There are a total of 26 subjects in the study ranging from four to 61 years of age who have impairments that include arthritis, stroke, spina bifida, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis, cerebral palsy and spinal cord injury. Some of the subjects are commuting from Dallas and other cities three days per week, where they spend from one to two hours going through

their prescribed exercise routine. The students serving as personal trainers have chosen career paths that involve health and physical education in some form or another,

either as medical doctors, physical therapists, exercise physiologists, researchers or educators. As a result of their experience with the study. the students are seeing that the principles of wellness and physical conditioning, apply equally to people with disabilities and are surprised to learn that programs of this nature are not more readily available. Some are already contemplating the idea of working with physicians and other rehabilitation professionals to help implement and manage this type of program within the community to which they will return after graduation.

Debbie exercises while Buddy monitors heart rate and blood pressure response to selected workloads to keep Debbie at the proper training intensity. 

J. Woodrow Gilbert, 74, of San Angelo and formerly of Santa Anna, died Wednesday, April 5, 1995 in San Angelo.



### A View of Changing Consumer Attitudes

1995 EAT RIGHT AMERICA "Discover Nutrition Anytime, Anywhere" campaign, a brief look into consumer attitudes and behavior about nutrition and diet is based on the recently published Food Marketing Institute (FMI) "Trends '94" study which began in the early 1970's. After over 2000 supermarket shoppers were interviewed, the following results were obtained:

\*66 percent felt diet could be healthier

\*62 percent were concerned about the nutritional content of food they

\*59 percent since 1986 are more concerned about fat in food

\*less concern about cholesterol, sugar and sodium in foods

\*94 percent say eating habits to help ensure a healthful diet have changed

\*trend of eating more fruits and vegetables to achieve a healthful

\*33 percent eat less fat and oil \*few reported dietary changes of eating more fish and fiber and less

What this report really tells us about consumers is that they still have desire to improve the nutritional quality of their diets. Many consumers are indeed making dietary changes by increasing fruits and vegetables while decreasing fats and oils. Besides these points, consumers seem to be less concerned and are making fewer changes in

their dietary behavior. So why all the hype and hoopla with healthful foods? Consumers are demanding foods with they perceive to be more healthful, make them feel better, and make them look better. These dynamic changes will continue to impact the food system. Like the consumers healthful changes mentioned above, start making some of these changes in your lifestyle and nutrition or eating habits. Right now during nutrition month is a good time to

### Plant Health And Happiness This Spring

Spring brings promise of new life--fruiting trees, green lawns and fields of colorful wildflowers. With nature's reawakening come feelings of hope and cheer for the human spirit. Who doesn't appreciate a pot of bright begonias or the splendid Meet April 18 fragrance of yellow Carolina jessamine blooms?

No wonder gardening is the number one outdoor leisure-time activity of American households. As well as being fun, gardening and plants provide real benefits to our environment, health and well-being.

Environment. Plants filter pollutants from the air, reduce erosion, save energy, slow water runoff and provide wildlife habitat.

Nitrogen oxide, carbon dioxide, airborne ammonia, formaldehyde and benzene are all harmful substances plants absorb, cleaning the air we breathe. Trees and shrubs remove gaseous pollutants by absorbing them through openings on their leaf surfaces. Particle pollutants such as dust, ash and smoke are trapped and filtered by leaves, stems and twigs and finally washed to the ground by rainfall. NASA studies have shown that even one potted plant per 100 square feet of indoor floor space significantly improves air quality.

Plant roots increase soil permeability, thereby diminishing surface water runoff and improving ground water recharge. Vast networks of roots also hold soil in place limit-

Energy conservation can also be augmented by properly placed landscapes. Strategic landscapes save energy through cooling in the hotter months and provide a windbreak during winter. Accurately positioned shade trees--a minimum of three large trees--can reduce air conditioning costs up to 30 percent. Noise pollution also can be lessened by using plant material. A belt of trees 98 feet wide and 49 feet tall can reduce highway noise by 6 to 10 decibels, a sound reduction of almost 50 percent.

Where better than the branches of a mighty oak or in the tangles vine of Asian jasmine should birds and squirrels make their homes? Wildlife must have food, shelter and water to live. Two of the three are provided by plants. No plants, no wildlife.

Health and well-being. Oxygen production is the most obvious benefit plants provide. Enough oxygen is supplied by the grass and trees along the U.S. interstate highway system to support 22 million people.

Additionally, many of our medicines are derivatives of plant products. Plants can also have psychological benefits. Research conducted by Dr. Roger Ulrich, a University of Delaware professor, showed hospital patients in rooms overlooking landscaped areas had post-operative stays of 7.9 days. compared to 8.7 days for those without a view. According to patient charts, those with pleasant views also required less potent painkillers, had fewer post-operative complications and reported a more positive health experience.

While the United States food supply is one of the safest in the world, nearly 30 million Americans suffer from some type of foodborne illness each year. Farmers, food processors, supermarkets and restaurants follow strict rules and regulations to help ensure safe and wholesome food for consumers. Government officials closely monitor them to ensure food safety practices as well. But what happens to the food once taken from the grocery cart to the car and then on to the home. Most of the reported "bad food" and foodborne illnesses are due to bacterial contamination.
