Boylston's Progress Encouraging

Novelle Boylston, 66, was critically injured in a two-car collision Friday afternoon.

Boylston was driving a Ford Escort south on Sixth Street and Edwin Hipsher was driving an Oldsmobile heading west on Avenue B when the two autos

collided at the intersection according to Santa Anna Chief of Police Carlos Torres. The impact sent Boylston's vehicle into a nearby yard.

Boylston was rushed by ambulance to Brownwood Regional Medical Center where she was later transferred by CareFlite to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene.

Hipsher was released after being treated for minor injuries.

Family members said that Boylston had just returned from vis-

iting relatives in Abilene and had been making preparations to attend Good Friday evening services and running a few errands.

Her sister, Carol McClellan, said Tuesday night that Mrs. Boylston was still listed as critical but

doctors say her progress is very encouraging and she could be moved out of the Critical Care Unit unit by the end of the week.

Elementary School Principal Hired

In a called meeting taking place Monday night, the Santa Anna school board named Leland (Lee) Coffman to move into the elementary principal's office when the current principal, Dean Bass, takes over as superintendent of schools at the end of this school year.

Coffman, age 43, is presently employed as elementary principal at Rosebud-Lott. A native of Clyde, he previously taught several years in Abilene. Mrs. Coffman is a

native of Brady and is a member of the teaching profession. The couple has one small child. The NEWS hopes to have more information about Coffman at a later date.

In its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday of last week, the board heard a proposal from senior class leadership concerning an open campus during the lunch hour. The board approved a trial period, limiting the plan to seniors only. It will be reviewed during the summer and a decision made as to approve

the plan again for the new school year, second semester only. Approval for next year will be based on any discipline action that might be required along with other considerations.

School nurse Debbie Dean presented curriculum for an AIDS education program. The board agreed to consider the proposal at the next board meeting.

The board authorized the sale of two school buses at a school bus auction to be held May 6 in Abilene, subject to a fair price.

An addition to the transfer policy was approved in preparation for the next school year. Under the added policy, no transfer student will be accepted after Sept. 1 unless the reasons for transfer fall within exemptions approved by TEA.

Early Voting Underway In Local Elections

Early voting started Monday, April 17, and will continue through Tuesday, May 2 for the May 6 local elections.

Listed in the order of their appearance on the ballot for Mayor and City Council are Danny Kellar and Debra Smiley who are in the race for Mayor. Two full term seats are open in the city council race. Mike Pritchard and James Spillman are candidates for the two slots, with Spillman being an incumbent. D.D. "Tex" Wright is the lone candidate for an unexpired term left open by the resignation of councilwoman Wanda Campbell. Wright was appointed to serve in that place until the seat could be filled at election time. Early voting is taking place at the City Hall from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday

through Friday.

Three places are open in the school trustee election. Candidates in the order listed on the ballot are Marty Donham, Clint Day, Edwin Hipsher and Richard "Dickie" Horner. Donham, Day and Hipsher are incumbents. Early voting is taking place at the school business office from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Four places are open on the Coleman County Medical Center Board. Incumbents seeking re-election are Carolyn Maddox, Virginia Jamison and Bruce Pittard. Newcomer challengers are Ron Owens, Randall French and Foster Miller. Early voting is taking place at the Medical Center business office from 8 a.m. through 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

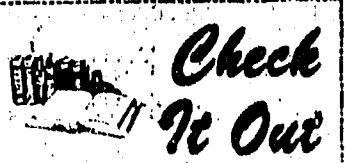

Improper Treatment Of Accident Victim May Cause Additional Injury

The response of some passers-by at the serious auto accident recently indicated that some persons are unfamiliar with basic first aid and rescue techniques. Improper emergency treatment could result in more serious and possibly permanent damage to the victim or victims.

One of the first instructions in the Medical Emergency First Aid Guide emphasizes that if a spine or neck injury is suspected, DO NOT move the victim—unless there is a life threatening danger, such as fire or explosion. If the victim is unconscious but breathing, do not attempt CPR.

Moving an injured person without proper immobilization risks additional injury. Nerves and blood

vessels can be injured by broken bones, causing a more urgent situation.

Although assisting at an emergency situation is commendable, it should be remembered that improper treatment of an accident victim can often cause additional injury. Everyone is urged to study a first aid manual and become familiar with the proper techniques and procedures before attempting to respond to an emergency situation.

(The NEWS would like to clarify that although an improper response may have been deliberated in this incident, none was carried out.)

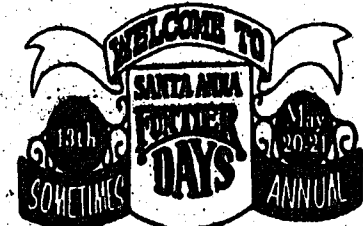

Fishing Lake Ivie

Conditions continue to be good to excellent for bass fishing. Black bass are being located along points and flats of the main lake and in brushy areas. They are spawning in the main lake in 5-15 foot water. All types of bait are good. Lots of 14" to 16" fish being along with many keeper size.

Smallmouth bass conditions are fair to good with best locations being points, rocky areas, main lake and ridges at depths of 0-20 feet.

Crappie fishing has slowed some as the spawning period comes to an end. But fishing is pretty good in the brushy areas of the main lake. Night fishing is still the best. Use minnows and jigs.

Channel blue catfish conditions are good in the flats of the main lake and in the Concho and Colorado rivers. Use stink bait and shad. Good results on both rod/reels and trollines.

The same can be said for yellow catfish. About the same locations, using live bait. 915-357-4785

answered questions from council members. He also told members that most reserve program provide for continuing education, liability and worker's compensation insurance. Other requirements vary from program to program.

No water leaks were reported during March. State inspectors have inspected the water plant, wastewater treatment plant and the landfills. Problem areas will be corrected as outlined by the inspectors.

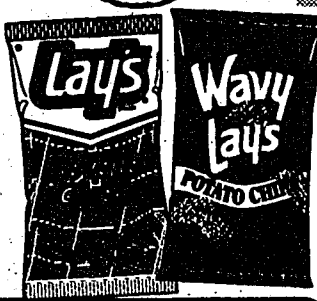

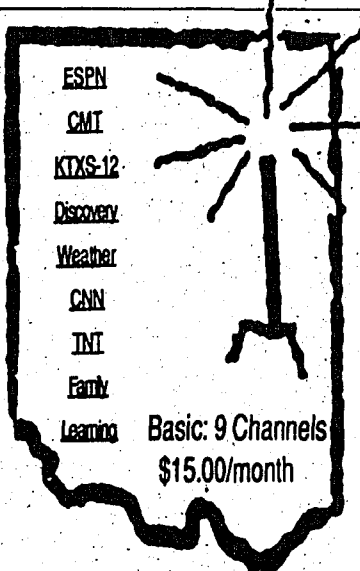
