## County Livestock Show Kicks Off With Saturday Weigh-In

The time is now for the Coleman County Stock Show following the completion last Saturday of the Santa Anna Project Show.

The Coleman show will begin on Saturday when youngsters will take their animals to the show barns in Coleman for sifting.

The show will official begin on Sunday, January 15 with 259 hogs to be shown beginning at 1 p.m. under the supervision of Dee Carroll Holt, hog superintendent. Sifter will be Milton Harms of Springtown and judge for this year's show is Curry Allen of Tuscola.

Rabbits will be shown on 2 p.m. on Sunday with 29 pens of rabbits expected. Judging will be done by Marvin Clark of Eldorado.

Monday, January 16 will begin with 39 steers being judged at 8 a.m. to Jake Fikes of Burkburnett. Sifter is Scott Berry of Clyde and Jay Davis is show superintendent.

Lambs will followed the steer show with Sam Kuykendall of Menard to be the judge. Sifting will be done by C. J. Robinson of Ballinger. Tommy Saunders is show superintendent.

Steers must weigh in at the Coleman Livestock Auction Commission on Friday afternoon between 4 and 6 p.m.

Rabbits must be at the show site by 2 p.m. on Sunday afternoon.

Junior and senior showmanship will be named for the lamb, steer and hog division. Trophies will go to the champion, grand champion and breed champion of each division.

The rabbit show is an all-breed show with no classes designated.

The sale of exhibit animals will begin at noon on Tuesday, January 17 at the Coleman Livestock Auction Commission.

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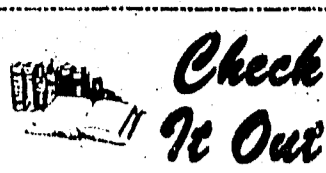
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### Check It Out

## About Your Health

### Herpes Zoster (Shingles)

Shingles is a common ailment that occurs in approximately fifty percent of adults over age fifty. It is uncommon in healthy children and young adults.

It is a reactivation of latent or "hidden" chickenpox. At the conclusion of chickenpox, the virus lies hidden within a sensory nerve root. There it stays, without announcing its presence for many years. Then, if the individual's immune system should become compromised, it will erupt along the nerve "path" in which it resides.

Shingles does not prefer one sex over another, it cares not what your race might be, not does the virus prefer one season of the year over another. Once an individual manifest shingles, no immunity against further episodes is conferred. It can recur; however, recurrence is uncommon.

The disease will present itself with burning pain or an intense pricking sensation in roughly a linear fashion involving only one area on one side of the body. Soon thereafter a red, raised rash will appear which then develops into "blister-type" lesions. These lesions will continue to erupt over 3-5 days with remission occurring after 3-4 weeks. Often there will also be a low grade fever and a generalized fatigue.

Shingles most often appears on the chest and side but can appear anywhere on the body. Should it erupt upon the face, neck or scalp it is a true emergency as the potential for serious consequences are greatly escalated with these areas involved. Fortunately, complications are uncommon. The most common is nerve pain that may persist for months or years.

Treatment for shingles focuses upon relief of pain and shortening the time of the illness. Relief of pain is accomplished by oral and topical pain relievers. If anti-viral treatment with acyclovir is begun within seventy-two hours of the appearance of the symptoms, the severity and length of the illness is greatly reduced as is the complication of persistent nerve pain.

Whether intense or mild, shingles is a very unpleasant experience. Don't go it alone; it can be shortened and it need not be as severe as it can be.

## Girl Scout Cookie Sales Underway

It's time to join the Girl Scouts on an "Incredible Voyage" to "look beneath the surface" of the Girl Scout Cookie Sale. This year's motivational theme for the cookie sale reaches new depths in exploring participation, motivation and organization, challenges girls are facing today and will be facing in the future. The voyage leads to a new perspective, new methods and new answers in meeting those challenges.

In addition to the seven delicious Girl Scout cookies from which to choose, a new cookie is being marketed this year. This new cookie is called Snaps and is a low-fat, iced oatmeal raisin cookie. It has only 1.5 grams of fat and 130 calories in seven cookies. You can enjoy some Snaps, invest in the future of Girl Scouting and not even have to feel guilty about the "fat".

Girls will be taking orders from January 6 through January 23 with delivery scheduled between February 16 and March 6. The price will remain at \$2.50 per box; customers should not pay for cookies until delivery is made.

Ever since the 1920's, the sale of Girl Scout cookies has offered Girl Scouts of all ages a unique opportunity to increase entrepreneurial skills and finance troop activities.

In the November 1923 issue of The American Girl, Girl Scouts of Bridgeport, Conn., described how they sold cookies to support their troop activities. Girl Scouts from every Bridgeport troop baked butter cookies to be sold on "Cookie Day". That first year, the girls baked and sold a total of \$3,350 cookies that sold for 25 cents a dozen.

