Five Go To Bat For Santa Anna In Austin

Five men representing the Santa Anna Historical Organization were in Austin Monday to talk with Texas Historical Commission officials there concerning local development plans and seeking help for obtaining possible grant funds.

The Santa Anna Historical Development Organization had recently learned that Santa Anna and been turned down for "Main Street" help. One purpose of the trip to Austin was to ask why.

Going to bat for Santa Anna in Austin were Montie Guthrie, Danny Kellar, Robert Noriega, Rod Musick and Bobby Morgan who were told that Santa Anna was

turned down for the "Main Street Program" due to the fact it did not have enough secured local matching funds to begin a project here. They were told, however, if more self initiated funds are secured in the future, the Santa Anna organization

can re-apply for Main Street assistance.

The group also visited with Texas Department of Commerce

concerning a transportation enhancement project grant that can possibly be obtained through TxDOT who will be awarding

improvement grants in the near future. A number of local business people and public officials have written letters in support of this possibility.

The HDO will anxiously be awaiting the outcome of their visit to Austin.

Meantime, Santa Anna is going to have to start some self initiated projects to help ourselves and show we are serious about wanting to save our town. One of these may well be the economic development 1/2 cent sales tax which has been approved by the City Council to be voted on in the city elections this coming spring and which, no doubt, we will be hearing much about in coming months.

School Board OKs Tennis Court Repair

The Santa Anna School board met in regular session on Tuesday of last week.

An audit report was presented by Burl Lowery of Brownwood. It indicated that the school's financial accounting was being handled appropriately. He had no concerns to bring to the board's attention. Superintendent Jim McPherson said Monday that any school district patron wishing to do so may see a copy of the audit which is available at the administration office.

The board set meeting dates for December, January and February so as not to conflict with basketball games. The December meeting will be held at 7:00 p.m. on the 12th; the January meeting on the 12th and the February meeting on the 14th.

The board approved a policy to abide by the federal Gunfree Schools Act of 1993 which requires a one year expulsion from school for any student who is found on school property or at school activities with what is deemed by the act to be a firearm.

Montie Guthrie, chairman of the site base committee made a report on the committee's meeting with a parent who is concerned about what kinds of snack foods are available to the students from vending machines on the campus. Guthrie reported the parent's complaints are under advisement and the committee is researching alternative machines.

No action was taken concerning priorities discussed at a retreat meeting held on the previous Saturday. However, at that meeting the board did decide to repair and resurface the tennis courts on the campus, lest they be lost to deterioration. Texas Courts and Windscreens of Abilene will do the work on the courts which is expected to begin the latter part of December or early January.

A report from the appraisal district office showed tax collections slightly ahead of the same time last year.

Elementary school principal Dean Bass reported that students in the accelerated reading program have read and been tested on 1500 books to date this school year. He added that the program has been really well accepted and has turned out to be a most important addition to the school program.

About Your Health

Pertussis (Whooping Cough)

This illness is caused by a bacteria. Transmission is by droplets expelled by coughing and sneezing. Pertussis is communicable one week before and for three weeks after the appearance of symptoms.

The beginning of the illness is unremarkable and may present as a "cold". There will be a "runny nose", sneezing, slight fever and a mild cough. Within two weeks the cough becomes severe; characteristically it develops into violent episodes of harsh coughing followed by a crowing or "whooping" sound when the person inhales. Eating will often trigger the coughing episode, and the cough may often be so severe as to cause vomiting. A very thick mucus may be coughed or vomited.

Fortunately, severe complications are not common; however, they do happen. Complications include pneumonia, bronchitis and seizures.

Antibiotics do decrease the severity of the illness and shorten its duration. This illness can require hospitalization and aggressive supportive therapy, particularly so in children under one year of age.

Children are required prior to school age to obtain a DPT series of immunizations that confers a high degree of resistance. However, some parents neglect this responsibility, and as a consequence, every winter there are those children who fall prey to whooping cough.

The first DPT should be given when the child is two months old, the second at four months old, the third at six months. A booster is given 6-12 months after the third dose and the final immunization between four and six years of age.

If your child has had their DPT, rest easy; the chance of Pertussis is very small. If they have not, it should be attended too.

