City Council Raises Water Rates And Calls Tax Election

The Santa Anna City Council met on Tuesday, June 13 with Mayor Danny Kellar presiding over the meeting. Present were council members, Jim Spillman, Tex Wright, Bobby Morgan, Karen Morris, and visitors Jim Laubhan, Superintendent of Operations Tommy Jackson, Chief of Police Carlos Torres, Pat Wright and City Secretary Alys Pelton.

According to minutes of the council meeting, the City Utility Fund has not been self-supporting for more than a year and the City has discussed how to meet the operational costs and annual bond payments. The council passed an ordinance, effective July 1, increasing the water rates from \$22.11 to \$25.00 for the minimum of 3,000 gallons and from \$2.95 to \$3.00 per thousand after the minimum. The minimum water bill will increase by \$2.89 per month.

The police report was reviewed with Police Chief Carlos Torres. He reported that he did not believe that a reserve force was necessary at this time as the Sheriff's Department has done an excellent job covering on his day's off. The Council requested that Torres keep them informed of any new developments regarding the reserve program or part-time help.

Superintendent of Operations, Tommy Jackson told the council the fire department was still concerned about the condition of the old City Hall. He is still attempting to get some cost estimates for repair on the building.

The petition of Jim Laubhan to rezone his property on Mountain Oaks Street to commercial was tabled until the ordinance can be reviewed to see what steps are necessary to rezone the property.

Also tabled was Laubhan's petition to close the west half of Mountain Street. According to plats that section of street is not designated as a street but an alley. The street running north and south between Laubhan's property and Albert Bomba's property is also an alley.

Pat Wright, chairman of the Santa Anna Development Board, reported to the Council that legislation failed to pass the combining of the 4A and 4B sales tax for economic development. The board proposes to the council to call for an election to be held on August 12 on 1/2 percent 4B sales tax and 1/2 percent for property tax relief.

Jackson reported that the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission had inspected the water treatment plant. The plant was

not in compliance with several regulations. Repairs and cost estimates are being done to begin meeting the regulations. Rusty Wells will be working on the city town crew and Thomas Watson will be taking over the water treatment plant. Mayor Kellar and Councilman Morgan met with the Brown County Water Improvement District and discussed the possibility of purchasing treated water. Committees from each entity will be looking into this possibility. Kellar appointed Councilmen Morgan and Spillman and Tommy Jackson and himself to meet with the water district's committee.

The City is considering annexing several outlying areas and the Council was presented with copies of the steps to be taken to annex an area from the Texas Municipal Law and Procedure Manual. The Civic Center (Armory) rental will increase from \$50 per day to \$100 per day.

School Board Hears Request For Baseball Program, Delays Decision Until Further Study

The Santa Anna ISD Board of Trustees met Tuesday, June 13 for their regular monthly meeting.

Judy Hartman administered the Oath of Office to Edwin Hipsher, Dickie Horner and Marty Donham, newly elected trustees.

Marty Donham was elected to serve as board president for the next year with Roddy Dean serving as vice president and Edwin Hipsher elected to the position of secretary of the board.

The board voted to extend the interlocal agreement with CAP High School.

Orvel Hall was appointed as Pest Management Coordinator of the newly approved Pest Management Policy for the district.

David Yancy, Booster Club President, addressed the Board concerning adding baseball to the district athletic program. He presented a petition of 150 signatures and also a price quote from B & B Athletics for equipment. The board has requested that Yancy return to the July board meeting with more

information concerning the land and ownership of the property for the proposed baseball field.

The board gave its approval to an increase of \$2,909 to the General Operating Fund and to increase appropriations of \$18,934.

The Santa Anna National Bank was awarded the school depository contract for the 1995-97 school years.

Robert Noreiga, spokesperson for the Economic Development Committee made a request of the board to endorse the half-cent sales tax proposal for economic development of the city of Santa Anna. The motion passed 3-2.

