Friendship Treaty Between S.A. And Comanches Will Be Signed Sat. At Funtier Square

A site near Chief Santa Anna's Peaks (Funtier Square) will be the location Saturday for another treaty to be signed between the Comanche Nation and a group of Texans. The group of Texans will actually be the people of Santa Anna who will be represented at the symbolic treaty signing by Mayor Danny Kellar, U.S. Representative Charles Stenholm, State Senator Bill Sims and State Representative Bob Turner. The Comanche Nation will be represented at the treaty signing by Wallace Coffey who is Comanche Tribal Chairman, and others of the delegation of Comanche people who will be on hand Saturday for Funtier Day activities.

Since Funtier Day activities include the World Champion Bison Cook-off and Comanche culture was closely tied to buffalo hunting it is only appropriate that members of the Texas Bison Grower's Association will also be on hand for the treaty signing ceremony and will make Comanche Tribal Chairman Wallace Coffey an honorary member of that group.

Among those highly interested in watching the ceremony take place will be Linda Pelon of Dallas who has been very instrumental in bringing the groups together in mutual interest. It was her research in the Santa Anna-Comanche connection that ignited the interest and helped develop the friendship between the two.

According to Montie Guthrie, chairman of the Santa Anna Historical Development Organization, "The treaty signing will be a symbol of the friendship and mutual cooperation between the Comanche Nation and the city of Santa Anna as it represents the heart of the Penatuhkuh Comanche heartland."

Guthrie added that the treaty will re-enforce the friendship and partnership between the two peoples as they attempt projects of mutual benefit. It will recognize the historical significance of the Comanche people to Texas and specifically to this area of the state.

To mark the important significance of this partnership, the Santa Anna Historical Development Organization will present the people of the Comanche Nation with a registered quarter horse donated by Taylor Farms of Abilene.

The treaty signing will take place at 1:00 p.m. at Funtier Square.

Comanche Culture Feature Of Exhibits

This year's Funtier Day celebration will be emphasizing the Comanche culture and traditional aspects of their heritage.

With a backdrop of tee-pees, members of the Comanche Nation will be presenting talks during Funtier Day activities relating to the Comanche culture.

The very interesting talks will be telling us, among other things,

about their religion and explaining traditional dress. The information will help renew the importance of the Comanche to the history of this area.

At the exhibits you will hear singing and flute playing and watch arrow making and shield painting.

Numerous craftsmen and artists of the Comanche tradition will have exhibits set up.

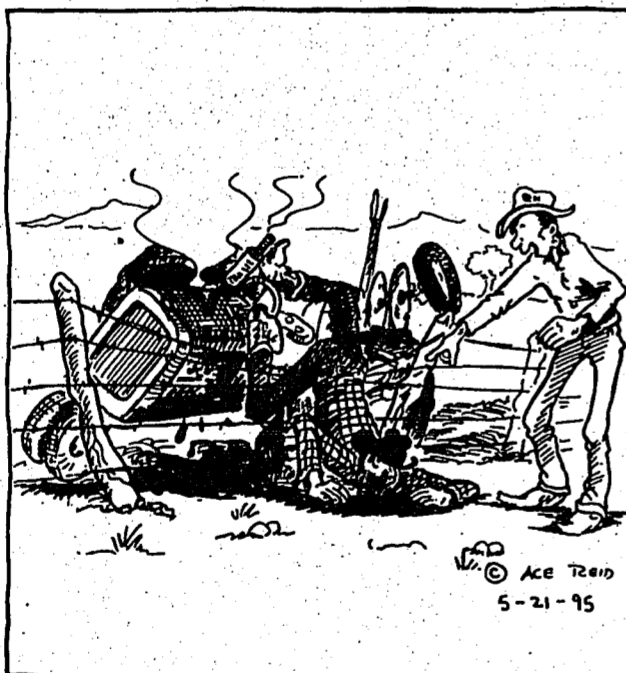

Use Pesticide Products Safely This Spring And All Year

As the earth stirs with new life this spring, bugs come out to feast-in your garden and indoors. While battling unwelcome pests with products for home and garden use, take the necessary precautions to protect members of your household, especially young children, from accidental poisoning or exposure.

Since 1981, the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has imposed strict regulations which determine when a pesticide product must be marketed in child-resistant packaging. Child-resistant packaging is generally necessary when EPA toxicity criteria require that the label of the product carry the signal words "danger" or "warning". Child-resistant packaging is designed to prevent children under the age of 5 from gaining access to the contents.

