## DHS Reports \$4,128,936 Spent In County For Welfare Programs in 1994

The state spent a total of \$4,128,936 last year for major welfare programs in Coleman County, according to David Maberry. Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Food stamps worth \$1,179,054 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Aide to Families to Dependent Children

(AFDC) totaled \$253,584. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

The state and federal government share in the cost of AFCD to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the ab-

sence or disability of one or both parents.

Nursing home costs of approximately \$2,043,405 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$484,986 for Medicaid related services and \$145,545 for non-Medicaid related services," Maberry said.


We ate lunch that the cafeteria ladies fixed for us.

Two groups of experts de-A two groups of englishing weloped recommended immunization schedules that are slightly different. However, when fol lowed, both schedules provide maximum protection from the diseases. And both schedules agree that basic immunization should begin in infancy. All experts agree that complete immunization is very important.

In Texas, we have a law that eeks to provide minimum protection for children in day care centers and schools. But children shouldn't wait until school to get their shots. Children should be fully immunized before they are two years old.

**Q.** My three children are dif-ferent ages. They need their shots at different times. I work and I just don't have the time to keep up with this.

A new Texas law provides A new lexas law products free or low-cost immunizations, and many clinics and doctors' offices are opening their doors after normal business hours to help parents who cannot bring their chil dren for immunizations during the day. Ask your doctor or clinic if evening or weekend visits are pos sible.

Keeping up with your children's mmunization records is very important, and your doctor or clinic will be happy to help you with this. And don't panic if you find out your children are behind schedule. What's important is to catch up They should be fully protected and you may save yourself many lost work hours and the general inconvenience of caring for sick children in the future.







This means a disability should not keep you from getting insurance unless a company can show you are more likely to have claims than people the company is willing to insure. The same goes for canceling or refusing to renew your policy, charging a higher premium or refusing to pay a valid claim.

In other words, you should get the same consideration and the same access to insurance as applicants without disabilities when your disability doesn't increase your risk of a claim.

There are cases where a disability makes you a greater insurance risk and cases where it does not, Here are two examples from the new bookdet:

• A person with an uncorrectable vision problem is a high risk for an automobile insurance policy butall else being equal --- is no riskier than anybody else for a health insurance policy.

• A recent cancer patient usually represents a higher risk for health insurance but not for a homeowners policy.

Remember, it is the company's responsibility to demonstrate that you are a higher risk.

It is important to answer truthfully any health questions on an application for insurance. Failure to do so could jeopardize future claims or even result in cancellation of the policy.

If a company sells you a health insurance policy despite a "preexisting" health problem, it can exclude coverage of that condition either permanently or temporarily.

What can you do if you believe an insurance company is not treating you as the law requires because of your disability?

First, try to resolve the problem yourself. Talk to the company and the agent. Ask for a written response. If that doesn't work, you can complain to the Texas Department of Insurance. The Department acts as an ombudsman for consumers. You can get a complaint form by calling, toll-free 1 800 252-3439. \*


