Board Studies Possible Track Renovation

All members of the school board were present for the regular monthly meeting of the group on Tuesday evening, August 9th.

Several visitors were in attendance and one school patron spoke to the board concerning quality of education. One or two others in the audience echoed the man's sentiments. Board president Marty Donham responded that steps were being taken to correct the specific issue with which the parent was concerned.

Several persons spoke in favor of a track renovation project, discussion of which took up most of the meeting time.

Everette Wilkins, a track consultant-designer-project manager, from San Antonio, gave his report on his inspection on July 28th of the present track facilities at the high school.

Mr. Wilkins' recommendations were to convert the existing 440 yard installation, which is in dire need of much repair or renovation, to a proper 400 meter track which would entail:

- (1) Addressing and possible replacement or relocation of light standards.
- (2) Site Survey and soils test.
- (3) Removal of the existing track and curbing.
- (4) Reshaping of the football field (or merely the sideline areas).
- (5) Addressing the drainage system.
- (6) Installation of new curb/gutter.
- (7) Installation of new curbing.
- (8) Installation of concrete based field event areas.
- (9) Base stabilization.
- (10) Installation of flexible base material.
- (11) Installation of new hot mix asphaltic concrete leveling course.
- (12) Installation of a synthetic running service.
- (13) Painting of permanent lane lines and events markings and decorations.

According to Wilkins the cost range for a new seven lane (42' each) track will range from \$140,000 to \$175,000. He estimated that as much as 25% of the cost could be saved if the

construction is contracted for the winter months. He also said the project could be completed for less than \$150,000 excluding the lights. Coach John Smith observed that money taken in at events held at the facility would not pay for the renovations but could very easily pay for basic maintenance of the track once installed. The board tossed around several avenues of financing the project but came up with no firm plan. It was acknowledged that nothing of real substance has been done to the facilities since 1982.

After a lengthy discussion, the board agreed for Mr. Wilkins to take the project through to the bidding stage. If no bids are taken he will be paid to that point. If bids are accepted, he will be paid for specifications.

Whether or not to proceed with the project will be a decision made at a later date after further study.

Some board members wanted to develop a projection plan for other possible needs of the school district before making decisions about the track project.

It was agreed to have a projection plan to discuss by the board's October meeting.

Council Sets Tax Rate, Approves Zoning Ordinance

The Santa Anna City Council met Monday night, August 15, to approve a tax rate of 71.63 cents per \$100 valuation. The new rate is a slight increase over last year's rate of 70.62 cents.

The council also approved a zoning ordinance dividing the city into four zones: Residential, Apartment, Business and Industrial districts. A public hearing on the zoning ordinance will be held in conjunction with the council's next regular monthly meeting scheduled for 6:30 p.m. September 13th at the Santa Anna Telephone Cooperative building.

A map showing the zoning districts may be found on page four along with a legal notice concerning the ordinance.

The ordinance is in effect upon publication of the legal notice.

The council was informed that rebinding is being done on an old ordinance book dating back to the time of the city's incorporation in 1906. Ordinances contained in the book were handwritten.

The Santa Anna City Council met in regular session on Tuesday, August 9 and agreed to initiate the hotel/motel occupancy tax beginning October 1. The rate will be five percent. (See legal notice inside).

\$418,377.08 and expenses of \$427,094.24 with other non-operating expenses of \$56,262.89 for a net loss of \$64,980.05 with the depreciation of \$82,807.00. The Utility Fund ended the year with an income of \$17,826.95. The General Fund had a net income of \$24,935.55 with revenues being \$153,791.12 and expenses of \$150,072.62 plus other transfers in and out.

The Santa Anna Historical Development Organization appeared before the Council requesting a resolution from the City for a Texas Department of Transportation grant to fix the Dr. J. P. Jones building that the organization is purchasing. The resolution states that the City is committed to put in local matching funds of \$7,700 or 20% of the

grant for the project. Fund may be in the form of labor, equipment or dollar amounts.

A zoning ordinance was presented to the council for review but was tabled until August 15.

The Brown County Water Improvement District has increased the City's water rate to .6005 per thousand gallons from the old rate of .5790. Increase to the City will be approximately \$300 to \$400 per year.