Child-resistant packaging, however, is only one line of defense in poison prevention.

Here are important safety recommendations to follow at all times:

*Always store pesticide products out of children's reach. When appropriate, install child-proof safety latches (available from hardware stores) on cabinets.

*If you have no children in your home and are expecting young visitors, be aware that accidental ingestion can occur in homes which are not set up with children's needs in mind. Alert caregivers, grandparents and others to potential hazards.

*Before using a pesticide product, read the label, follow directions

carefully and pay close attention to precautions and restrictions on product use.

*Before applying a pesticide product--indoors or outdoors--always follow label directions and when required, remove children and their toys and pets from the area for the time recommended by the label.

*If you are interrupted while using a pesticide product, make sure you put the container out of children's reach even when you don't expect to be gone for long.

*Keep child-resistant packaging intact; re-secure container properly after each use.

*Never transfer pesticide products to other containers--especially to containers that children may associate with food or drink.

*Teach children that pesticide products are intended to kill or repel certain pests and should not be handled.

*Keep the telephone number of your area's poison control center near your telephone.

Manufacturers of pesticide products must certify to EPA that the child-resistant packaging will meet certain standards of effectiveness, compatibility and durability. Manufacturers must have data on file to substantiate their certification. The EPA now has more than 4,000 packaging certifications on file for pesticide products.

The Chemical Specialties Manufacturers Association (CSMA), whose members include manufacturers of residential-use pesticide products, has been a long-time supporter of the National Poison Prevention Council. With the Council, CSMA helps alert the public to poison prevention measures to protect children from accidental ingestion or exposure. These precautions are highlighted during National Poison Prevention Week, observed each year on the third week of March.

All around your home this spring, remember CSMA's recommendations for poison prevention--then use these safety precautions all year.

Social Security Has Become Independent Agency

As of March 31, the Social Security Administration (SSA) became an independent agency, separate from the Department of Health and Human Services which has been its home base since 1953.

The change is expected to provide a new level of recognition to SSA and to all those who receive Social Security benefits and support the system through their payroll contributions, officials stated.

Under the 1994 Social Security Independence and Program Improvement Act transferring the agency, SSA retains the responsibility for administering the Old-Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance programs (OASDI) and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program. SSA will also continue to assist in administering the Medicare and Black Lung programs.

Popular Broadcaster Killed In Wreck Near Here

One person was killed instantly and another was seriously injured last Friday evening in a head-on collision approximately four miles east of Santa Anna.

Rene Stewart, 25, of Sterling City, was pronounced dead at the scene by Coleman County Justice of the Peace Nance Campbell.

Eugenio Bernal, 24, of Winters was pinned in his 1980 Chevy pickup until freed by the Coleman Volunteer Fire Department Rescue Team using the Jaws-of-Life. He was treated at the scene by Coleman Medevac EMS and then transported to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene by First Flight Helicopter.

Stewart was traveling east on Highway 67 when her 1991 Chevrolet Camaro crossed into the west bound lane and collided head-on with the pickup.

Both drivers were wearing seat belts and the air bag in Stewart's auto deployed.

Assisting at the scene were DPS Officer James Shields, DPS Sgt. Ron Snow, Santa Anna Police Chief Carlos Torres and Coleman County Sheriff's Department officers.

Stewart was very active in farming and ranching and was a farm news broadcaster. Since 1993, Stewart had been associated with Voice of the Southwest Agriculture Radio Network (VSA) a radio service based in San Angelo.

Rockwood Resident Still Missing

The Coleman County Sheriff's Department and the Department of Public Safety are investigating the disappearance of 71-year-old Curtis Bryan of Rockwood. Bryan has been missing since sometimes on Friday, April 28.

Sheriff Wade Turner is conducting the investigation upon a request from Bryan's relatives. Turner suspects no foul play in Bryan's disappearance.

On Monday, May 8, two DPS helicopters conducted a three-and-a-half, 250-acre air search on Bryan's property along the Colorado River. In addition, sheriff deputies and neighbors walked the place the same day and found no traces of Bryan. Robert Curtis, a hunter who leases the property, told Turner "there was no way Bryan could have been there because hunters had covered the lease in their normal hunting patterns."