By 1934, some Girl Scout cookies were being commercially baked in Philadelphia and in 1936, Girl Scout councils nationwide had their first nationally franchised Girl Scout Cookie Sale.

It wasn't until the 1940's, however that the Girl Scout's annual cookie sale really took off. The end of World War II brought with it the hope of all parents that their children should have the best and for the girls, the best was Girl Scout camps. With slogans like "Buy Our Cookies and Build Our Camp" and "Buy Our Cookies and Send a

Girl To Camp", the public was made aware that their support of the cookie sale provided activities for the Scouts.

Although the mechanics and scope of the cookie sale have changed, the real benefits from the Girl Scouts have not.

Camp building and up keep still are heavily supported by the cookie sale. Today's camps are required to meet the needs of people with disabilities, upgrade formerly primitive camps to provide more services and to winterize summer camps so that they can be used all year long.

But camp support is only on one of cookie sale proceeds. Cookie money makes it possible for the Scouts to underwrite leadership development training programs for the adults who will bring the Girl Scout program to the girls, it finances travelships and makes it possible for the Scouts to reach girls who might not otherwise have access to memberships.

## Commissioners Hear Again From Lake Coleman Residents

Residents of Lake Coleman appeared before the Coleman County Commissioners Court for their first meeting of the new year with complaints left over from last year.

Approximately 25 citizens were once again asking commissioners why their roads haven't been fixed yet and when they are going to be fixed.

The meeting was moved in the District Courtroom to accommodate the crowd assembling for the meeting with County Judge Sherrill Ragsdale presiding.

Precinct 1 Commissioner Willard Allen told the citizens that no money has been budgeted and he was working with a limited budget. He also stated that he had tried to correct the problems and he knew that the roads needed additional work.

Commissioners approved the bonds of the newly elected officials. They also deputized Kay Harris, Donna Seymore, Jamie Trammell and Doris Williams. Approval was given to Jo Ann Hale to advertise for a bank depository for the next two years.

Bills were approved with the General Fund totaling \$38,387; Road and Bridge \$331; and total for the four precincts of approximately \$10,137. Also Worker's Compensation to be paid for the quarter, amounting to \$9,961, was approved.

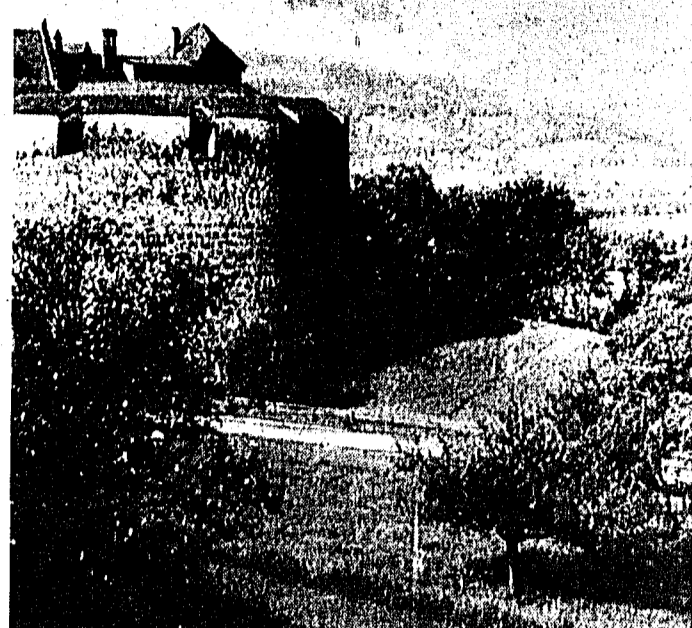

As you might tell, the sole reason we went to Italy was to say we'd been to Italy and get our passport stamped. Margaret had written the Austrian tourist bureau and said she was interested by crystal. We were now searching for one of the factories that the tourist bureau had informed us of. As we drove into the small town of Grosslobbing, we searched for the signs for the glass factory. We drove the whole village without seeing anything that looked like a glass factory. We examined the brochure very carefully and noticed that it gave a street address. We drove back to the edge of town and saw an apartment building that matched the address we were looking for. We hesitantly parked the and went in. This was not your typical glass factory. Imgard Langer was famous for her hand-painted crystal. She would purchase crystal from factories and then hand-paint them. She really did a beautiful job. We bought quite a few small things. As we were looking and making our selections she pulled out four small 1-2 oz. bottles that were hand painted, and making a show that it was not liquor, she filled each of the bottles with peach brandy and closed the top. I guess brandy is not considered liquor in Austria. We think were given to us as gifts for entering her store/home. I do believe that the gifts bottles were prettier than some of the things we purchased. It was very interesting to visit in the home of this artist that was advertised in America. So a factory doesn't necessarily have to be a separate building. She evidently did most of her work in her kitchen and her kiln looked as if it were part of her furniture.

