

Getting A New Old Look

Jim and Juanice Laubhan are giving their business, Art Fabrics, a new "old look", mindful of yesteryear, in keeping with plans and promotions by the Santa Anna Historical Organization to revitalize downtown with an historic flavor. According to members of the Chamber of Commerce, the Laubhans are the first of what they hope is a trend by other business owners to help give Santa Anna a face lift. West Texas Utilities is contemplating plans to redo the front of their building sometime in the future, also in keeping with historical renovation. Santa Anna National Bank is presently restoring the building they purchased next door to the east of the bank. When completed, the building will provide additional office space for the bank. The historic look will be retained on the exterior as near as possible and still meet regulations for safety glass and such. As for Art Fabrics, the new front is not altogether completed. We are told to watch for the finishing touch which will most assuredly be a traffic stopper, this being the whole idea behind historic renovation. Former Santa Anna Resident Guy Allen Breaks Previous Steer Roping Single Season Earnings

Guy Allen of Lovington, New Mexico and formerly of Santa Anna, is still breaking records in steer roping, many of which he has set previously.

With a \$30,000 dollar lead in the world single-season earnings record, Allen is predicted to win this fourth consecutive and ninth career world title. Both records were set by him

The 1994 NFSR will be his 18th consecutive which is another record in which he already holds the title.

Allen has won the world championship in 1977, '80, '82, '84, '89 and '91-'93.

In 1977, Allen become the youngest man ever to win a world steer roping championship. He was 19 years of age at the time.

Coleman County voters chose Democrat Sherrill Ragsdale for County Judge on Tuesday, by a margin of 1,801 votes to 1,277 for Republican opponent Kay Taylor Rankin. With his win Ragsdale will replace Judge Pete Skelton' who chose not to run for reelection, Rankin had made history in May when she won the first-ever contested Republican primary in the





This feature enables a customer to place a call to the telephone number associated with the most recent call received, whether or not the call was answered or the number is known.

When the customer dials a code the central office equipment automatically redials the calling number that is stored in the central office equipment call detail record. If the called line is not busy, the call is placed. If the called line is busy a confirmation announcement is heard, the customer hangs up, and a queuing process begins. For the next 30 minutes, both the calling and the called lines are checked periodically for availability to complete the call. If during their queuing process the called line becomes idle, the customer is notified, via a distinctive ring, that the network is ready to place the call. When the customer picks up the telephone, the call will automatically be placed.

This feature will not function from a line or trunk that does not have an associated telephone number, e. g., multi-line hunting groups. In addition, the callback number must be capable of receiving incoming calls.

Fishing Lake Ivie

The lake has completed turning over and fishing should be getting real good again soon for those who like cool weather outings.

Crank baits, jigs and plastic worms around rocky shorelines are the best bets for small mouth bass.

Black bass fishing has picked up, using crank baits and spinners in 3 to 10 feet of water. Plastic worms are also working pretty well.

Some nice stringers of crappie are being caught in 10 to 20 feet of water around brush areas. Fishing on creek channels edges, ledges and points gets good results. Minnows have proven to be the best bait with a few caught on jigs.

Yellow catfish are showing up on trotlines up the rivers, using live bait.

1995 Social **Security Changes** Announced

Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits will increase 2.8 percent, beginning with the payments that Social Security beneficiaries receive January 3 and SSI recipients receive on December 30, Eric Johnagin, Social Security office manager in Brownwood said recently. The automatic cost-of-living adjustment is made annually.

For Social Security beneficiaries, the average monthly benefit amount for all retired workers will rise from \$679 to \$698. The maximum federal SSI monthly payment to an individual will rise from \$446 to \$458. For a couple, the maximum federal SSI payment will rise from \$669 to \$687.

Social Security and SSI benefits increase automatically each year based on the rise in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers from the third quarter of one year through the corresponding period of the next. This years increase was 2.8 percent.



The Karthauser European trip for 1993 started in Fort Worth on the 31st of August. This trip was to be a little different than all of our other trips. The special event that we had planned involved meeting our daughter Martha, and her recently acquired husband in Vienna so that we could tour some of the Eastern countries together. Another significant event was to go to Denmark to visit with our friends there. Another event that we had to plan for was to meet with another Karthauser in St. Augustin. With these three special events our normal planning (what little of it there is) was highly complicated. To schedule the last 2 events and still get to Vienna on time was a significant challenge.

How do you meet someone in a town you've never been in before with no telephone communication and what if the original meeting plans failed? It really took some hard work to solve all these opportunities. You maybe able to tell as each event unfolds why a little planning can be dangerous and lots of planning may not be enough.

The AA nonstop to Frankfurt left DFW Airport a little after 2 p.m. on Wednesday, August, 31, 1993. The flight was fairly smooth and the 9 hours passed relatively quickly. The plane landed in Frankfurt about 7 a.m. We spent a little time changing clothes, picking up our reserved rent car and making our usual reservations for the last night before our flight home. We left the airport about 8:45 a.m. The temperature in Dallas, about 12 hours earlier, was close to 100, but the temperature as we drove out of the airport was in the low 60's. From hot, cloudless skies to cool and cloudy weather was refreshing. Our car was an Opel Astro. It was a new car, turquoise in color with less than 1500 miles on the speedometer. It had a five speed transmission and required super unleaded. I had talked to the car rental people about the extra expense for the gasoline and was assured that the excellent gas mileage would more than make up the 5 fenning per liter price difference.

As you leave the Frankfurt airport you merge onto one of the famous German autobahns. We headed toward downtown Frankfurt for a few kilometers and then turned NE toward the town of St. Augustin. It only took a few short minutes before David had the Opel at about 85 mph in the right or slow lane. We were still being passed by most everyone on the castles on both sides of the road. The road followed a valley and the castles were situated on the hillsides. We did not stop at any of important stops to make the first

We got off the autobahn at St. Augustin and got directions to the house of a couple who were researching their genealogy. Her maiden name was Karthauser and she had been in contact with the Karthausers that we had met in Kassel. Our name had been given to her as a possible source of information. The women in St. Augustin or some of her ancestors had immigrated to the USA and she was looking for them. She worked in another city and only came home on weekends. Her husband (an offi-

cer in the German army), as his neighbors told us, came home for lunch. Since it was close to noon, we went to a shopping center that we had seen and made copies of our genealogy. We came back shortly after lunch to find that all of the neighbors had reported our visit and he was expecting us. It was at this time that we discovered that she was looking for relatives in the US. A quick check through his computerized genealogies revealed no apparent link of the two families. We did inform her husband that we were aware of a family in Nebraska and another in California and we would try to supply him some information about them. We had a very enjoyable visit and exchanged addresses and promised to keep one another informed. Her husband had independently come up with the theory that the Karthausers took their name from the Carthusian monks and since there were many monasteries, there may be many unrelated families of Karthausers.

We went to the market while waiting for her husband to come home. Margaret decided to buy some fruit for our snacks. Margaret carefully selected two of the best looking apples. The proprietress was waiting on another customer and they seemed to take more and more time finishing the other customer's order.
