## Could Santana Have Been Indian Chief Whose Image Appeared On Gold Coin?

It's very exciting that Santa Anna has the "Santana" boulder back. I think Rod and Montie deserve a standing ovation for the 650 mile quest to retrieve it. I have been inspired by it to pick up the threads of some old leads and check them out. The results have been very interesting. My first impression of the profile on the boulder was that it looked similar to an Indian head coin. I checked references on coins and found a coin I believe is very similar to the image on the boulder, a "half eagle" and "quarter eagle" gold coin issued by the U. S. Mint in the years 1908-1929. It was most curious because the spelling of the name on the boulder, Santana, was the spelling used by some who knew the chief. I thought at the time perhaps someone who remembered Santana/Santanna just used the image on the coin as a model and I did not do additional research.

When I saw your article with the photograph of the boulder a new question occurred to me, What if the image was taken from a daguerreotype of Santana?? Daguerreotypes were being made by a gallery in Washington when Santana visited Polk, but we have not been able to find one identified as Santana.

Some people who knew Santana were still alive when the coin was issued and may have recognized it and talked about it. This could have inspired the stone mason/artist to create the monument. Were the stone masons working in Santa Anna Germans? Did they have friends and relatives in Fredericksburg?

I spoke with a person who is an expert on old coins. He first told me that models were used for most of the Indian head coins. After checking his sources he found that the image on the half



eagle and quarter eagle coin was taken from a photograph of an unidentified chief. The coin dealer/researcher now appears to be intrigued with this mystery. Together, and soon, we will do some additional research on the man who designed the coin. I

guess it is possible that we could end up, finally, face to face with Santana. We certainly have not ruled out that possibility. I will advise you of the outcome as soon as I know. I hope we are not disappointed. How wonderful it would be if this great leader has already been honored with a coin in his image!

I would really appreciate it if anyone who remembers seeing any rock art to sketch it (whatever they remember; it does not have to be complete or detailed) and send me a copy. I believe this could be very important information, both for Santa Anna and for helping to identify a Comanche style rock art.

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Through the years there have stories of an eagle carved on a boulder in the vicinity of where the "Santana Rock" was originally on the mountain. In talking with people around town we have found those who have heard the story, but no one who actually ever saw the carving but had seen the Santana carving. If it turns out that a model from a coin was used for the Santana carving, we can probably assume the rock mason artist also carved the eagle using the image from the same coin.

Intriguing to say the least!

### Shots Across Texas

Except for Bolivia and Haiti, the United States has the lowest immunization rate in the western hemisphere. Even more shameful, Texas rates the last in all the states.

Childhood diseases can kill. Often even with survival of the child, there are serious life-long complications. Measles, mumps and chicken pox are not no-hum illnesses.

I remember when polio ran rampant across the United States. I have cousins who died from it and one who was permanently crippled. Hepatitis B infects and kills. Measles can blind, destroy hearing and cause mental retardation. Mumps can cause deafness, kidney damage and sterility.

A recent Houston study revealed that while four out of five parents believe that their child's immunizations are current, medical records indicated that less than half were current.

There is an effort called "Shots Across Texas" that has as its goal to fully immunize 90% of Texas children from birth to age two by 1996. They are asking private businesses and the state of Texas to jointly sponsor community immunization events such as the ones that took place across the United States with the introduction of polio vaccine. Citizens are requested to contact state congressmen and senators requesting their support and work toward immunization goals. Medical doctors, physician assistants, family nurse practitioners and registered nurses are all ready to volunteer their time for community immunization days.

Texans can do anything they set their hearts and mind to accomplish. Parents, check your child's immunization record. If they need immunizations then get them. To know that Texans have allowed their children to live in such preventable danger is a disgrace to us all. Let us as Texans do right by the children of Texas.