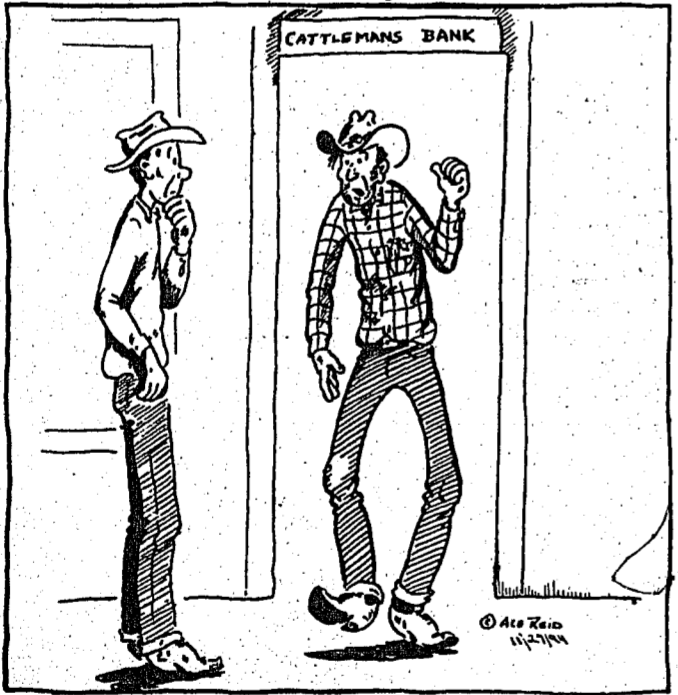

Traveling With The Karthausers

We awoke fairly early and had a wonderful Danish breakfast. Breakfast was sliced bread, sliced cheese, raspberry jam and butter. You make open faced sandwiches starting with thin slices of bread, spread on butter, followed by a slice of cheese and then spread raspberry jam on it. Your place is a little square wooden board. This is not your typical American breakfast,

the gates and went inside to the courtyard. As we got within a hundred yards of the Palace, the sign appeared to say "No Trespassing". We followed some signs and went toward the east side of the palace. As we walked by, we found out that the King's mother was in residence there. Copenhagen. Here we visited the Castle Helsingor, which is supposed to be the setting of Shakespeare's "Hamlet". We gladly got back in the car and headed south along Denmark's "Gold Coast". The Gold Coast comprises the northeast corner of the island just north of Copenhagen. Most of these ocean side estates were large and expensive looking. The drive to Copenhagen was very beautiful and interesting. Our drive took us through downtown Copenhagen at rush hour. The purpose of this course was to show us where the hospital where Anne had her surgery and where she died.

but, on, so good. We had our choice of tea or coffee, both purchased from Per's store. We drank the tea since their coffee is very strong. Right after breakfast Martha called to finalize our meeting place in Vienna. Also Moens, the Sindrup's nephew called to bid them good-bye as he was heading to South France on vacation. We talked to him and told him we were sorry to miss seeing him and hoped to see him the next time.

After breakfast dishes were cleared up, Inge prepared a picnic lunch. We got in their Volkswagon Passat and headed to the northern part of Denmark, north of Copenhagen. We drove on very good roads and it took a little over an hour to go the 60 to 70 miles. Our first stop was Friederburg—an old castle that is now a museum. This was the second castle that we have visited in Denmark. This was upscale and very ornate. Most of the furnishings were from the 17th and 18th century.

After we finished the tour we went to the parking lot and had a tailgate party. The sandwiches were similar to breakfast but added meat instead of cheese and jelly. Inge packed more than enough food for the four of us. After we finished our wonderful lunch we headed off for the Queen's palace.

she been in residence, we would probably have been directed along an outer path that would keep us at least 100 yards from the palace at all times. Grounds in the back of the palace seemed to stretch forever. There were beautiful tree-lined paths and intricately decorated flower gardens. Down near the tree lined paths we could see the Baltic Sea shore. The Danes as well as most Europeans spend considerable time and money in decorating with flowers.

