Spaces are still available for crafters who wish to display and sell their goods. A 15% discount on booth rent is being offered for the months of March and April. Crafters work hours will be 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The Tea Room also located in the same building will open on Tuesday, March 14 at 6 a.m.

Fire Department Launches Annual Membership Drive

The Santa Anna Fire Department has begun their 1995 Associate Membership Drive.

The generous support received in 1994 enabled the fire department to equip the 5-ton military truck received from the Texas Forest Service. The truck now has a 1,000 gallon water capacity and pump capabilities with 2-1/2 inch hose lines. The local firemen will be able to fight fires in much

rougher terrain with this truck available. A requirement of receiving the truck was to have an enclosed building in which park the vehicle and a 20 feet by 30 feet building has been completed.

Presently the group is in the process of replacing a 500-gallon tank on one of the city pumps. An agreement between the city and the fire department allows for the use of

Willard Allen To Serve As County Judge Pro-Tem

Coleman County Commissioners met on Monday, February 27 and began their meeting by discussing insurance with James Williams representing American Medical Security who reviewed various policies of health insurance for county employees. No decision was made regarding county health insurance during the meeting.

County Commissioners Willard Allen and Alan Davis volunteered to serve on a committee with County Treasurer Kay LeMay and retired county clerk Glenn Thomas to study the insurance policies and report back to the county their findings.

Commissioner Willard Allen was elected as County Judge Pro-Tem to serve in the absence of County Judge Sherrill Ragsdale.

Ron Owens of the Coleman County Historical Commission gave a yearly report stating that the organization is growing and interest was increasing due to the group's involvement in such events as Camp Colorado Celebration. He also stated that there are approximately 330 sets of history books still remaining. Approximately \$3,000 of these books were sold during the past year.

Owens told commissioners that the balance in the account is approximately \$9,200.

The commissioners court had received a letter from Santa Fe, stating

DHS Reports \$4,128,936 Spent In County For Welfare Programs in 1994

The state spent a total of \$4,128,936 last year for major welfare programs in Coleman County, according to David Maberry, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Food stamps worth \$1,179,054 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Aide to Families to Dependent Children

(AFDC) totaled \$253,584. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

The state and federal government share in the cost of AFDC to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the ab-

sence or disability of one or both parents.

Nursing home costs of approximately \$2,043,405 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$484,986 for Medicaid related services and \$145,545 for non-Medicaid related services," Maberry said.

April 1 Deadline For Entries In Funtier Bison Cook-off, Other Plans Underway

Funtier Day organizers have set April 1 as the deadline for entries in the World Champion Bison Cook-off to be held Funtier Saturday, May 20. According to Rod Musick, there will be 25 places in the world sanctioned Bison Cook-off. Local entries will be accepted on first come basis after sanctioned cookers sign up. Local people who participated in last year's event are encouraged to take part again. Entry fee will be \$50 which will include the cost of the bison meat to be furnished. The cooked bison meat

will be sold by the Chamber of Commerce following the judging expected to take place just before noon. There will also be a brisket cook-off with entry deadline set for April 15. Contestants may cook brisket and bison or just the brisket. Entry fee for the brisket cook-off will be \$25 for those cooking just brisket and \$20 if also cooking bison. Brisket will be furnished and kept by the contestant.

All cook-off contestants will have the option to enter a jackpot

bean cook-off for an additional \$5 entry fee, winner take all. Beans will be cooked on the site and will be donated to the chamber to serve with the bison.

Bledsoe Ford will again furnish aprons for cook-off contestants.

Mrs. Wise explained that this can be anything that is no pasta. It is often fruit or salad. On this occasion the antipasta was cantaloupe garnished with thin slices of ham.

The second course was served buffet style and consisted of Fettuccini Alfredo, Insalata di Asparagi and Pollo Alla Cacciatore. Fettuccini Alfredo is noodles in a sauce made with cream. Insalata di Asparagi is marinated asparagus. Pollo alla Cacciatore is chicken cacciatore. This is chicken seasoned with the things that a hunter might carry in his pack. The buffet was served with acqua minerale (water) and bruschetta (bread).

The third course was a dessert of Torta di Trogola. This was a cake layered with custard and fresh strawberries.

Coleman County Court Report

A report received this week from County Judge Sherrill Ragsdale showed Coleman County court heard the following cases during the month of February:

Larry Zabel pled guilty to a charge of criminal mischief and was assessed a fine, jail sentence, restitution, court costs and placed on probation.

Jesse Viafranco pled guilty to DWI 1st offense and was assessed a fine, court costs and placed on probation.

Clifford Brown pled guilty to a charge of criminal mischief and was assessed a fine, court costs and placed in the county jail.

Revocation of probation hearings were conducted for Damon Harp, 1st offense DWI; Timothy D. Harris, 1st offense DWI; and James Nicholson, 1st offense DWI. Probation was revoked in all three cases.

James Leland Rice pled guilty to Disorderly Conduct and was assessed a fine, court costs and placed in county jail.

CCMC Recruits Physician From Scott & White, Talks About Ambulance Service

In a special session held Monday, February 27 the board of directors of the Coleman County Medical Center and Dr. Nick Newman, now associated with Scott & White in Temple reached an agreement wherein Dr. Newman will practice for six months at CCMC beginning March 7. Financial aspects of the agreement had not been worked out following the meeting.

Ambulance service was discussed and Dennis Dorris with EMS informed the board that state laws require EMS personnel to take patients to the facility of their choice. If a patient is being treated in one of the local clinics and the doctor wishes the patient taken somewhere other than the Coleman facility, it can become the decision of the paramedic if he determines the patient too critical to be taken anywhere but the nearest facility. Basically, Dorris said it is up to the patient to tell EMS personnel where they want to go and EMS will do as the patient asks.

The board was asked by the administrator when reviewing the Medical Staff By-Laws, if the Medical Staff did agree to these by-laws that the president be given the authority to accept and sign these showing approval of the board.

There were objections to this from a board member, feeling they should review them again after medical staff approval. A tie in voting

was broken with the president voting in favor of his signing the minutes showing approval.

According to a news release dated March 2, 1995 from the Coleman County Medical Center the Texas Department of Health surveyor, Rick Rickard, M. S., RPH, paid a follow-up visit to the medical center on Wednesday, March 1, 1995, at which time he reviewed corrections made by the hospital Medical Staff and governing board to out-of-compliance conditions and deficiencies cited from a Dec. 15, 1994 visit by Linda Lynn, R.N. of the Texas Department of Health. Lynn's visit was the result of a complaint received by the TDH.

The statement revealed that the corrections reviewed were found acceptable and brought the hospital back into compliance and stopped the decertification process. It was also revealed that a second complaint had been received.

Also in the statement from CCMC was an announcement of

the medical staff appointing Paul Moran, D.O. as Medical Director and Chief of Staff. This is pending the approval of the board of directors at their next meeting.