The investigation into Bryan's disappearance is continuing.

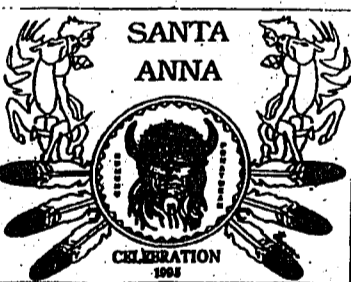

A Comanche Smoke Signalling System

How Did They Do That?

By Linda Pelon

The transparency of the atmosphere upon the Plains is such that objects can be seen at great distances; a mountain, for example, presents a distinct and bold outline at fifty or sixty miles, and may occasionally be seen as far as one hundred miles.

The Indians, availing themselves of this fact, have been in the habit of practicing a system of telegraphing by means of smokes during the day and fires by night, and, I dare say, there are but few travelers who have crossed the mountains to California that have not seen these signals made and responded to from

peak to peak in rapid succession. The Indians thus make known to their friends many items of information highly important to them. If enemies or strangers make their appearance in the country, the fact is telegraphed at once, giving them time to secure their animals and to prepare for attack, defense, or flight. War or hunting parties, after having been absent a long time from their erratic friends at home, and not knowing where to find them, make use of the same preconcerted signals to indicate their presence.

Very dense smokes may be raised by kindling a large fire with dry wood, and piling upon it the green boughs of pine, balsam, or hemlock. This throws off a heavy cloud of black smoke which can be seen very far.

This simple method of telegraphing, so useful to the savages both in war and in peace, may, in my judgment, be used to advantage in the movements of troops co-operating in separate columns in the Indian country.

Randolph Marcy

Randolph Marcy was an army officer and explorer often in the company of Texas Indian Agent Robert S. Neighbors in the 1840s and 1850s. He and Neighbors defined an Indian trail, with the assistance of a Comanche guide, through Texas for travelers to the California gold rush.

The subject of smoke signalling is a complicated and fascinating historical puzzle. Texas and Comanche historian T. R. Fehrenback tell us "The Comanches, of course, had an excellent system of communications based on smoke signals, imitating the calls of owls and coyotes, and other things. It is intriguing to note that council grounds, major campsites and meeting places of the Texas Comanches were near high points such as Comanche Peak, Double Mountain, Table Top Mountain, Signal Mountain, Enchanted Rock, Paint Rock and Santa Anna Peaks. Additional research can tell us much about Comanche history, culture and land use in Texas.

Unfortunately, no comprehensive effort was made to collect information about the Comanche smoke signalling system before much of the archaeological evidence was destroyed. However, it is still possible to retrieve some information. For example, one very interesting archaeological report was found which may document a signalling point and its destruction. This information was provided by Frank Runkles and published by the Central Texas Archaeological Society in March of 1936:

There are many flint deposits

in Comanche County where the Indians obtained material for their weapons and implements. Camp sites are to be found on all streams near these flint deposits and appear to have been inhabited for many years.

There are two types of campsites. The first type are those located near work shops. Most arrow points and nearly all so-called war type points, all chipped double bit axes, nearly all hammer stones and the finest chipped knives are found on them. These sites appear to have been inhabited by the later, more war-like tribes who were more or less nomadic....

Probably the most interesting camp site of the work shop type is located on a sandy hill-top of the Leon River fourteen miles northeast of the city of Comanche. The sand on this site is known as blow sand and was originally about two and one-half feet deep. In the late years it has blown almost entirely away leaving the clay exposed in many places. It also left eleven small mounds about two feet high and about three feet in diameter at the base with rocks protruding from the top. When I examined them, I found that they were fire places, the rocks being placed in about eighteen-inch circles and blackened and burned from continual use over a long period of time. It was then my greatest desire to preserve them for future study. They have since been destroyed by amateur collectors seeking to find relics in them. When the protecting rocks were removed, the remaining sand and ashes were free to blow away. The sad discovery was made upon my return after three years absence from this section.

Signalmen making tools while at their posts? This would be a most efficient use of time. At least one peak in the San Saba area is still saturated with flint chips.