The board heard the first reading of update 49 to the localized policy manual. The second reading will be heard at the regular board meeting in July.

The administration was instructed to pursue the possibility of installing circulating fans in the auditorium and reported their finding at the August meeting.

A Pre-K class will be established

on the elementary school following the passing of the motion.

A discussion was held regarding the placement of the 6th grade class but no formal motions were made,

leaving that determination to the administration.

Following much discussion and input from parents and teachers, a motion was passed to have a modified block schedule established in the secondary school at Superintendent Dean Bass's discretion.

Burl Lowry, CPA was employed to conduct the end of year audit for 1995.

Judy Hartman, business manager, reports on the balances of each account and a report from the Appraisal District regarding tax collections. She also presented a budget report for the month of June.

Montie Guthrie, school counselor reported on the 1994-95 TAAS results for the district.

The final enrollment for the school year was 312 students.

Santa Anna Foundation Organizes, Names Trustees

The first meeting of the Santa Anna Foundation was held Saturday, June 17. Present were Jim Laubhan, Burgess Sealy, Burgess Weaver, W.W. Gatlin and Rod Musick. I.R.S. forms for organization were distributed to the trustees and discussed. Terms for the trustees were set for Gatlin (1 year) Burgess Sealy (2 years), Jim Laubhan (3 years), Burgess Weaver (4 years), and Angie Hernandez (5 years). Officers of the Santa Anna Foundation board of trustees will be Angie Hernandez, chairman and Jim Laubhan vice chairman.

It was discussed that the important thing to do now is to raise money for the foundation. Everyone is a fundraiser and open to any suggestions as to what they can do to raise as much as possible.

The trustees will meet on a quarterly basis.

Rod Musick is president of the Santa Anna Foundation and Marty Donham serves as vice president of the group which was formed to administer funds for the Ex-Student Association scholarship program and to help improve the economic outlook of Santa Anna. The Ex-Students will provide the criteria for

awarding scholarships from proceeds from investments. The foundation will not have any real input into the scholarship program but will combine the money with other monies it receives for investment purposes.

The Santa Anna Foundation is organized as a general charitable foundation and will also work toward economic and historic development of Santa Anna by assisting the Santa Anna Historical Development Organization establish a Native American Museum in Santa Anna in cooperation with the Comanche Indian Nation.

According to its organizational plans, the Foundation will solicit donations from local sources, from outside sources that have an interest in Santa Anna, from outside business sources that have a vested interest in Santa Anna and from other foundations that may endow the local foundation. It will team up with other groups such as the economic development departments of companies such as West Texas Utilities, Lone Star Gas and Rural Electric companies with the intent of helping to fund buildings,

equipment, loan guarantees, training as required, and other stimulations to the local business economy. The board of trustees will develop the criteria for applicants to meet and will make the decisions for extending assistance.

City Hall Says Vote Will Decide Future Of Economic Development

Santa Anna voters will have a chance to decide on the future of economic development in August,

when a proposal to create an economic development fund with a one-half percent property tax relief and a one-half percent 4B sales tax goes before Santa Anna voters.

The City Council called for the election with an unanimous vote Tuesday night, June 13. The

money would be used to help existing businesses and bring new jobs to Santa Anna.

The total one percent sales tax for economic development is a crucial toll for economic development and the future of Santa Anna. The voters of Santa Anna deserve the chance to say yes to the future and pass these propositions.

According to a special news release from City Hall, the sales tax would generate approximately \$10,000 each year and approximately \$10,000 in reduced property taxes. The money would be spent on economic development projects which could include a low-interest loan program for starting or expanding small businesses; incentives for businesses considering moving to Santa Anna; or improvements to the City's potential job market.

A special election for the economic development sales tax and the property tax relief propositions has been scheduled for August 12.

Eligible persons will receive emergency food assistance without regard to their race, color, age, national origin, political beliefs, religion, sex or disability.