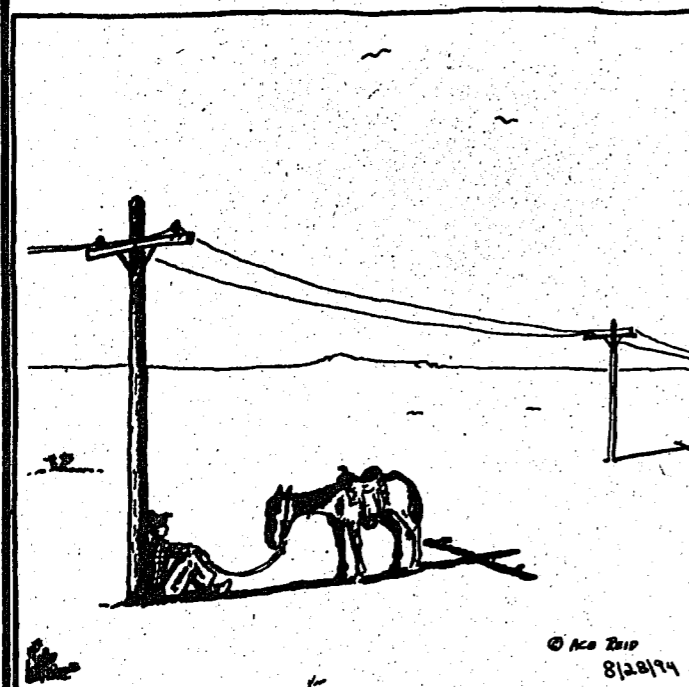

### The Charlie Stenholms Announce Plans For Annual Picnic In Ericksdahl

STAMFORD--"Welcome to Ericksdahl" will be the greeting on Saturday, September 10, as neighbors gather for their annual picnic honoring Charlie and Cindy Stenholm. Swedish immigrants first gathered here in 1906 on these eighty acres which belong to the Lutheran church. Once a part of the S. M. Swenson ranches, this soil along the California Creek could relate many stories of the past. A publication of 1918 records:

"The land occupied by the Swedish and Danish people stretches from Stamford to Lueders with some of it lying in the western part of Shackelford County. Most of it is upland intersected by hills & valleys."

The first church building was a white frame structure completed in the summer of 1907 at a total cost of \$2520.00. A magnificent rock

building dominates the area today. Men of the congregation began digging the rocks in 1932. It was completed in 1941.

Dr. Hugo B. Haterius had come to serve the church and the community in 1919. He dedicated his life to improving living conditions with emphasis on better farming practices. The California Creek Soil Conservation District was organized in 1938. One of the early officers of this group was Lambert Stenholm, father of Charlie.

On September 10, a western band will provide background music as friends reminisce and get in the line for barbecue and watermelon. This is the tradition and heritage from which Charlie Stenholm comes. He and Cindy have their farm home just two (2) miles from the picnic area. I remember seeing the Indian's head carved on a rock several times. I remember it as being on the south side of the mountain toward the east end almost north of the Banner Creamery. It may have been a little farther east than that.

It was located in a wide crack or crevice five to seven feet wide going from the top of the mountain through the caprock. The sculpture was on the east side of the rock wall of the crevice with the chief facing south. Someone else may remember it differently, but that way I remember it.

Several years ago after the NEWS started writing about the Indians in the Santa Anna area I asked people about the Indian head and what happened to it, but no one knew.

About two years ago, I was drinking coffee with friends in the cafe in Crystal City and mentioned Santa Anna. One of my friends said he had seen the Indian head and it had been moved from the mountain and placed by the office building.

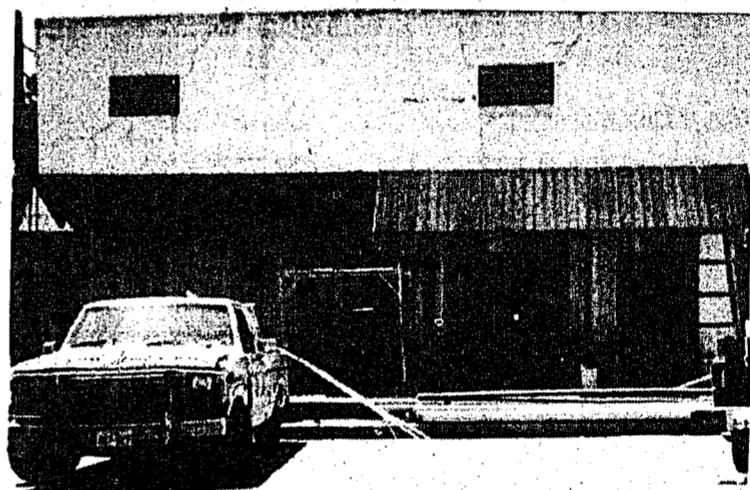

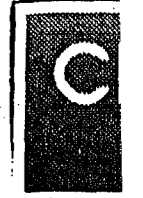

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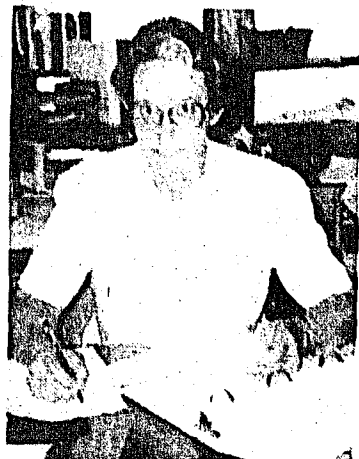