Information left by J. Emmor Harston, a controversial source close to the last surviving chiefs of the Texas Comanches and author of Comanche Land, identifies Santa Anna Peaks as the center of the smoke signalling system. Harston reported:

The meeting place of the Sata Exiponi or Dog Soldier secret organization at Coñas (the warrior training camp at Santa Anna's Peaks) was unusual and deserves mention. It was an underground secret cavern located midway up the steep east end of Santanna--now known as Santa Anna--Mountain....It was on this High Point that the "fire rock fell" and it was here the "eternal fires" were kept burning. Here also was the center of "fire and smoke communications."

Reflections On Comanche -Texas Relations

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was information presented by the Comanche Nation at a symposium held at Paint Rock, Texas a year or so ago outlining the Comanche thoughts on their future relationship with Texas. The reflections were compiled by Bill Neeley of Amarillo, who is a descendant of Comanche Chief Quannah Parker. Neeley is author of numerous books about Texas history, in particular as it relates to the Comanche.

The Comanches' most spectacular successes on the battlefields of the Southwestern frontier occurred in Texas. Ironically those military successes led to The People's greatest defeat.

For after stopping the encroaching Spaniards from settling Texas north of a line from Laredo to San Antonio to Nacogdoches, the Comanches waged all out war against the Anglo-American interlopers into Comancheria for a period of forty years. Never numbering more than three or four thousand warriors, the successful protection of their territory, won in earlier wars against Apaches and other Indians, was a military feat seldom equaled in the history of North America. Finally, after succumbing to the ravages of smallpox and cholera, the rigors of a nomadic lifestyle, ongoing wars against other Indians, and the white man's technology and ever-increasing numbers of combatants, the proud Comanches retreated to the little island of their reservation in southwestern Oklahoma. The state of total surrender was hastened by the open fury of their warfare with the dominant American culture. To the victors the enemy (whose successes

against them over an extended period of time elicited the greatest hostility) deserved no mercy, and no mercy did they receive. The final scene of the story was scripted with Texas' boundaries containing no Comanches, while more docile tribes were allowed, in small numbers to remain.

And now, after the passage of over a century since the law bow was strung and the last rifle shot, it is time for reflection and healing between Numunu (The People), many of whom are now citizens of Texas, and leaders of the Lone Star. My ideas of how Comanches and Texans can finally get to know each other are as follows:

*Establish courses at Texas colleges and universities which teach the anthropology, linguistics and history of The People from the time they crossed Red River from the north (in 1700) to the present.

*Require studies in the public schools of the Comanches as an internal part of Texas history (which has generally been written to show the Big Two in Texas: Hispanics and Anglos, and not the Big Three, which includes the Comanches).

*Reestablish the Texas Indian Commission as part of the state government (to provide impetus for educational and cultural activities relating to Comanches and other Texas tribes).

*Request that the Institute of Texas Cultures at UT--San Antonio prepare an exhibit featuring the Comanches (and designed to travel across the state to universities and museums). Contemporary Comanches could add to the historical collections of UT-San Antonio, thus showing for the first time in any exhibit the continuous line of history from the earliest artifacts and historical data to the present.

*Allow the Comanches to lease land (outside areas open to the public) within the boundaries of Palo Duro Canyon State Park for religious and ceremonial purposes.

*Pass a resolution in the legislature honoring the Comanche people as natives to Texas long before the arrival of non-Indians to the state (excepting Coronado's expedition in 1541).

*Enact legislation in Texas to insure the complete freedom of all Native Americans to their religious beliefs (including the Peyote-centered Native American Church, founded by Comanche Quannah Parker).

*Plan symposia (to include Comanches singing, dancing, painting, putting up teepees, etc.) across Texas at strategic locations based upon historical events. Sites could include Fort Parker, San Antonio, Austin (Comanches observed the building of the first capitol in Austin), San Angelo, Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls.

These are only a few ideas to facilitate, at long last, mutual understanding and respect for two peoples once locked in the throes of hatred and death. As the renaissance of the Comanche people continues, non-Indians in Texas will gradually learn some of the truths omitted by the early tellers of our history.

According to Sioux intellectual Vince Deloria, Jr., "Religion is a force in itself and it calls for the integration of lands and people in harmonious unity. The land awaits those who can discern their rhythms."

Texas is a religion. Our land is sacred to all races who live and have lived upon it. As we once fought for its possession, let us now pray together for our integration with it and our harmonious unity as we reflect upon a stormy past.