The day so far had been cloudy, cool and windy. There was no change the rest of the day except getting cooler. We left the Queen's Castle and drove to Humble Garden, a residence hospital. This hospital was where Anne, her mother, Inge, and her youngest child stayed after some of Anne's surgeries. Inge stayed to help care for Thorbjorn as he was not quite a year old. The rest of the family could come and visit at any time. Anne was under the care of her doctor. The unique thing about Humble Garden was that it catered to vegetarians. Anne had become vegetarian shortly after her high school years.

From Humble Garden we traveled north along the Baltic Sea. We could see Sweden's coast line a few miles away. Crackdown On Speeders In School Zone

Several motorists have been issued traffic tickets in the school zone during the past two weeks. City Policeman Carlos Torres has used a radar check to confirm speeding in the three-block area of Bowie Avenue, and other violations have been for driving illegally on Jefferson Street when it is designated a one-way street during school hours.

Parents and residents of the neighborhood encouraged the crackdown on violators due to the hazard while students were arriving and leaving school and buses were loading and unloading. The radar checks will be made periodically in an effort to assure the safety of the students. Motorists are reminded that tickets for speeding violations are more costly in a school zone.

Jefferson Street is marked as a one-way street for the block-long stretch in front of the Elementary School from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. when school is in session. At other times two-way traffic is permissible.

In addition to the moving vehicle violations, several motorists have also been ticketed for inspection and license expirations and license restriction violations.

Crappie fishing is your best bet right now. Some pretty nice stringers of 10 to 12 inch crappie are being caught on minnows in 10 to 25 feet of water.

A few channel cats are being taken on trotlines and rod/reels. Trotlines are showing the best results, using various baits. Mid-lake and mouths of the creeks are good places to set lines in 10 to 20 foot of water. Yellow cats are being found up the river on trotlines, using live bait.

A few nice size white bass are being caught on minnows by crappie fishermen. Some up to 2 lbs. and a little more.

Black bass are still a little slow, but catches are increasing some since the lake seems to be about finished turning over. Crank baits and plastic worms are best bait in about 5 to 15 foot water.

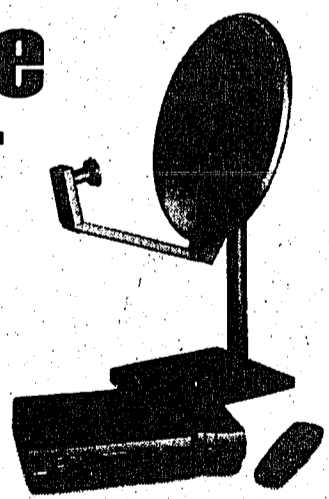

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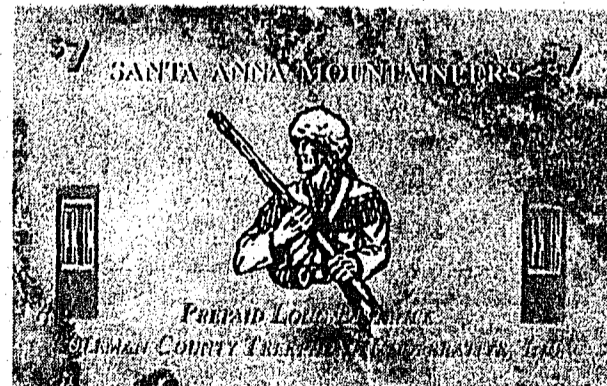

TPWD Surveys Lake Brownwood

Inland fisheries personnel from the Abilene office of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department recently completed electrofishing surveys on Lake Brownwood. These electrofishing surveys are designed to collect information on a variety of fish species. The primary species of interest is the largemouth bass. Some of the information collected includes trends in abundance and size structure.