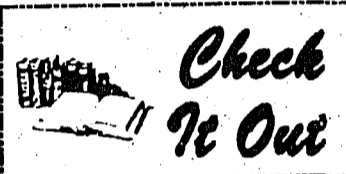
All allocation of commodity items depend on the availability of food from the USDA and CTO has no control over what items are available nor their quantity.

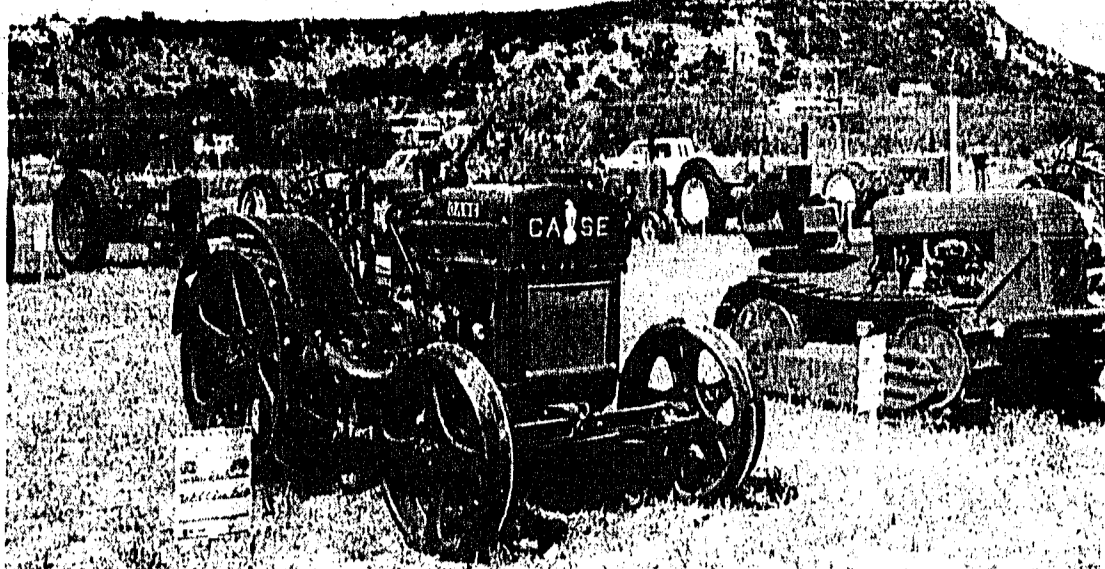

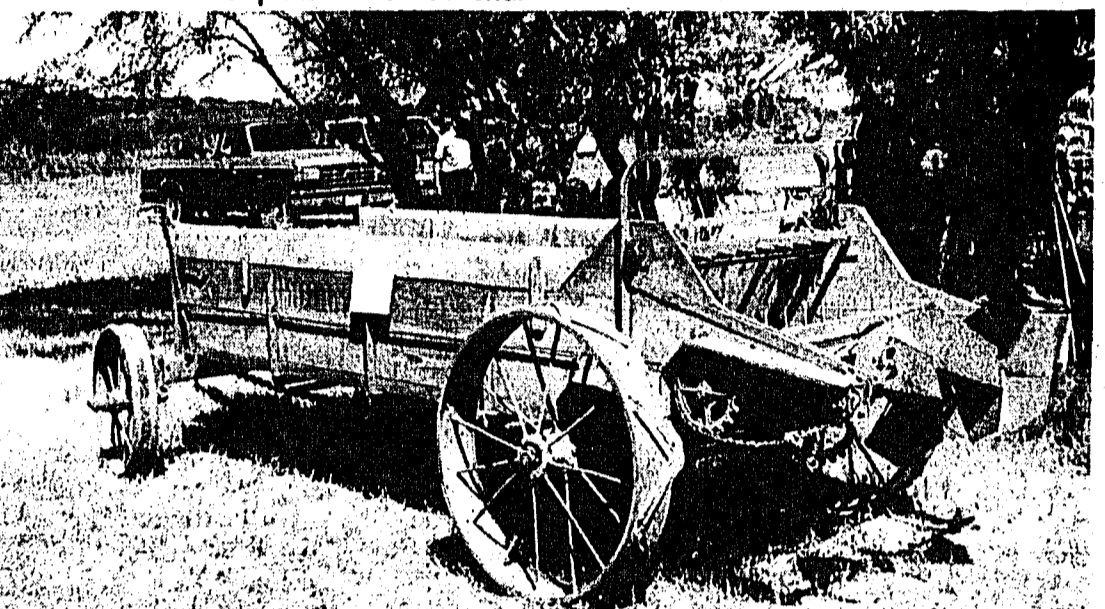

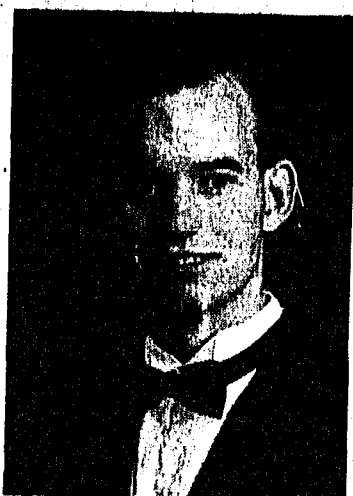
4-H Fashion Show To Be Held In Coleman Tues.