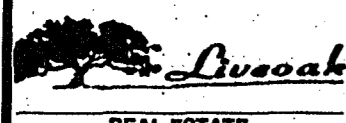

AUSTIN — SB 1 — the 1,210-page measure that would overhaul Texas' public education system — is mired in a House-Senate conference committee over the sticky subject of a private school voucher program.

The committee of 10 remained deadlocked after voting on a motion to approve the voucher program. Sen. Greg Luna, D-San Antonio, joined five House members on the committee in voting to strip the program from the bill.

Opponents say school vouchers would drain money from public schools, while supporters contend that vouchers would help low-income parents enroll their children in private schools.

Gov. George W. Bush favors a school voucher program "as part of a menu to encourage innovation and change in the schools," said his spokeswoman, Karen Hughes.

Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, author of the bill and joint committee co-chairman, said he feels optimistic that the measure will pass.

However, Rep. Paul Sadler, D-Henderson, the other co-chairman, said House members on the joint committee should continue to support the 83-63 floor vote against the voucher plan.

Term Limits Near Death?
The chairman of the powerful House Calendars Committee said last week it is doubtful he will let the term-limit bill out of his committee.

"I'm not overly optimistic," Rep. Mark Stiles, D-Beaumont, said, calling the measure nothing more than "dumbing down democracy."

A week earlier, the House State Affairs Committee approved a proposal to impose 12-year limits retroactively, meaning 31 of the 181 current legislators couldn't seek re-election.

A spokesman for Texans for Term Limitations also expressed doubt that the proposed constitutional amendment has a chance to pass the House.

"We haven't picked out a coffin yet, but this bill is certainly on life-support thanks to the games played by certain members of the House," said Mark Sanders.

Sanders said the term-limits group never advocated making the restrictions retroactive and called the House plan a gimmick designed to draw opposition.

Elder Bush Quits NRA
A National Rifle Association fund-raising letter mailed in the wake of the Oklahoma City bombing so outraged former President George Bush, he dropped his lifetime membership in the organization over references in the letter to federal agents as "jack-booted government thugs."

In a letter dated May 3 to NRA President Thomas Washington, Bush said, "Your broadside against federal agents deeply offends my own sense of decency and honor, and it offends my concept of service to country," the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Bush made specific references to two former Secret Service agents who served on his presidential security detail who were serving as agents for the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms when they died in the April bombing of the federal building in Oklahoma City.

Bush characterized agents Steve Willis and Al Whicher as decent, honorable men, and not "Nazis," as the NRA letter alluded in its blanket portrayal of federal agents.

NRA officials did not apologize about language in the fund-raising letter. In fact, NRA second vice president Neal Knox said, "a lot of NRA members would be delighted that Bush has resigned from the group," the *Chronicle* reported.

Coastal Plan Gets Nod
The Texas House has tentatively approved an overhauled coastal management plan that supporters believe will satisfy concerns about the authority of the plan's administrative council.

The bill, by Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, requires a final vote before going to the Senate.

The plan, designed to preserve natural resources on the Texas Gulf Coast, was sent to the federal government for approval, but in March Gov. Bush ordered it pulled it from the approval process, calling the plan an extra layer of bureaucracy.

C.A.P. School Graduation Set May 25th

C.A.P. High School will hold its graduation exercises on Thursday, May 25 at 7 p.m. The campus is located on F.M. 503, three miles north of Valera.

Prospective graduates of the 1995 senior class represents students from eight rural communities in Coleman, Runnels, Taylor and Brown counties.

Local students graduating will be Richard Diaz and Latosha Railsback.

Gov. Bush has signed into law a bill allowing Texas to opt out of a federal banking plan. Under the measure, the state would reject a new federal law that allows national banks to open branches in any state without having to meet those state's regulatory requirements.

Education Commissioner Mike Moses will get a pay raise of about \$18,000 under legislation unanimously approved by the Senate last week. The bill, sent to the House for consideration, would boost Moses' salary to \$156,014. The pay raise was sought by Gov. Bush, who appointed Moses.

Other Highlights
More than half of the women inmates in state prisons are dependent on alcohol or other drugs, according to a Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse study released last week. In addition, 40 percent of the 500 women inmates surveyed claim to have been drunk or high on drugs at the time of the offense that led to their imprisonment.

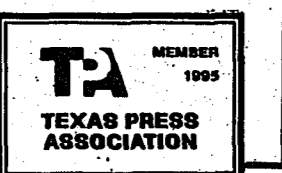

AUSTIN — SB 1 — the 1,210-page measure that would overhaul Texas' public education system — is mired in a House-Senate conference committee over the sticky subject of a private school voucher program.

The committee of 10 remained deadlocked after voting on a motion to approve the voucher program. Sen. Greg Luna, D-San Antonio, joined five House members on the committee in voting to strip the program from the bill.

Opponents say school vouchers would drain money from public schools, while supporters contend that vouchers would help low-income parents enroll their children in private schools.

Gov. George W. Bush favors a school voucher program "as part of a menu to encourage innovation and change in the schools," said his spokeswoman, Karen Hughes.

Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, author of the bill and joint committee co-chairman, said he feels optimistic that the measure will pass.

However, Rep. Paul Sadler, D-Henderson, the other co-chairman, said House members on the joint committee should continue to support the 83-63 floor vote against the voucher plan.

Term Limits Near Death?
The chairman of the powerful House Calendars Committee said

last week it is doubtful he will let the term-limit bill out of his committee.

"I'm not overly optimistic," Rep. Mark Stiles, D-Beaumont, said, calling the measure nothing more than "dumbing down democracy."

A week earlier, the House State Affairs Committee approved a proposal to impose 12-year limits retroactively, meaning 31 of the 181 current legislators couldn't seek re-election.

A spokesman for Texans for Term Limitations also expressed doubt that the proposed constitutional amendment has a chance to pass the House.

"We haven't picked out a coffin yet, but this bill is certainly on life-support thanks to the games played by certain members of the House," said Mark Sanders.

Sanders said the term-limits group never advocated making the restrictions retroactive and called the House plan a gimmick designed to draw opposition.

Elder Bush Quits NRA
A National Rifle Association fund-raising letter mailed in the wake of the Oklahoma City bombing so outraged former President George Bush, he dropped his lifetime membership in the organization over references in the letter to federal agents as "jack-booted government thugs."

In a letter dated May 3 to NRA President Thomas Washington, Bush said, "Your broadside against federal agents deeply offends my own sense of decency and honor, and it offends my concept of service to country," the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Bush made specific references to two former Secret Service agents who served on his presidential security detail who were serving as agents for the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms when they died in the April bombing of the federal building in Oklahoma City.

Bush characterized agents Steve Willis and Al Whicher as decent, honorable men, and not "Nazis," as the NRA letter alluded in its blanket portrayal of federal agents. NRA officials did not apologize about language in the fund-raising letter. In fact, NRA second vice president Neal Knox said, "a lot of NRA members would be delighted that Bush has resigned from the group," the *Chronicle* reported.

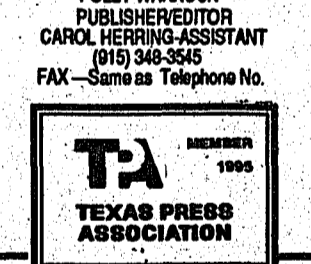

AUSTIN — SB 1 — the 1,210-page measure that would overhaul Texas' public education system — is mired in a House-Senate conference committee over the sticky subject of a private school voucher program.

The committee of 10 remained deadlocked after voting on a motion to approve the voucher program. Sen. Greg Luna, D-San Antonio, joined five House members on the committee in voting to strip the program from the bill.

Opponents say school vouchers would drain money from public schools, while supporters contend that vouchers would help low-income parents enroll their children in private schools.

Gov. George W. Bush favors a school voucher program "as part of a menu to encourage innovation and change in the schools," said his spokeswoman, Karen Hughes.

Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, author of the bill and joint committee co-chairman, said he feels optimistic that the measure will pass.

However, Rep. Paul Sadler, D-Henderson, the other co-chairman, said House members on the joint committee should continue to support the 83-63 floor vote against the voucher plan.

Term Limits Near Death?
The chairman of the powerful House Calendars Committee said last week it is doubtful he will let the term-limit bill out of his committee.

"I'm not overly optimistic," Rep. Mark Stiles, D-Beaumont, said, calling the measure nothing more than "dumbing down democracy."

A week earlier, the House State Affairs Committee approved a proposal to impose 12-year limits retroactively, meaning 31 of the 181 current legislators couldn't seek re-election.

A spokesman for Texans for Term Limitations also expressed doubt that the proposed constitutional amendment has a chance to pass the House.

