other things. It is intriguing to other things. I is intriguing to
note that council grounds. major campsites and meeting places of the Texas Comanches were near high points such as Comanche Peak,
Double Mountain, Table Top Double Mountain, Table Top
Mountain, Signal Mountain Enchanted Rock, Paint Rock and Santa Anna Peaks. Additional research can tell us much about
Comanche history culture and land use in Texas. use in Texas.
Unfortunat effort was made to collect informa tion about the Comanche smoke signalling system before much of
the archaeological evidence was destroyed. However, it is still possible to retrieve some information: For example, one very interesting archacological report was found point and its destruction. This in formation was provided by Frank Runkles and published by the
Central Texas Archaeological Society in March of 1936:
