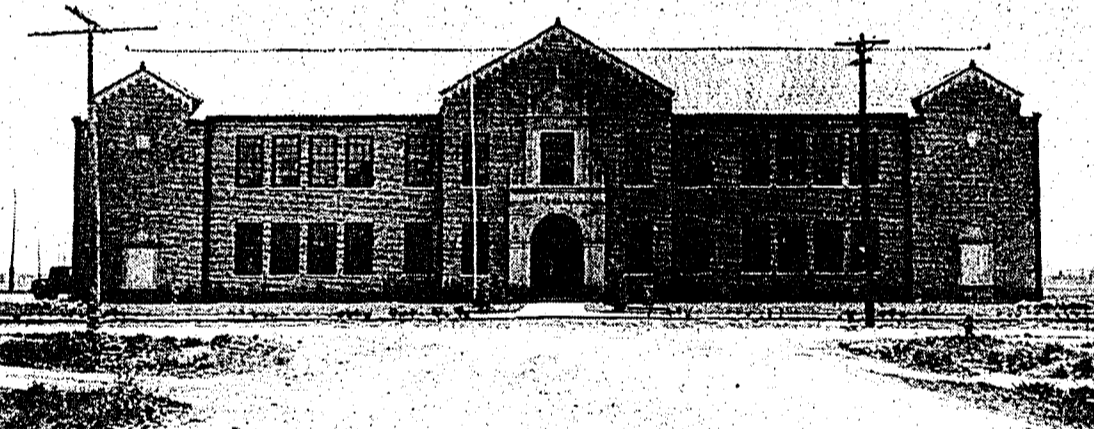

Santa Anna Elementary School and Santa Anna High School at the turn of the century. The high school building at the right was also called "the college." According to an article in "A History of Coleman County and its People" the building was erected in about 1890 at a cost of \$4,000. The article doesn't tell us when the elementary school was built, however a new grammar school building was constructed near the same site (where the armory now stands) in the 1920's. The first school in Santa Anna was taught by a man named Fry, about 1880, the building of one room construction being southeast of the stores by a half mile. In 1884 there was a small school house which was 14 feet square. It was located where these building were later built and was also used for preaching services, Sunday school, and for public meetings of all kinds.



Santa Anna High School pictured not long after it was constructed in about 1926-27. Santa Anna was classified as a first class high school in 1911 and was fully accredited with the universities of the state in 1914.

About Your Health

GERD

(Gastroesophageal Reflux Disease)

"Heartburn" and a bitter/sour taste that occurs during sleep, while bending over, or during lifting is caused by stomach contents flowing upward into the esophagus (the tube connecting mouth to stomach). With each occurrence, the person usually takes an antacid which gives only minimal or short-term relief.

People with GERD find themselves on a treadmill of indigestion; some relief, indigestion again. Those with night time GERD often find that elevating the head of the bed on 2" blocks, or sleeping in a semi-upright position gives partial or total relief.

This disorder is caused by laxity of the ring of muscle (the lower esophageal sphincter), that is just above the stomach. This laxity allows the esophagus where it enters the stomach, to remain partially open.

GERD will cause inflammation of the esophagus leading to chronic pain and can allow the stomach contents to be inhaled into the trachea (the windpipe) causing serious complications.

People with GERD can find complete relief of their symptoms with a combination of two medications. One medication increases the tone of the esophagus sphincter keeping it securely closed; and another medication, commonly used for ulcer disease, that causes the cells of the stomach to secrete less acid.

With this combination, those suffering from GERD find themselves free of the pain that has become their constant companion.

You Have A Voice In Government

As we approach the November General Election, I am concerned with the amount of voter apathy and disinterest in the electoral process in the State of Texas. The most fundamental right we have in our democratic system of government is the freedom to vote. That freedom stands as an invitation to take part in a government where the supreme power is vested in the people and exercised by them directly and indirectly at the ballot box. But, only half of the Texas electorate registered to vote take part in the system.

If we are to successfully address the policy issues in this state and nation, we must first address the issues of voter apathy and voter disinterest. We must aggressively and emphatically attack the conveniently and popularly held political fictions that government is not responsive to the people, and that one individual vote does not make a difference in the outcome of an election. I characterize these as political fictions, because we know they simply are not true.

Television has brought us amazing footage from around the world. Pictures that prove that the economic and political philosophy of this country--our country--is intellectually, emotionally and spiritually preferred. In 1989 we observed the dissolution of a communist Soviet Union. Shortly thereafter, we witnessed the citizens of East and West Germany tearing down the Berlin wall. This very year we were spectators to the most inspiring elections in history as the citizens of South Africa went to the ballot box to vote in the first open, free and all race election in their history. And who can forget the record number of people turning out to vote in Mexico. In each case, these countries used our govern-

ment as their prototype. Ultimately, they want what you and I have--a voice in government.

Individuals with practically little or no political portfolio and of modest means have altered the course of history and changed the world in which they lived. It is disputable that measures such as civil rights, voting rights and equal rights have radically changed the power individuals have to change the community and ultimately the country in which they live. Mohandas Ghandi in India, Dr. Martin Luther King and Caesar Chavez in the United States and Nelson Mandela in South Africa changed the world in which they lived through their action. The common denominator in each case was determination. Determination to have a voice in their government and consequently a voice in their day to day lives.

You have a voice in government. A government for the people and by the people. Declining to exercise your voice in that system leads to a passive surrender to the status quo. If you find a failing within your government, take a good look at your activity in its process, and when you find a flaw in it address it on the next election day at the ballot box. Your vote is your voice.

Lack of participation is not confined in Texas. It's a national problem. Let your voice be heard at all levels of government. Dwight D. Eisenhower said it best, "There is nothing wrong with America that the faith, love of freedom, intelligence and energy of her citizens cannot cure."

AUSTIN — By letting stand a ruling by the First Circuit Court of Appeals, the U.S. Supreme Court last week gave El Paso's Tigua Indian tribe hope of bringing Las Vegas-style gambling to Texas.

The state appealed an order by U.S. District Judge Lucius D. Bunton III for Texas to negotiate with the tribe for a casino agreement.

The U.S. Supreme Court upheld a ruling by Boston's First Circuit Court of Appeals, which ordered Rhode Island to negotiate with the Narragansett Indians, allowing the tribe to build a casino on tribal lands. An identical case is pending in the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans, according to Tom Diamond, attorney for the Tiguas.

If the Tiguas get their casino, it will be easier to sell the idea of having casino gambling in other cities, said Lloyd Criss, president of the Texas Association for Casino Entertainment.

Criss told *The Dallas Morning News*, "...every other city in Texas is going to want to get in on the economic benefits that casinos bring."

Other Highlights

Despite a combined 80 invitations to debate, some political observers believe Gov. Ann Richards and her Republican opponent George W. Bush will only make one joint appearance prior to the Nov. 8 election. So far, both have agreed to one debate scheduled for Oct. 21 in Dallas.

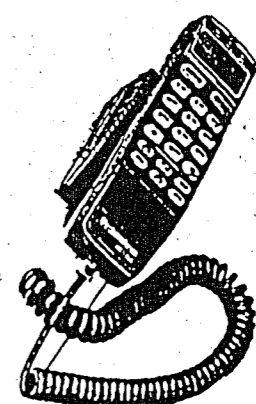