"We haven't picked out a coffin yet, but this bill is certainly on life-support thanks to the games played by certain members of the House," said Mark Sanders.

Sanders said the term-limits group never advocated making the restrictions retroactive and called the House plan a gimmick designed to draw opposition.

Elder Bush Quits NRA
A National Rifle Association fund-raising letter mailed in the wake of the Oklahoma City bombing so outraged former President George Bush, he dropped his lifetime membership in the organization over references in the letter to federal agents as "jack-booted government thugs."

In a letter dated May 3 to NRA President Thomas Washington, Bush said, "Your broadside against federal agents deeply offends my own sense of decency and honor, and it offends my concept of service to country," the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Bush made specific references to two former Secret Service agents who served on his presidential security detail who were serving as agents for the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms when they died in the April bombing of the federal building in Oklahoma City.

Bush characterized agents Steve Willis and Al Whicher as deceit,

C.A.P. School Graduation Set May 25th

Gov. Bush has signed into law a bill allowing Texas to opt out of a federal banking plan. Under the measure, the state would reject a new federal law that allows national banks to open branches in any state without having to meet those state's regulatory requirements.

Education Commissioner Mike Moses will get a pay raise of about \$18,000 under legislation unanimously approved by the Senate last week. The bill, sent to the House for consideration, would boost Moses' salary to \$156,014. The pay raise was sought by Gov. Bush, who appointed Moses.

Coastal Plan Gets Nod
The Texas House has tentatively approved an overhauled coastal management plan that supporters believe will satisfy concerns about the authority of the plan's administrative council.

The bill, by Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, requires a final vote before going to the Senate.

The plan, designed to preserve natural resources on the Texas Gulf Coast, was sent to the federal government for approval, but in March Gov. Bush ordered it pulled it from the approval process, calling the plan an extra layer of bureaucracy.

Other Highlights

More than half of the women inmates in state prisons are dependent on alcohol or other drugs, according to a Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse study released last week. In addition, 40 percent of the 500 women inmates surveyed claim to have been drunk or high on drugs at the time of the offense that led to their imprisonment.

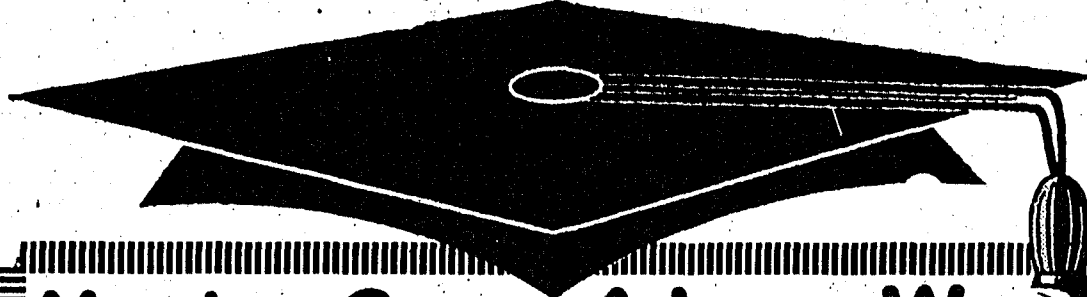

Proof Of Residency Not Required For Vehicle Registration

Coleman County residents are no longer required to show proof of residency to obtain vehicle registration. Texas Gov. George W. Bush signed Senate Bill 178 into law on May 1. The legislation takes effect immediately and is aimed solely at motorists who live in the El Paso, Dallas-Fort Worth and Houston-Galveston areas. The federal government has identified those areas as being in violation of air quality standards.

In 1991, Texas lawmakers established a centralized emissions testing program by passing House Bill 1969. It required motorists in the major metropolitan areas to get a vehicle emissions tests before the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and the tax office could issue registrations. An additional 50 cent fee was charged to administer the program.

Meanwhile Coleman County residents were required to show proof of residency to confirm that they were not trying to avoid an emission test. An additional 25 cent fee was collected to pay for the program. Then on Jan. 31, 1995, the legislature placed a moratorium on the emissions testing policy that expired May 2, 1995.

Because the new law takes TxDOT out of the emissions program, the tax office will no longer collect the 25 cent fee at the time of

registration. The Texas Department of Public Safety will assume administration of the program and is charged with setting the necessary guidelines.

TxDOT is taking steps to remove the proof of residency requirement from the registration renewal notices. The state mails more than one million of these bills each month and many of them are printed several weeks in advance.