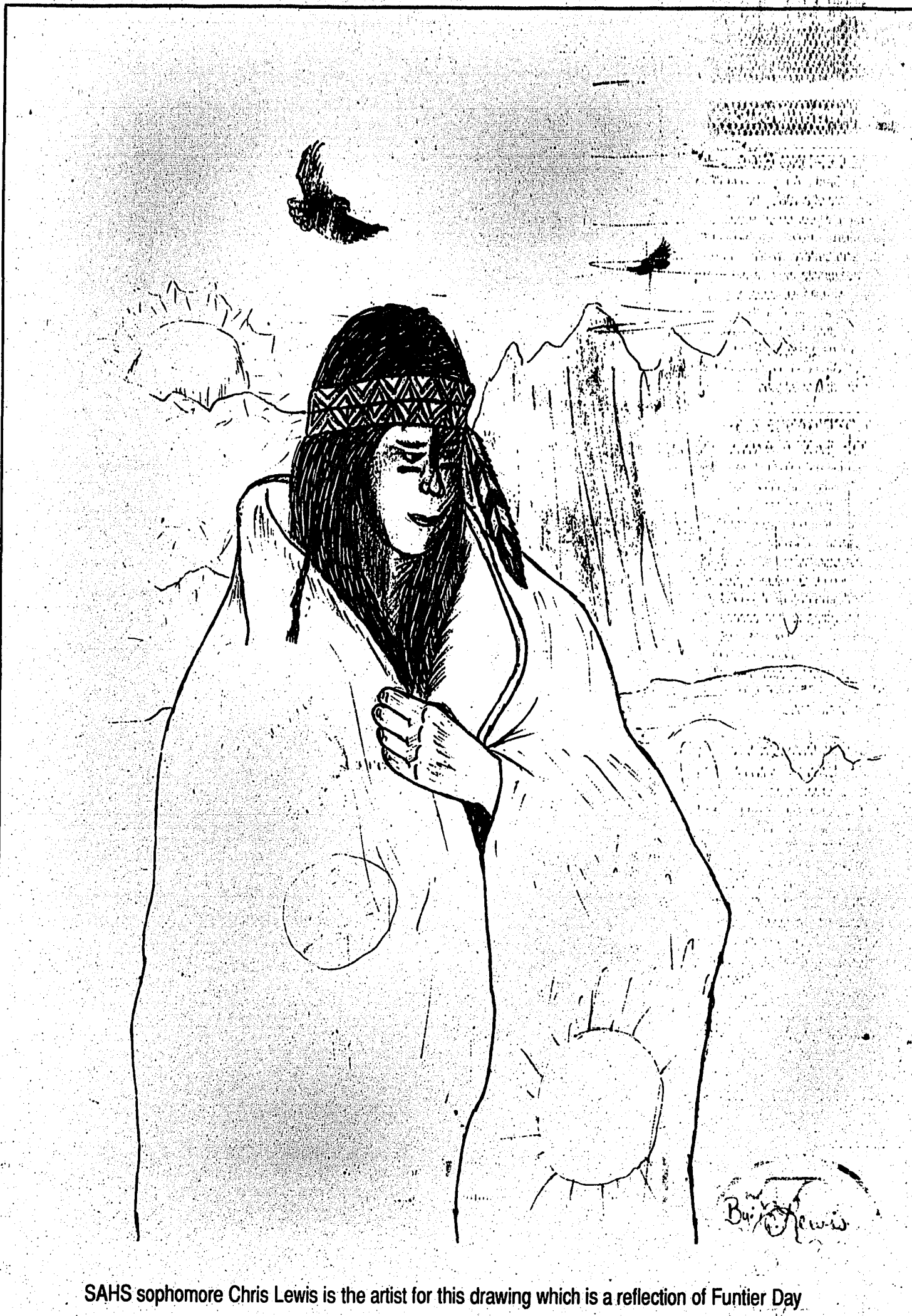

Registered mail offers the highest security of the accountable services available from the Postal Service. It is so secure that when New York jeweler Harry Winston donated the famous Hope Diamond to the Smithsonian Museum of Natural History, he chose registered mail. Most of us will never have the responsibility of mailing something as valuable as the Hope Diamond, but there will be times when the added security of registered mail is a welcome service. And for an additional fee, postal insurance for registered items valued at up to \$25,000 also can be obtained. If you feel that registered mail is more protection than you need and the item to be mailed is valued less than \$600, insured mail is your best bet. For example, if you are mailing a set for crystal goblets as a wedding present to a favorite niece, you may want to protect your purchase against loss or damage. As long as the goblets are protected sufficiently by proper packaging, their value is less than \$600 maximum, and you can provide evidence of value, such as a receipt from the store where they were purchased, you can save money with insured mail and still get the desired protection. Certified mail is another effective accountable service, although it is not designed to insure valuables. Certified mail provides you with a mailing receipt and a record of delivery. Most people use certified mail to send documents when they need legal proof of mailing. For example, if you receive a check written against insufficient funds, many states require that you send a letter of demand by certified mail to the issuer of the check before you can pursue any other legal remedies. The record of delivery or return receipt option can also be purchased with most other delivery services, including Express Mail. These are just a few examples of how registered, insured and certified options can meet your mailing needs. Firearms Training Program To Begin September 1

AUSTIN--Texans interested in obtaining a license to carry a concealed handgun will be able to start the required firearms training program as soon as the law goes into effect on September 1, DPS Director James R. Wilson said recently.

"We have an internal task force up and running to do what needs to be done to make this new law work," Wilson said. "We anticipate that we will start training firearms instructors this summer and our goal is to have these instructors licensed and able to start training interested citizens after September 1."

Wilson said the Department is currently developing forms, procedures and rules in order to begin accepting applications for concealed handgun license on September 1.

"Texans need to remember that the current weapons laws remain in effect until January 1, 1996," Wilson said.

"In the meantime, we ask the public's patience as we get this program set up," Wilson said. "We will make an announcement to the public when our training classes have been set, with instructions on how to enroll. But the Department is not currently accepting fees or application requests for instructors or licenses."

The Director cautioned that no firearms instructors or training facilities have been approved by the Department at this time. When instructors and training facilities have been approved, this information will be released to the public. We will be issuing periodic updates to keep the public informed on policies and procedures as they are developed.

When application request cards for licenses are available, which is expected to be mid-August, they will be distributed to all areas of the state, Wilson said. Applicants who must meet the basic qualifications will be able to submit these request forms to the DPS at that time.

