Wellness Center Opens Monday



Family Nurse Practitioner Peggy Hensley will operate the Wellness Center in coordination with Donald Pope, M.D.

Convenient, professional family health care services will be available beginning September 12 from The Wellness Center in Santa Anna, which will be staffed by individuals with a long history of service to the community.

Providing health services at The Wellness Center will be Margaret A. "Peggy" Hensley, MSN, RN, FNP, a family nurse practitioner and resident of Santa Anna. The Wellness Center will be operated in coordination with Medical Director Donald A. Pope, M.D., who is certified by the American Academy of Family Practice. Dr. Pope practiced in Coleman for 9 years before relocating to Brownwood in 1991.

The Wellness Center will be located at 106 North 2nd, just behind the Masonic Lodge (south of the traffic light), and will be open Monday and Wednesday from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. and Tuesday and Thursday from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. These extended hours will make it extremely convenient to take advantage of The Wellness Center's wide range of health care services, from routine check-ups and minor emergency care to long-term management of problems including diabetes and high blood pressure.

In addition, The Wellness Center

will provide women's health services including pre-natal and gynecological examinations. Other areas of service will include diagnosis and treatment of a variety of medical conditions affecting all age groups, from pediatrics to geriatrics. The Wellness Center will welcome Medicaid and Medicare patients.

"Peggy" Hensley and her husband, John, have been residents of Santa Anna since 1989 and have 2 children: Jenna, age 10; and Jessica, age 6. Both attend Santa Anna Elementary School. Mrs. Hensley and the children are members of Sacred Heart Catholic Church, where she has served on the Parish Council and as a Sunday School teacher. Mrs. Hensley has also been active in the Girl Scouts, serving as a troop leader since 1990.

After receiving her Bachelor of Science Degree in nursing in 1978, Mrs. Hensley worked at hospitals in Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Maine and Virginia before moving to Central Texas in 1989. She served as an Emergency Room and Intensive Care Unit Staff Nurse at Brownwood Regional Medical Center from 1989 to 1993.

During part of that time, Mrs. Hensley was enrolled in the Masters Degree nursing program at the

University of Texas, Arlington, where she achieved her status as a Family Nurse Practitioner, which is a Registered Nurse with advanced education and training. Mrs. Hensley has also worked this year in the Brownwood office of Donald A. Pope, M.D., continuing the development of her medical skills. Her professional associations include membership in the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners and Texas Association of Nurse Practitioners as well as the American Association of Critical Care Nurses and Sigma Theta Tau, the national honor society for nursing.

Serving as Medical Director of The Wellness Center, Dr. Pope will provide a continuing review of medical services provided to patients as well as a source for medical consultation. A native of Cross Plains, Dr. Pope received his medical degree from the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas in 1979 and completed a 3 year residency at Texas Tech University. Dr. Pope practiced medicine in Coleman from 1982 through 1991, and has continued to serve patients from the Coleman area through his practice in Brownwood.

The Wellness Center is currently accepting appointments for patients, with office visits to begin September 12. To make an appointment or for more information on services available through The Wellness Center, please call 348-3566.

School Board Sets Tax Rate Same As Last Year

The Santa Anna School board met on Tuesday of last week for a public hearing on the 1994-95 proposed budget, with two school district citizens present.

Following the public hearing the board met in regular session for approval of the budget and to set a tax rate.

A balanced budget of appropriations, and receipts and revenues was adopted at a figure of \$1,995,686.00.

The budget is above last years figure of \$1,886,799. According to Superintendent Jim McPherson, the increases are in payroll.

After adopting the budget the board set the tax rate at \$1.40, the same as last year. \$1.28 goes toward maintenance and operating and .12¢ to debt service.

Final amendments to last years

budget were made to close out the 1993-94 fiscal year.

The board also approved a transfer student from the Bangs school district.

The Bite of the Black Widow

The Black Widow is found throughout the United States. Texas is a very hospitable place for this ill-tempered lady, and as a consequence, the bite of the Black Widow is not uncommon.

She is one of the few spiders that is aggressive. Place your hand close to her and she will charge out from her hiding place and bite without hesitation. She is only too willing to demonstrate how she has earned her bad reputation. She is usually the size of your little finger nail, shiny black with a red-orange hourglass on her abdomen. Now for a surprise! Not all widows have the hourglass markings; some have only various red marks. The venom she injects works directly on the nervous system and can kill infants, and adults who are in a poor state of health due to pre-existing serious illness.