Tommy Jackson reported to the council that the police department will be moved this week and the insurance office will move into the old police department. City hall will be moving in the near future. The City crew has been repairing water lines and patching streets this month.

The office of Santa Anna Chief of Police Carlos Torres is now located on Wallis Avenue in the building formerly occupied by Countywide Insurance. Countywide's has relocated to the police department's former location on 2nd street.

The building which houses the new police department office was recently purchased by the City. Renovations have been underway to accommodate the City's needs and following further work. City Hall will be moved to the new location on Wallis Avenue.

Health Problems Force Methodist Pastor To Take Medical Leave

The Rev. David Tidd, pastor of Santa Anna United Methodist Church, has taken a medical leave and has moved with his family to Fort Worth until his health permits him to return to the ministry. The Santa Anna appointment also includes pastorate of the Methodist congregations at Trickham and Valera.

Announcement of Tidd's leave was made Sunday with pastors to be provided each week by the

District Superintendent of the Brownwood District until a replacement is named.

The Rev. Tidd, a native of New York, served the local church since June of 1993. He and his wife, Kathy, were active in the community, and their son, Andy, was a spring graduate of Santa Anna High School.

Tidd said he hopes to be re-appointed to Santa Anna when health permits.

Coleman County Appraisal District Reviews Current Budget Items

All members of the Coleman County Appraisal District Board were present for the Monday, August 15 meeting, held at the District office in Coleman. In addition to routine business, Chief Appraiser Bill Jones gave a report of tax collections for the months of June and July, showing a total of over \$220,000, more than two percent ahead of the same two-month period last year. Panther Creek ISD leads in collection averages with 94 percent. In a review of the current budget, Jones expects one item to be over the budgeted amount, with the total expenditures to be well within the budget. Funds remaining at the end of each fiscal are returned to the taxing entities in the proportion paid to the Appraisal District. It was reported that the 1993 tax hearings were held in late June with most questions and problems resolved prior to hearing. The Board will meet on Monday, September 12, for a regular session and for the 1995 budget hearing. All interested people are invited to attend the 5 p.m. session at the District office in Coleman. Attending the Monday session were Barbara Kingsbery, chairman; Harold Skelton; Charles Yarbrough; D. G. Allen; and Billy McCrary.

Scarlet Fever

Scarlet Fever usually manifests in children or young adults as a complication of a "strep throat" or from a strep skin infection. It is not as common in years past, but it is still seen and because of its severe complications, an awareness of its signs and symptoms is important. Approximately half a day to two days before the rash of scarlet fever appears, there may be a sore throat, fever and a generalized "sick feeling". In severe cases, nausea, vomiting and joint pains may also be present. It should be remembered that two words not used in medicine are the words "always" and "never". With that in mind, scarlet fever can also present itself with very mild symptoms and little reason to suspect that the person is ill. The rash when it appears will first appear on the neck and upper body, then spread downward to involve the trunk and extremities, usually not appearing on the palms of the hands and soles of the feet. The rash is flat, red, and if pressure is applied to it with the fingers, the area will blanch. On the face it appears as a flush that does not involve the area around the lips. If scarlet fever arises from a skin infection the rash will be most intense surrounding the infected area. Complications of scarlet fever can be severe. They include meningitis, toxic shock, heart damage, kidney disease and joint destruction. Fortunately, strep is still one of the those bacteria against which antibiotics are very effective. With timely treatment the serious consequences are usually avoided and the illness rapidly regresses. A word of caution and a plea. Before the medications are completed the patient will feel well and believe that completing the therapy is unnecessary. **Please finish your medicines!** If you do not, the consequences of that action will surface later. Strep infections are serious. If the individual follows directions correctly, the illness can be a minor inconvenience; should directions be ignored, the future can be one of chronic illness, pain and shortened life. **Please finish your medications as directed!!!**

