Could Santana Have Been Indian Chief Whose Image Appeared On Gold Coin?

It's very exciting that Santa Anna has the "Santana" boulder
back. I think Rod and Montie deserve a standing ovation for the 650 mile quest to retrieve it. ${ }^{1}$
have been inspired by it to pick up the threads of some old leads and check them out. The resulls have been very interesting. My first impression of the profilie on the boulder was that it looked
similar to an Indian head coin. checked references on coins and found a coin I believe is very similar to the image on the boulder, a "half eagle" and "quarter eagle" gold coin issued by the U. S. Mint in the years
$1908-1929$. It was most curious 1908-1929. It was most curious on the boulder, Santana, was the spelling used by some who knew the chief. I thought at the time perhaps someone who remembered Santana/Santanna just used the image on the coin
as a model and I did not additional research.
When I saw your article with the photograph of the boulder a new question occurred to me, What if the image was taken
from a daguerreotype Santana?? Daguerreotypes were being made by a gallery in Washington when Santana visited Polk, but we have not been able

Except for Bolivia and Haiti; the United States has the lowest immunization rate in the weste
Childhood diseases can kill. Often even with survival of the child there are serious life-long complications. Measles, mumps and chicken pox are not ho-hum illinesses.
I remember when polio ran rampant across the United States. I have cousins who died from it and one who was permanenlly crippled
Hepatitis B infects and kills. Meastes can blind, destroy hearing and cause mental retardation. Mumps can cause deafness, kidney damage and sterility.

A recent Houston study revealed that while four out of five parents believe that their childs immuniza
There is an effort called "Shots Across Texas" that has as its goal to fully immunize $90 \%$ of Texas children from bith to age two by 1996. They are asking private businesses and the state of Texas to joinly sponsor commonity immomization events such as the ones that took place across the United Slates with the infrowman and senators requesting thei support and wort toward immunization goals. Medical doctors, physician assistants, family nurse practitioners and registered nurses are all ready to volemterer their time for community immunization days.
Texans can do anything they set their hearts and mind to accomplish. Parents, check your child's imminnization record. If they need
immumizations then get them. To know that Texans have allowed their children to live in such preventable danger is a disgrace to us all. Let us as Texans do right by the chilltren of Texas