A sharp pain signals the bite. Within one-half hour there is a local redness and swelling or a pale area with a blue white border. The individual can exhibit many symptoms in various combinations. They include muscular rigidity, severe abdominal pain, nausea, vomiting, drooling, extreme swings in blood pressure, irregularities in heartbeat, destruction of the red blood cells, destruction of muscle tissue, trembling involving all of the skeletal muscles, kidney failure, coma and possibly death.

Any Black Widow should be regarded as an emergency. Various medications need to be administered to combat and offset the venom's effect. Should this ill-dispositioned lady bite you, seek medical attention immediately.

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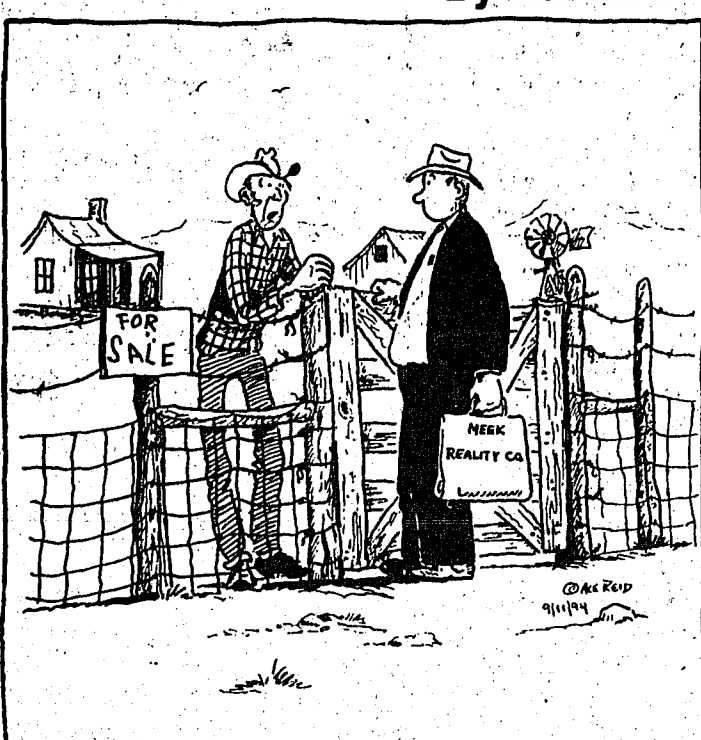

Heart Of Texas Girl Scouts Gear Up For Troop Year

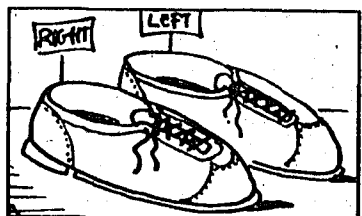

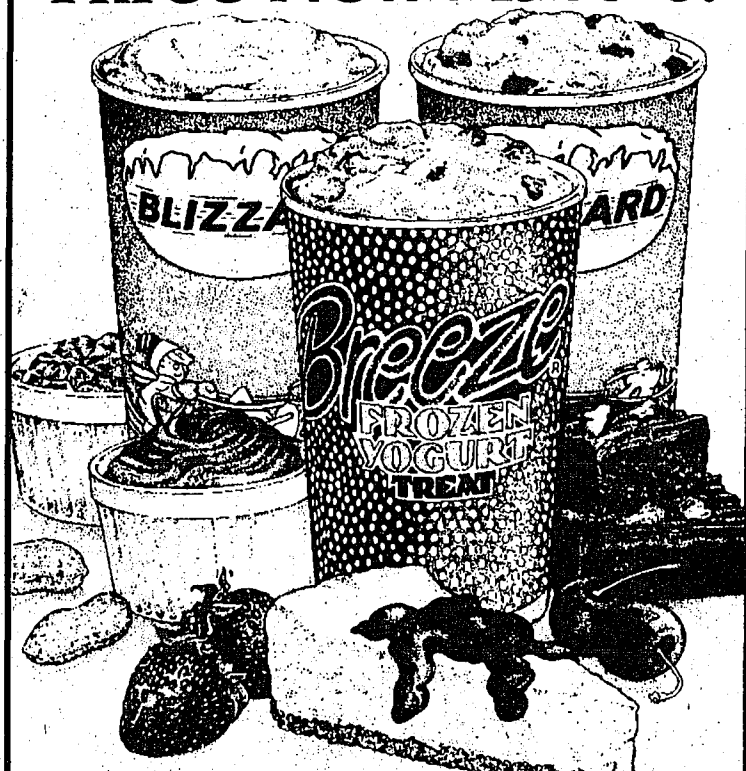

Mountaineers Lose In Upset

The Santa Anna Mountaineers lost a hard fought 20-8 game Friday night to Christoval, a six-man powerhouse which is operating in 11 man for the first time since the 1940's. The Cougars have been perennial state contenders for most of those years in six-man ball.

