

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



About Your Health

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE (Hypertension)

Hypertension is highly prevalent in the United States. It is a disease that has no symptoms in its early stages, with serious consequences later in life. Because of these consequences, stroke, kidney damage, destruction of the retina of the eyes, heart disease; it is beneficial to periodically have your blood pressure checked.

Should a check disclose a high reading, this does not mean that you have hypertension. One elevated reading is not diagnostic of hypertension. If the reading is high, serial blood pressures should be taken a minimum of three times over a five day period. If the recordings are all high, hypertension is diagnosed.

The vast majority of cases prove to be primary hypertension, the cause is unknown. In a small number of instances, physical exam and laboratory work demonstrates that the cause of the hypertension is a definable, curable disease. However, as already stated, the majority prove to be primary for which there is no cure, but control with treatment.

With appropriate drug therapy, the blood pressure is controlled and the long-term consequences are avoided. After the appropriate therapy has been established, and it is has been demonstrated that the blood pressure is under good control, it is necessary only to have periodic evaluation to determine if control is continuing; if not, a change in therapy is instituted.

The best defense against hypertension is to maintain good body weight and exercise daily. Whenever exercise is mentioned, most people's eyes glaze over and the hearing becomes highly selective. People simply do not like to exercise. At the word "exercise" people envision pain, discomfort and mind-numbing activity. To maintain your cardiovascular system you do not have to run until you drop, pump iron like Arnold, or hop around the room with Richard. Daily walks at a vigorous pace are excellent for awakening the lazy body. You will discover that you begin to feel more energetic, that your walks become longer, and you rediscover the quiet enjoyment of a walk through the neighborhood or down the country road. You will become more vigorous, more happy and more healthy.

Coleman Resident Killed In San Angelo Shooting

A 20-year old Coleman man was shot to death in San Angelo during a confrontation with a local gang last Wednesday night while visiting family and friends.

Rodney Taylor was pronounced dead at 12:55 a.m. Thursday at Shannon Medical Center approximately two hours after being shot in the back with a small caliber handgun.

Ramon Armando Salazar, 19, was arrested at 7:45 p.m. on Friday at his residence on North Van Buren about a block from the location of the shooting.

Salazar is being held in Tom Green County Jail in lieu of \$50,000 bond. The murder weapon was recovered, processed and sent to ballistics.

Each year, over 70,000 acres of small grains are planted in Coleman County for grazing and grain production. Small grains are the largest cultivated crop grown in Coleman County.

A wheat production meeting to discuss new varieties of small grains and disease control will be held on Tuesday, August 16 at 11 a.m. in the club room of the Coleman County State Bank Building. Dr. Billy Warrick, Agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service from San Angelo and Dr. Travis Miller, Extension Small Grains Specialist with Texas A&M University in College Station will be here to discuss several topics dealing with small grains. Topics include the selection of small grains—a comparison of wheat, oats and triticale; a discussion of forage versus grain production; and cultural practices for disease prevention. An evaluation of last year's wheat variety test on the Anthony Strawn farm will also be included. The meeting will conclude at approximately 1:30 p.m.

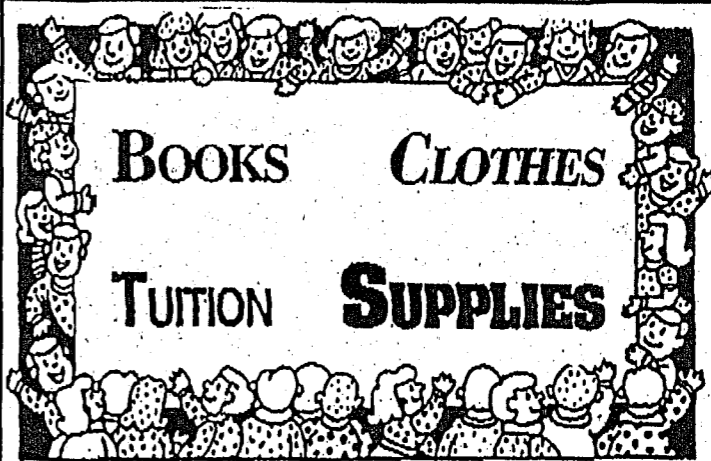

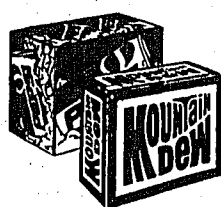