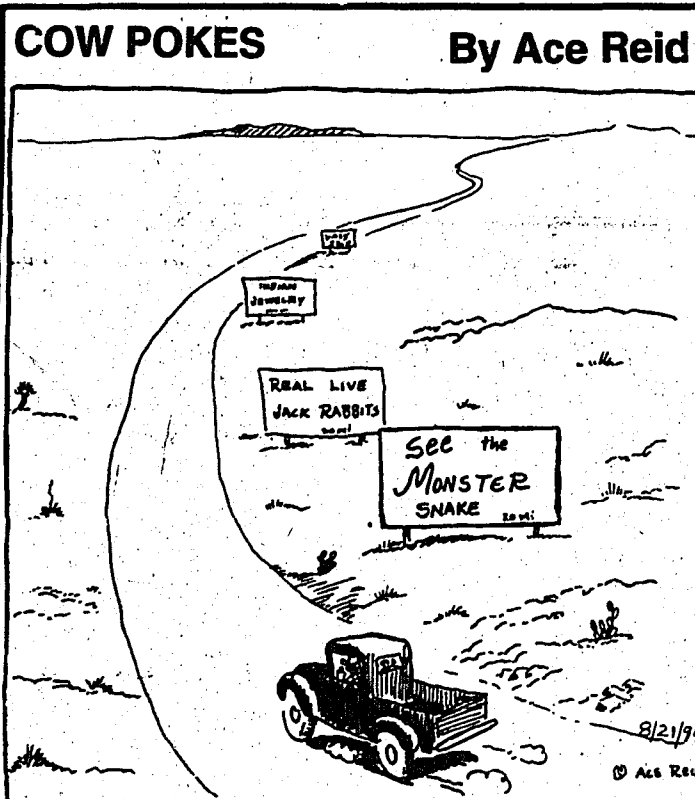

The collection of said taxes shall begin with business on October 1, 1994. Failure to report said tax shall be penalized by said hotel/motel paying 1% of said tax as penalty for each month or part of a month which said report is late or tax not paid.

The use of all funds received by the City of Santa Anna (from the tax) shall be restricted as provided for in Article 1269j-4.1, Section 3c.3; for advertising for general promotional and tourist advertising of the city and its vicinity and conducting solicitation and operating program to attract conventions and visitors either by the city or through contracts with other persons or organizations selected by the city; Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes. 33c

NOTICE OF PASSING OF ORDINANCE CITY OF SANTA ANNA

The City of Santa Anna passed and approved August 15, 1994, an ordinance to regulate and restrict the location and use of buildings, structures and land for industry, trade, residence or other purposes, and size of buildings and other structures, and density of population, and for said purposes to divide the municipality into districts of such number, shape and area as may be deemed best suited to carry out these regulations; to prescribe penalties for the violation of its provision and to provide for its enforcement.

In order to restrict the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings erected or altered for

specified uses, and to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings hereafter erected or altered, to regulate and determine the area of yards and other open spaces, and to regulate and limit the density of population the City of Santa Anna is hereby divided into districts of which there shall be four (4) known as:
"A" Residential District
"B" Apartment District
"C" Business District
"D" Industrial District