Statistics, however, showed the game a much closer contest than did the scoreboard.

Christoval jumped to a 14-0 lead but Santa Anna pulled to 14-8 just before halftime with a 41-yard scoring drive capped by Anthony Thomas' four-yard run.

Santa Anna racked up 194 yards

rushing, including 102 by Thomas on 24 carries. The Mountaineers lost two of five fumbles and threw an interception.

Christoval running back Manuel Riojas led all rushers with 151 yards on 17 carries to spark the Cougar win. He scored on runs of 41, 1, and 46 yards, the first of which came at the 9:19 mark of the first period, climaxing a 56-yard, three play drive.

The Mountaineers marched to Christoval's 20 but fumbled on their next possession and the Cougars returned the ball to the

Mountaineer 25. Three plays later they scored.

Following a shanked 12-yard punt by Christoval in Period Two, John Smith's Mountaineers

marched 41 yards on nine plays with HB Anthony Thomas scooting the final four yards with 43 seconds remaining in the half. He added the two points on another run.

The icing was applied by the Cougars early in the third period when Riojas sprinted 46 yards to score.

Christoval rushed for 240 yards and were blanked in the passing game. Santa Anna was led by Anthony Thomas' 102 yards on 24 carries as the Black and Gold rushed for 194 yards on 44 attempts.

Coach Smith tapped Thomas, back Manuel Frausto, center Mark Yancy and lineman Clifton Blaine for special compliments on their game performances.

The Mountaineers travel to Robert Lee for an 8:00 game Friday.

Agricultural Waste Pesticides To Be Collected

Old, obsolete, cancelled, banned, suspended or otherwise unwanted pesticides will be accepted at waste pesticide collections in the following cities:

Ballinger, Tuesday, September 20 at City of Ballinger Municipal Airport
Stephenville, Friday, September 23 at C&F Aviation

These collections are being sponsored by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Waste pesticides will be accepted from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. at each collection site on their respective date. In addition, properly rinsed empty pesticide containers will also be accepted at these locations. Pesticide applicators are encouraged to bring in any unwanted pesticides they may possess. This disposal opportunity is free of charge with no questions asked. Without utilizing this free opportunity, disposal costs for one 55 gallon drum of pesticide could cost a farmer \$1,500 to \$2,000 at a commercial facility.

Over 560 tons of agricultural waste pesticides have been collected in the 18 previous collections.

Sims Schedules Hearing In Response To Critical Habitat Designation

AUSTIN—State Senator Bill Sims (D-Paint Rock) has announced a joint hearing of the Senate and House Natural Resource Committees on Sept. 12, 1994 at 10 a.m. in the Senate Chambers of the State Capitol in Austin. The focus of the committee hearing will be to discuss the proposed designation of critical habitat for the golden-cheek warbler in 33 Texas counties. Sam Hamilton, State Administrator with the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service, is scheduled to speak.

Senator Sims, who is Chairman of the Senate Natural Resources Committee, has requested that Bruce Babbitt, Secretary of Interior, further investigate the winter habitat of the warbler in Mexico and Central America because "it must be determined if our efforts (through this designation) and the resulting extreme hardships suffered by landowners can really have an effect on the bird's future. Without all the facts, I stand staunchly opposed to saddling the residents of this portion of Texas with this mammoth responsibility, especially since the warbler's habitat is not at all indigenous to the hill country."

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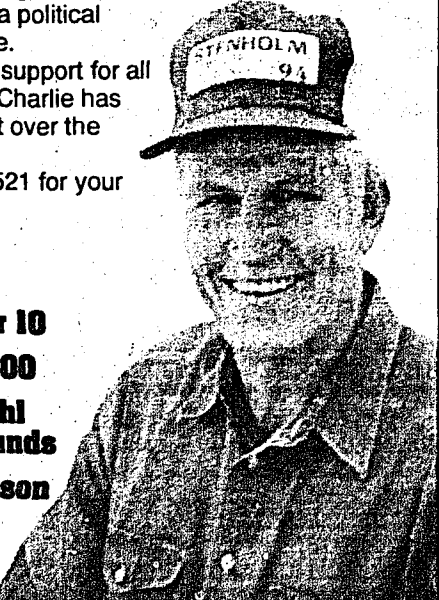
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
