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

The game promises to be a pretty evenly matched battle. Miles is also 0-2 for the season after falling to Bronte last week 32-0. Miles lost its season opener 42-0 to Robert Lee who blanked the Mountaineers 41-0 last Friday. Santa Anna's first loss came at the hands of Christoval, 20-8. The Bulldogs have nine returning lettermen this year. Returning starters include six offense and seven defense. Miles strength is in size on the line while their weakness is no depth. All Mountaineers fans are urged to come out Friday night and show support by filling the stands.

## County Tax Collection Rate Higher, Led By Santa Anna, Panther Creek School Districts

The Coleman County Appraisal District Board held the annual budget hearing and meeting on Monday, September 12, at the District office in Coleman.

No visitors were present for the hearing, and the 1995 budget was adopted as prepared and presented last month to the taxing entities in the county. The new budget is \$13,000 above the previous year, having increases in several categories, including the first salary increase for District employees in four years.

In the fourteen years of operation, the Appraisal District has operated below the budget each year,

returning excess funds to the taxing entities in their proportionate share.

In the regular business session, Chief Appraiser Bill Jones reported on tax collections during the month of August, with over \$44,000 received. The county tax collections for 1994 are higher than several

previous years, with Panther Creek and Santa Anna school districts leading with 94 percent of the taxes collected. The average collections

for the nine combined entities is just over 92 percent.

With the collection of delinquent

taxes from prior years, tax collections are approximately \$200,000 ahead of the same period last year.

Routine business included approval of minutes and review and approval of bills and accounts for the month of August.

All members of the Board were present for the session, being Barbara Kingsbery, Charles Yarbrough, Harold Skelton, D. G. Allen and Billy McCrary.

The next meeting of the group will be Monday, November 14, at the District office at 5:00 p.m. All meetings are open to the public, and visitors are invited to attend.

## See You At The Pole Wednesday, September 21

Local high school students will conduct a See You at The Pole prayer meeting Wednesday morning at 7:00 a. m. at the flag pole on the high school campus. See You at The Pole (SYATP) is a teen-led international prayer movement. It is a united effort to follow the biblically prescribed solution for crisis in a nation.

SYATP focuses attention on the crisis faced by American teens. It summons the community to get involved in the crisis. "Also," organizers say, "it is a declaration

of our dependance on God as the solution to the crisis through reconciliation of lost people to Him."

See You the The Pole is not a demonstration protest, an equal rights rally, a publicity stunt, a patriotic rally, or an alternative to prayer in schools. The event is allowed by the U.S. Constitution as a First Amendment right. In 1993, more than 1 million people participated in SYATP prayer rallies across America.

## County Commissioners Vote To Borrow Funds To Finish Year

Coleman County Commissioners found finances to be the main topic on the agenda when they met in their regular meeting Monday morning.

General fund bills due were in the amount of \$40,899. The four precinct's were due approximately \$14,600 and \$760 is due in the

road and Bridge Fund. There would be just enough left to pay bills for the next two week.

County Auditor Shirley Sansing told commissioners about \$85,700 would be needed to complete the current budget year which ends on September 30.

The shortage comes as a result of

building the road to Lake Ivie which cost almost \$200,000.

County Judge Pete Skelton was given the authority to obtain a \$90,000, six month loan from the county depository, First Coleman National Bank. The money will be used to pay bills and salaries.

Sheriff Wade Turner appeared before commissioners and requested to advertise for bids for two new cars. He told the group that one car has 130,000 miles and the other 160,000 miles. Turner will be permitted to advertise at this time for one new car and if the other breaks down, commissioners will face that then.

The city council approved the purchase several months ago of the building which formerly housed Countywide Insurance and remodeling of the offices has been being done by city crew members.


Police Chief Carlos Torres

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## Property Rights Meet Set 19th In Brownwood

The Brown County Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a *Private Property Rights Meeting* on Monday, Sept. 19, at 5:30 p.m., at the Comfort Inn, 410 East Commerce in Brownwood.

Headlining the event will be State Senator Bill Sims, D - Paint Rock, and State Representative Bob Turner, D-Voss. The meeting is open to the public.

Recently, the federal government proposed the designation of 33 Texas counties as critical habitat for the golden-cheeked warbler. Sen. Sims, who is chairman of the powerful Senate Natural Resources Committee, said the habitat would have a crippling effect on Texas landowners, the local economies and all citizens.

"As a landowner, rancher and businessman, I am staunchly opposed to this type of federal regulation," Sims said. "As a state senator who represents a

large portion of the affected area, I believe that I represent a bunch of folks who are adamantly opposed."

On September 12, Senator Sims convened a joint hearing of the Senate and House Natural Resources Committee in Austin to review the federal proposal initiated by the U.S. Department of the Interior and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Sen. Sims and other government officials said they are prepared to sue the federal government to halt the proposed designation and protect the rights and interests of Texas property owners.

Officials with the Fish and Wildlife Service have listed the golden-cheeked warbler as an endangered species. The songbird nests in some 80,000 acres in Central and West Texas.

Sen. Sims sponsored legislation last

session requesting Congress revise the Federal Endangered Species Act and give stronger consideration to economic factors, protection of public safety and the preservation of basic landowner property rights that are guaranteed by the Constitution.

"While protecting endangered species is important, my loyalty is with the landowners," Sen. Sims said. "Many have worked all their lives for their property. I pledge to do whatever possible to protect them from unreasonable, bureaucratic takings of their constitutional rights."

### Pneumococcal Pneumonia

The organism *Streptococcus Pneumoniae* cause 90% of all pneumonia worldwide. Pneumonia usually strikes the elderly, those who have been weakened by other illness, and those whose immune system is suppressed by certain illness.

The period of time from the first symptoms to the point of life threatening illness can develop within twenty-four hours. The classic symptoms of strep pneumoniae are fevers spiking to 104 degrees F., chills that cause the patient to shake or tremble, chest or back pain associated with inhaling or exhaling, and sputum that is green, yellow, or blood streaked.

Strep Pneumonia can be treated without hospitalization provided it is treated in its early stages. However, hospitalization is often required.

Fortunately, a vaccine is available that confers a high degree of resistance. The vaccine is recommended for all persons over age 65, those with chronic illness such as diabetes, emphysema, cardiovascular disorders, sickle cell, cirrhosis, and diseases that suppress the immune system.

The vaccine is not recommended for those allergic to mercury, women who are nursing or are pregnant, or those with previous pneumococcal vaccinations. It can be given at the same time as flu vaccine is given.

Prevention is always superior to cure of that disease. If you are a person at high risk of pneumonia, vaccination is recommended. The cold and flu season is fast approaching.

Take positive steps to keep a cold only a cold.

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
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