The survey at Lake Brownwood showed that the number of adult (8 inch and longer) largemouth bass collected was very similar to last fall and represents the highest catch rate since 1988. Approximately

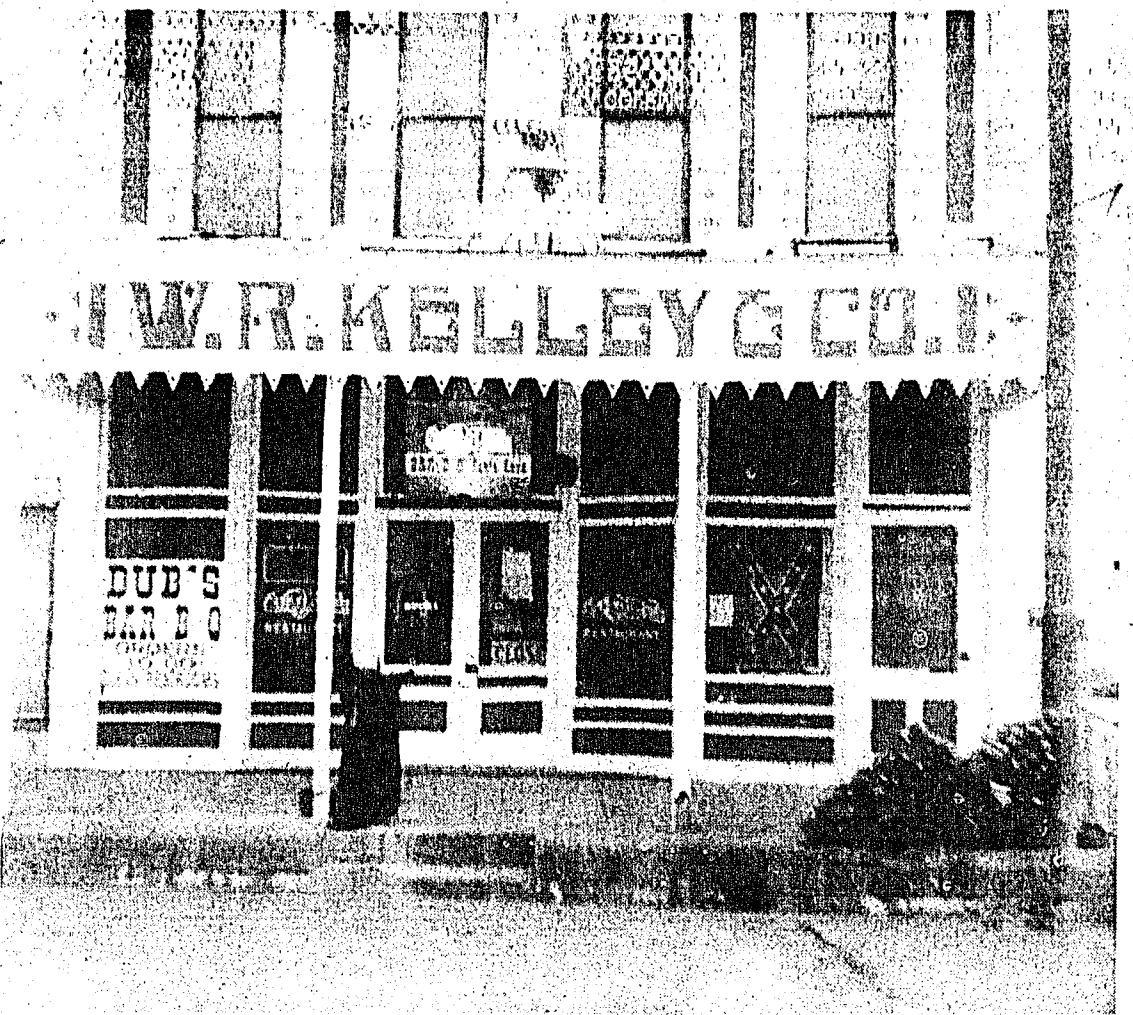

Mr. Bob Smith of Abilene came by Thursday night and was with Thomas and myself going to Brady and San Angelo Thursday.