Until the renewal notices are corrected, motorists should be aware that proof of residency is not required for obtaining vehicle registration in Coleman County.

The tax office appreciates everyone's patience and cooperation while this matter is addressed.

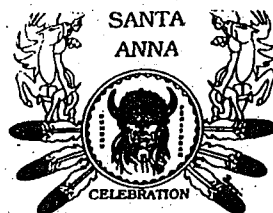

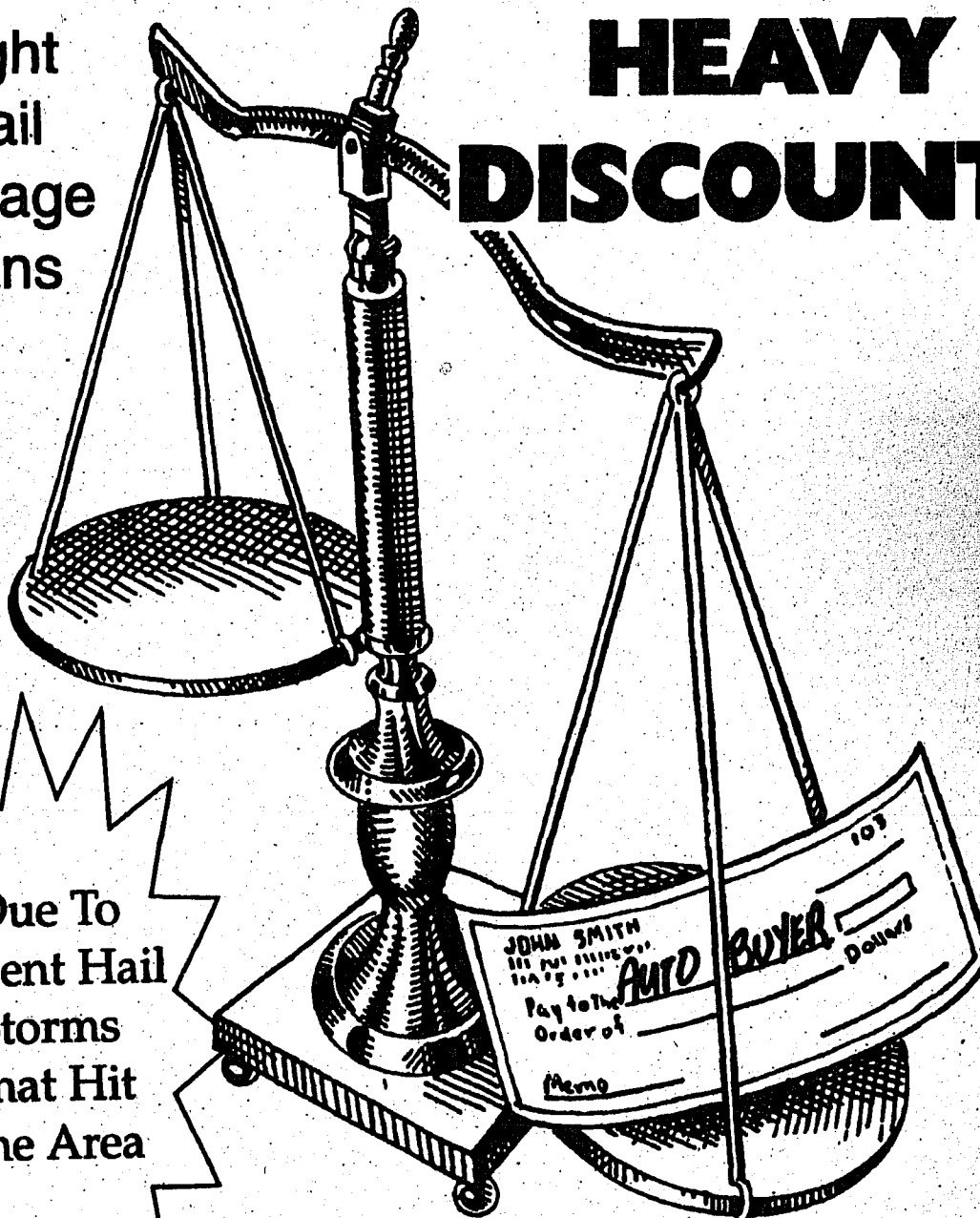
