Born Dec. 31, 1920 on the Brown Ranch in Coleman County to the late Doss and Josie Smith. He was raised in Coleman County and attended schools in Whon and Rockwood.

He served in the U. S. Navy from 1940-46. On March 20, 1948 he married Betty Smith in Abilene and they returned to Abilene in November of 1993. A veteran of World War II and a Pearl Harbor survivor, he was employed by KRBC-TV until 1982 when he retired as Chief Engineer.

He was an amateur radio operator AE51, member of the Key City Amateur Radio Club, the American Radio Relay League and the VFW of Abilene.

Major Dwight Eppler Receives Outstanding Service Award

Major Dwight Eppler was recently awarded the Military Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal in ceremonies at MacDill Air Force Base, Florida. The medal recognizes his outstanding volunteer service to the Brandon and Valrico, Florida communities as a counselor with the Bell Shoals Church of Christ from April 1, 1987 until December 31, 1994. Major Eppler performed over 1511 hours of individual, family, and marital counseling, successfully handling difficult cases involving rape, sexual abuse, terminal illness, grief, marital problems, and divorce. He began volunteer counseling soon after moving to the area, working with clients after work, on weekends, and between deployments to Africa, the Middle East, and a 13-month tour in Korea.

The Military Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal was approved for Army personnel in January 1995 and Major Eppler is the first known recipient of the award at MacDill Air Force Base.

Awardees must perform outstanding volunteer community service of a sustained, direct, and consequential nature to qualify for the medal. The Tampa Chamber of Commerce had previously recognized his contribution to the community through the Military Citizen of the Year program.

Major Eppler received his Master's Degree in Counseling from the University of Louisville in 1986. He will retire from active duty this fall and is making plans to qualify as a licensed Florida Mental Health Counselor. At the present time, he and his family intend to remain in the Valrico, Florida area where he hopes to eventually set up his own counseling center and help train and license counseling students in addition to providing therapy.

Dwight is the son of Mrs. Velma Eppler of Coleman. He is married to the former Debra McReynolds, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David McReynolds of Lake Brownwood.

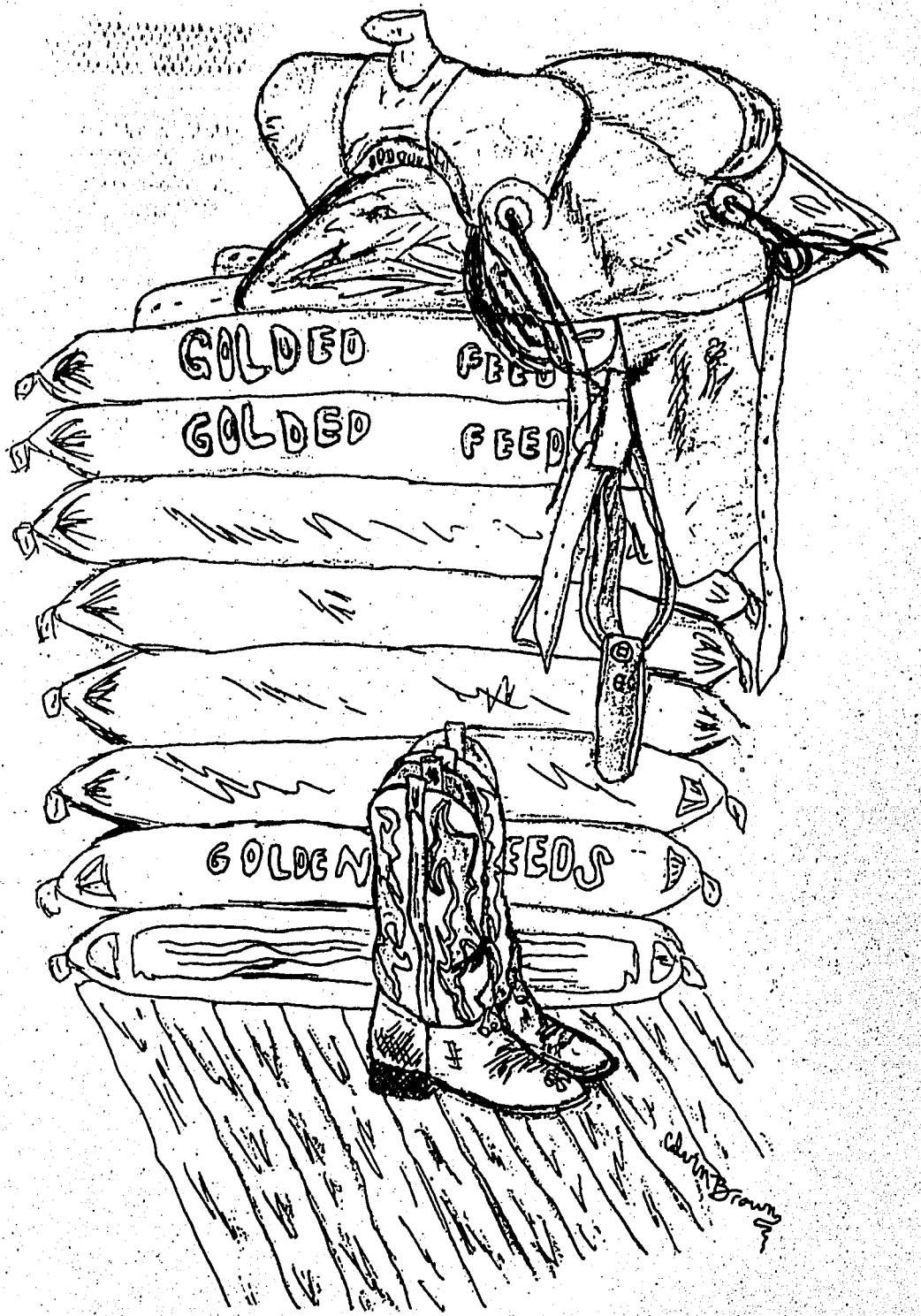

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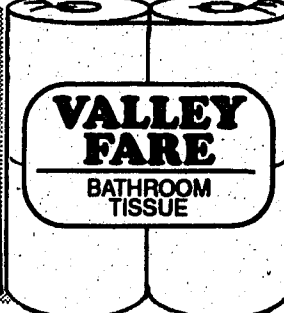
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SAHS Writes

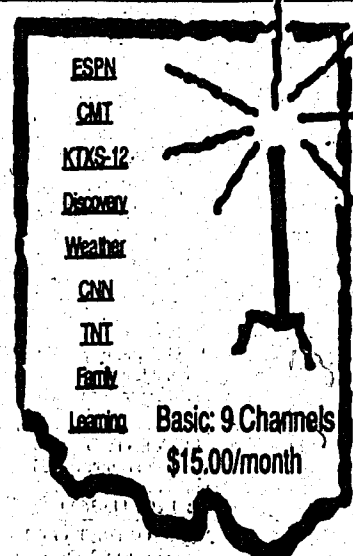
