HDO Realizes A Goal

One goal of the Santa Anna Historical Development Organization was realized last week when papers were signed making the organization owners of the old "W.R. Kelly building" on Wallis Ave.

Assisted by previous negotiations between Derrell Warnock and the owner of the building which helped lay the groundwork for completion of negotiations by Rod Musick, chairman of the HDO, Musick was able to finally close the deal last week for buying the building. An anonymous donor contributed the \$1,500 for the purchase.

According to officials of the HDO, when put back into shape the building will be used for a civic center with a meeting room which will accommodate 100 people. The organization also plans for display

and sales of Comanche Indian arts and crafts. The center will be a place for such cultural activities as performances by Comanche and Cowboy poets and other artisans.

The Historical Development Organization is open to donations from other interested people who would like to see the group proceed with plans for renovation of the old landmark building.

Musick said a matching grant has been applied for thru TxDOT for funds to help with the restoration of the building. Any other donations as well as the purchase price can be the local group's basis for the required matching funds. The TxDOT grants are geared to helping communities which have been impacted by the interstate highway system and is primarily awarded for historical buildings.

City Council Approves New WTU Franchise, Talks About Revenue Shortfall

The Santa Anna City Council met in their regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, October 11 with Mayor Gale Brock and Councilpersons Jim Spillman, Danny Kellar, Karen Morris and Bobby Morgan. Also present were City Secretary Alys Pelton, City Superintendent Tommy Jackson, Chief of Police Carlos Torres, and visitors Robert Noriega, Mrs. C. E. Wise, Mr. and Mrs. James Ellerbe, Sr. and Sylvia and Vernon Herring.

Mrs. C. E. Wise appeared before the council asking if something could be done with the FFA pigs across the street from her. The odor and flies were annoying. The city ordinance allows FFA and 4-H animals in town if the pen area is kept clean and a permit is on file at City Hall. Tommy Jackson will check with the agriculture teacher regarding this.

Robert Noriega, manager of the West Texas Utilities, presented the council with an ordinance regarding West Texas Utilities' franchise renewal. The current franchise ends in September, 1995. The current franchise dated in 1925 was for 50 years. The new franchise, which was approved, will be for 40 years. Councilman Danny Kellar in

formed the council that the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. has hired Main Street Coordinator Rod Musick. Musick will spending approximately fifty percent of his time on the Main Street Program and the historical development of Santa Anna. The City's contribution will be reduced to \$500 per month from the current \$800. The \$500 will be set aside for a part-time secretary or new computer in the future.

The two teams are also tied at 3-4 for the season. Should be a good game!!


School Board Tables Track Discussion, Adopts Morals And Ethics Resolution

One of the main agenda items when the Santa Anna school board met last week, was the consideration of bids submitted for renovation of the track facilities. Due to a variety of options in the specifications, the some 14 bids were quite varied and will require some studying to sort through. The board tabled any action subject to a retreat work session which was scheduled for the 12th of November at Kirkland's on Lake Brownwood.

According to Superintendent Jim McPherson, at the retreat meeting the board will not only consider the track bids, but will also look at, discuss, and perhaps prioritize a list of eleven "wants". The list, which includes the track project, has been drawn up by the board with input from faculty and school patrons.

Graveside services were held at 1:30 p.m. Sunday in Eastlawn Memorial Park, directed by Davis-Morris Funeral Home.



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


Jones Wins Frenzy

The Santa Anna Mountaineers did not allow rain to stop them in their homecoming win over Lometa 44-8.

Although rain fell throughout the game, the Mountaineers racked up 445 yards rushing and 17 first downs. Anthony Thomas rushed for 154 yards on 26 carries while scoring three touchdowns on runs of 4, 2, and 2 yards. FB Manuel Frausto gained 193 yards on nine runs including a 57 yard scoring run.

The Mountaineer defense led by William Loyd, Mark Yancy, Lee Keeney and Tom Guthrie held the Lometa Hornets to 78 total yards and five first downs. Lometa's only score came in the second quarter on Juan Castro's six-yard run.

According to Head Coach John Smith, "We played real well against them. We pounded them between the tackles. Our

defense was real good. We told our kids to have fun on homecoming and they responded."


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Morals And Ethics Resolution, SAISD



A school patron met with the board requesting a change in the types of snacks dispensed in machines on the campus. She felt more nutritious snacks should be made available, or the machines removed altogether. The site-base team will take the matter under advisement and report back to the board.

As required by state law, the board will for a Size Waiver for the fourth grade class which is one student over the mandated teacher-student ratio.

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