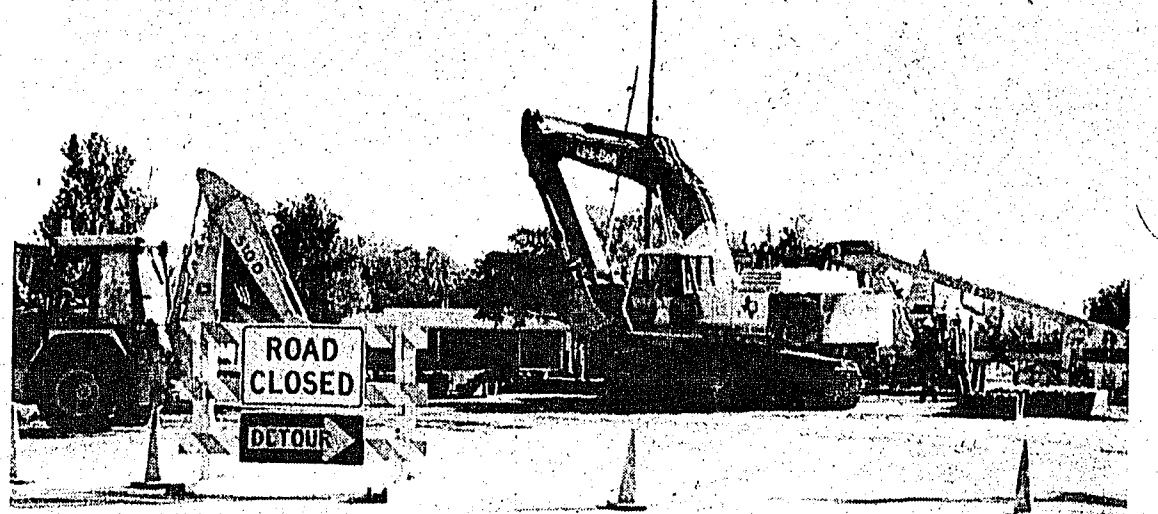
Mrs. Pearl Avant had her boys or sons James and Douglas with her

Missing Or Incorrect Social Security Number May Delay Tax Refunds

Beginning with 1994 federal income tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) will delay processing of returns with missing or incorrect Social Security numbers of taxpayers, spouses or dependents, according to Eric Johnagin, manager of the Brownwood Social Security office.

A social security number is incorrect when the name and number on the tax return don't match the name and number in IRS records, Johnagin said.

"People who expect refunds will be particularly impacted by this policy," Johnagin said. "If the return does not include the correct Social Security numbers, IRS must have the correct information before issuing a refund."

IRS has previously validated the name and social security numbers of taxpayers and spouses on tax returns, but this is the first year they will be checking names and numbers of dependents listed on the returns.

To avoid any possible delays in their refunds, taxpayers are urged to make the name and social security number of the taxpayer, a spouse and any dependents listed on the return agree with the name and number shown on each individual's social security card.

Johnagin urged taxpayers to take steps now to make sure each person

in the family has a card showing the correct social security number and name—before tax season begins.

The best way to check your social security number is to refer to your social security card. "If you have lost your card, or you need to change your name on your card, please call social security to apply for a replacement card," Johnagin said.

You can apply for a new or replacement social security card by calling 1-800-772-1213 at any time, 24 hours a day, including weekends and holidays. You'll receive an application form in the mail with instructions to complete and return it. Social Security will mail your new or replacement social security card to you within five working days after the agency receives from you the information and evidence it needs on your application.

"You should use your social security card to copy your number and name to your income tax return," Johnagin added. "If you list a spouse or dependent on your return, use that person's social security card to verify his/her name and number; don't use another document that may not be accurate."

It's also important for workers to check the social security numbers on their W-2 statements and pay stubs and notify employers if there is a discrepancy. To ensure that your employer has the correct social security number, employees should show their social security card to employers when they start a job or if a question arises about their correct number.

The Social Security Administration uses social security numbers to record earnings credited to workers for social security cash benefits and Medicare hospital insurance benefits. IRS uses the social security number as the taxpayer identification number.

This feature enables a customer to place a call to the telephone number associated with the most recent call received, whether or not the call was answered or the number is known.

When the customer dials a code the central equipment automatically redials the calling number that is stored in the central office equipment call detail record. If the called line is not busy, the call is placed. If the called line is busy a confirmation announcement is heard, the customer hangs up, and a queuing process begins. For the next 30 minutes, both the calling and the called lines are checked periodically for availability to complete the call. If during their queuing process the called line becomes idle, the customer is notified, via a distinctive ring, that the network is ready to place the call. When the customer picks up the telephone, the call will automatically be placed.

This feature will not function from a line or trunk that does not have an associated telephone number, e. g., multi-line hunting groups. In addition, the callback number must be capable of receiving incoming calls.
