

City officials are advising citizens to be aware of street sweeping machines that will be operating in downtown Santa Anna Monday, May 1.







News For And About Santa Anna Mountaineers

When I was a child, my life at Grandma's house was filled with some of the most memorable moments I have ever experienced.

Summertime was our favorite time of the year at Grandma's house. The grandchildren would make plans to join together and reunite, as well as visit Grandma. All sixteen little feet were always up to wondering down by the creek bank, although we knew it was not safe to go to the creek by ourselves. Every once in a while, if we were lucky, Grandma would talk Grandpa into taking us fishing. With our long, limber cane fishing poles in our little hands and a bucket of big. fat juicy worms, we trotted down to the creek for a day of sun and fun. Each one of us was so excited about getting to go fishing. It was always fun to see who could catch the biggest and slimiest fish.

Occasionally, there would be times when the fish were not biting. When this happened we would jump at the chance to get to go swimming in the creek even though it was filled with rocks, moss and sometimes a few snakes. The creek rocks were slippery beneath our feet

soft and slimy as it oozed between our toes. It made us feel as though we were sinking in quick sand. Swimming was so much fun. We would dazzle around like fish until we looked like floating prunes or until Grandma called us to come to the house for some of her scrump-

tious down home cooking. Lunchtime at Grandma's was like a taste of heaven. She would whip up some of her famous mashed potatoes or maybe fix a few of our favorite green and yellow vegetables. Each of us would always strive to clean each morsel of food from our plate because we knew we would receive a reward such as a big bowl of chocolate swirl ice cream or maybe an extra big slice of her mouth watering chocolate cake.

When lunchtime was over, Grandma would insist that we lay our cranky little heads down for a nice long afternoon nap. Everyone did not exactly agree to or was real excited about having to take a nap, even though we had exhausted all our energy during the morning hours. We thought taking a nap interfered with all that valuable time that could be spent doing more important things, such as playing and doing things outside. We all loved

playing together and we would beg Grandma to let us play instead of taking a nap, but all the begging in the world did not change her mind. She always told us, "One has to obey orders."

rested, we were ready for an afternoon of more fun and games. As children, all of us always enjoyed playing in the mud, so naturally, everyone always enjoyed helping make sun pies. Grandma always kept a box of old pots and pans for us to use when we played outside. We would get the box, rummage through it gathering the needed materials, and set out to see who could make the biggest and most elaborate sun pie. Each of us would whip up our own combination of water and dirt, arrange it in a pan, and set it out so it would bake in the sun until it was hard and crisp. Some of us might get industrious and add that extra touch to the top of our pie by decorating it with acorns, gravel, leaves or flower petals.

While we were baking our sun pies and playing games with each other, Grandma would sit in her old squeaky, cane rocking chair and read us stories from her favorite book or tell us stories of when she was a child and what it was like for her when she was growing up. Her childhood stories were always so interesting because there were always so many exciting and unbelievable things that happened in her life. Some of the stories were so good, that we would ask her to tell them over and over again.

By the end of the day everyone was tired, exhausted and very dirty. Even though the day had been filled with laughter, fun and excitement, we were always ready to go home to mom and dad. For some of us the trip home was long, for others it was short, but it always gave us time to think and plan what exciting things we could do tomorrow.