As the valley dwindled out, we started looking for a gashaus. We had arrived in a ski-resort. It was too early for skiing but a little bit too late for hiking and other summer pastimes. As we were checking in, we asked about a place to eat our dinner. The proprietress gave us directions to a restaurant that would bill her for our meal. That sounded like a good idea. We drove to the train station which was next to the restaurant where we were to eat. Just as arrived at the station, David walked to the train platform to watch the people get off the train. After a few minutes, the train continued its westerly journey and David followed the rest of the people to the restaurant.

At the hotel, the proprietress had indicated that this was a fixed cost meal as well as a fixed menu meal. All we had to do was arrive at the restaurant and tell them we were from the Gasthof-Mauthen Pension. We must have been very tired because we normally like to pour over the menus and decide what unusual things we

would eat that evening. The meal was excellent and I don't think we could have selected a better one if we had looked for an hour. We all were served a large bowl of garlic soup. We would probably not have asked for it, but after one taste, we tried to memorize the spelling so we could do it again if we found it on the menu. After we finished the soup, we were served wienersnitzel with vegetables and salad. This was as good an entree as we've had anywhere. For dessert, strawberry ice cream and sherbet mixed together with fruit, whipped cream and cookies. We don't remember what the meal cost but it was cheaper than anything on the menu and we are sure equally as good. I do get confused with Austrian money. The Austrian shilling is worth about \$0.90 so when you get a bill for 100 shillings it is only about \$90. A bill for 1,000 shillings is \$900. Anything between 100-1,000 is fairly confusing. I think the bill was about 500 shillings for the meal which was about \$45 for four people.

We continued up the road from one switch back to the next. After a long while we came to another herd of cows being pushed out on the road by the herders. This was a much larger group of cows and they were heading down the same road and we had come up. Since they were blocking the way, we stopped as they passed by. The bells on these cows were much smaller than the ones on the first herd. Soon after we resumed our way, we came to the top of the mountain.

As the map had indicated the road sort of disappeared. As we pulled onto the almost level surface, all we could see were soldiers and military vehicles. A quick glance around showed what looked like the road going down the other side of the mountain. We scrunched down in our seats and drove carefully and quietly toward the opening. As we got close, we saw that it indeed was the road down the other side of the mountain. With a sigh of relief, we carefully drove off the base and down into the farm lands below. As we drove down, we saw many houses. Most of them looked like they were lived in all year round. Even though there were patches of snow in the area, the long lush green grass grew everywhere. We finally made our way down to the intersection of a road that headed north toward Germany. The mist turned into a moderate cold rain.

As we approached the city of Bern, we saw a split in the freeway system. The left went to France and the right to Germany. We chose the left and drove to the French border. Once inside France, we drove north along the west bank of the Rhine River. About twenty miles up the highway, we turned to the right and crossed the Rhine into Germany. We drove through the rain for a while and started looking for a B&B. We were in the Black Forest of Germany for the first time and we hoped the weather would improve by morning so that we could see the forest. We found a lovely quiet gashaus along the road that had a restaurant. Since the weather was so poor, we didn't want to drive around in the rain trying to find something to eat. This selection of the B&B with restaurant was a good choice in that we hadn't seen any restaurants before we saw the guest house and we didn't see any for miles when we left in the morning.

Other routine business was attended to by the Board.

The next meeting of the group will be on Monday, March 13 at 5 p.m. Meetings are open to the public and visitors are welcome to attend.

## Fishing Lake Ivie

We're catching some nice stringers of large crappie now. Using minnows and fishing on points and brushy ridges along river channels. Finding them in 20 to 40 feet of water.

An occasional Walleye will be caught by crappie fishermen in that 20 to 40 foot water. Now is a good time for walleye, using crank baits along rocky shoreline on cloudy days.

Black bass are being caught on plastic worms in about 20-35 feet of water. No real pattern, kind of hit and miss, but they're there. Smaller ones can be caught along the shoreline.

Crank baits along rocky points are bringing in some Small Mouth Bass in 10-25 feet of water. Also try some plastic worms in the same areas.

We are finding schools of white bass in the main lake.

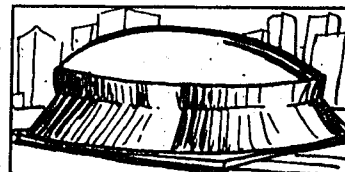

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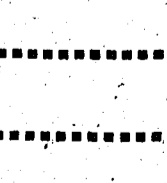
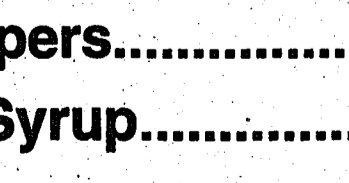