"A complete application packet will be furnished to those who request it," Wilson said. "That application, with required forms and fees, may be submitted to the Department after September 1. The validity of the information provided

AUSTIN — More than 18,000 state inmates that have been temporarily housed in county jails will enter 13 new state prisons this month and in July and a 14th facility will open in August, in the state's \$1.5 billion prison expansion program.

With the new prisons operating, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice capacity reaches 133,000 inmates and becomes the largest modern prison system in the world. Another 14 state prison facilities are scheduled to open in 1996, increasing the capacity to 144,000 inmates, said TDCJ spokesman Glen Castleberry.

"Thanks to the vision of the Legislature and the taxpayers who approved the prison construction bonds, Texas is ahead of the curve," said TDCJ executive direc-

tor James A. "Andy" Collins.
Costs State \$650 Million
The number of state prisoners being housed in county jails peaked at nearly 30,000 in 1994, and cost the state more than \$650 million in fines and payments to counties that housed state prisoners.

The backlog of prisoners housed in county jails swelled in the late 1980s due to increasing crime coupled with a federal court order that curbed overcrowding in the state's prison system.

Senator's Contract Suspended
Harris County's adult probation department has suspended the consulting contract of state Sen. John Whitmire, pending an investigation by the district attorney.

State District Judge George Godwin, who chairs the committee of judges that oversees the probation department, said that though he believes Whitmire's contract went through proper channels, it was "bad judgement" to have accepted it, the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Godwin was not chair when the \$4,000 a month contract was accepted in 1993. Whitmire was retained by the probation department to assist in legal issues regarding penal code changes that he wrote into state law during the 1993 legislative session. To date he has been paid more than \$80,000.

The state constitution prohibits legislators from benefiting directly or indirectly from legislation for which they appropriate money. But Whitmire claims he was not paid with state money, and therefore did not violate state law.

"My check came from Harris County," he told the *Chronicle*.

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice is conducting its own investigation of Whitmire's contract with Harris County. Last week Whitmire suggested conflicts of interest exist in the TDCJ, alleging Criminal Justice Board member John Ward of Gatesville has a conflict of interest because his wife is a principal in the prison school system.

But TDCJ spokesman Glen Castleberry said Whitmire's allegations are without substance. "I don't know why the senator is bringing up stuff like this, other than to divert attention from his own contract."

95% of Seniors Pass TAAS

An estimated 95 percent of the state's high school seniors passed the high school graduation exam, the Texas Education Agency reported last week.

State Education Commissioner Mike Moses said the passing rate is the highest percentage since officials raised the minimum passing standard on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) to 70 percent. Agency figures show 174,568 students of the 1995 senior class total of 183,737 passed all sections of the exam; 9,169 seniors, or 5 percent, failed one or more sections of the test and did not get diplomas.

Students have eight chances to pass the test. Those who failed can continue to take the test until they pass; the next test will be given July 11-13 at sites across the state. Moses said the 95 percent pass rate indicates that "Texas schools are steadily improving."

Virus Threatens Shrimp

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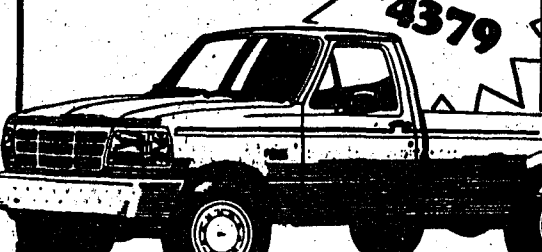
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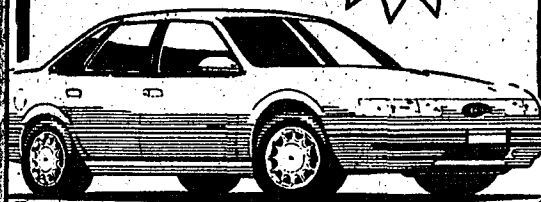
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