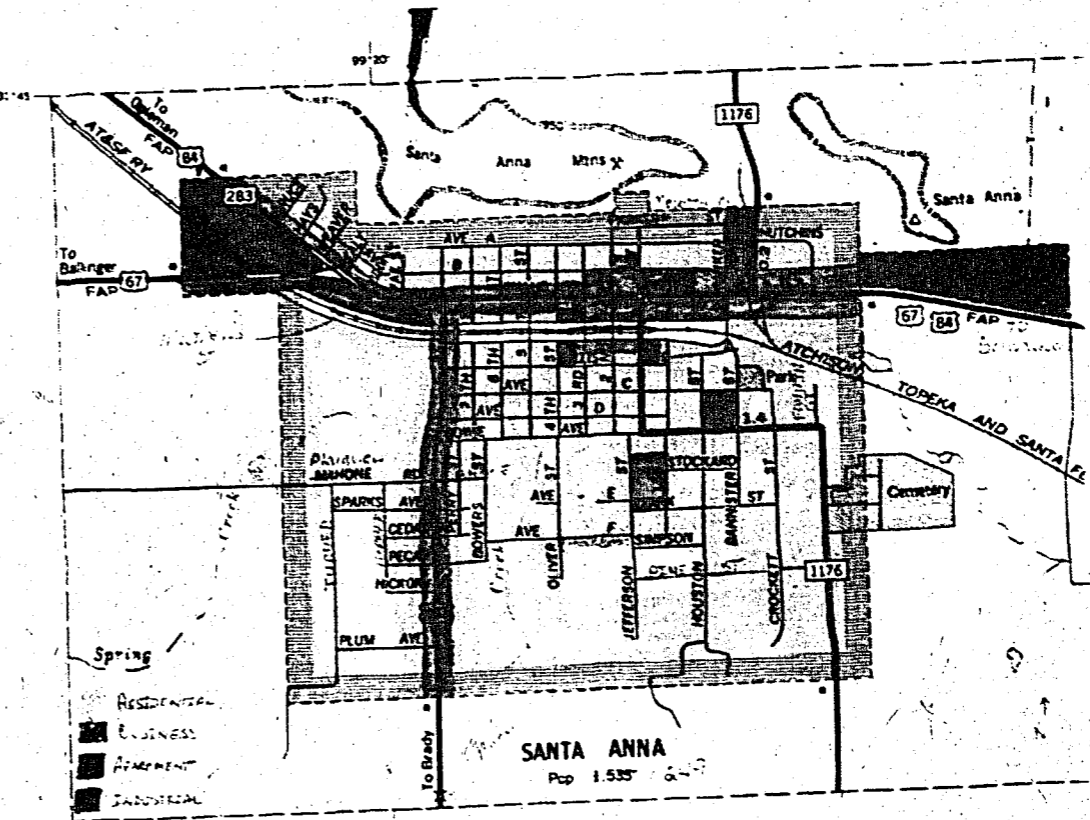
The districts aforesaid and the boundaries of such districts are shown upon the map attached hereto and made a part of this ordinance, being designated as the "District Map" and said map and all notations, references and other information shown thereon shall be a part of this ordinance as if

the matters and information set forth by the said map were fully described herein. Except for provisions stated in the ordinance.

Any person, firm or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects or refuses to comply with or who resists enforcement of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than five (5) dollars nor more than (50) dollars each offense. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

Passed and approved in regular session of the City Council this 15th day of August, 1994. 33c

WTU To Seek Review Of Revenue, Changes In Electric Rates

West Texas Utilities Company has announced it will file a petition with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) to start a process to review WTU's revenues, rule on proposed rate changes and implement lower interim electric charges to customers by 3.25%.

The petition, to be filed around August 25, will request that a review of WTU's revenues be conducted by the PUCT to determine if WTU's revenues should be adjusted. The petition proposes interim rates until the PUCT can complete this review.

Until a final PUCT order is implemented, interim changes to customers will be reduced by 3.25%, effective Oct. 1, 1994.

"The action to initiate this review process by WTU is quite remarkable since some other electric utilities have recently increased rates," said Glenn Files, WTU president and chief executive officer.

WTU's customers have not experienced a base rate increase since 1987, even though the overall cost of living has increased nearly 30% over that same period.

"WTU, however, has effectively managed the business and, as a result, we have remained financially strong. Our strong financial position has allowed us to be a key player with the communities we serve in economic development activities," Files said.

"The action we are announcing underscores our commitment to the growth and prosperity of the communities we serve," he added.

"Reasonable electric rates and rate options are important to our customers and to prospective customers. Therefore, WTU will use this process as an opportunity to introduce new rate options in response to market changes and modify or replace old rate options. These changes are necessary for WTU to continue to be responsive to the changing marketplace and to meet the needs of our customers," Files added.

"Our community has always had a commitment to ensuring that our rates are fair and that our customers are paying appropriate prices," he added.

"After reviewing our current and projected financial results and after discussions with the PUCT and others, we are announcing this action. The action will ensure that our customers benefit from activities that have resulted in efficiencies

At present, only Precinct 1 is legalized sale of beer and wine.

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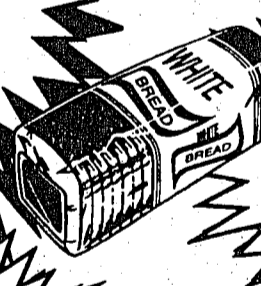


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
