The charge for members of the exchanges receiving the service will be \$3.50 per month for residential customers and \$7.00 to businesses.



### Between the People of SANTA ANNA, TEXAS and the People of the COMANCHE NATION

hereunto signed for their respective peoples, the following treaty of friendship and cooperation has been entered into and agree upon.

The people of the Comanche Nation are welcome to visit the City of Santa Anna and its environs, and are welcome to visit those areas and sites formerly occupied by and sacred to their ancestors, those sites being protected by their present occupants.

In regard to those common projects into which the Comanche Nation and Santa Anna, Texas, agree to undertake for their common benefit, the people of Santa Anna seek to assure the people of the Comanche Nation that due respect will be accorded to their religion, customs and culture.

The People of the Comanche Nation and the Peole of Santa Anna shall endeavor to assist each other, insofar as is possible, in their common and separate ambitions toward economic, political and social benefit.

And finally, both parties agree mutually to use every effort to promote friendship and cooperation between both the Santa Anna and Comanche peoples and all other Texans, and to walk in the human path always and forever.

In writing we have hereunto set our hands, marks, and seals,

Done at Santa Anna, Texas, in the shadow of Santa Anna's Peaks, this, the twentieth day of May, AD 1995.

When your power goes out. check all fuses and breakers. If they're O.K., check with your neighbors. If power is out around you, CALL WIU. You'll find our number in your local phone book, or on your WIU bill!

2. KEEP WTU PHONE LINES OPEN.

From the moment you call WTU, help is on the way so a second call isn't necessary Please leave our lines open for other callers.

3. REPORT FALLEN UTILITY LINES.

If you see a fallen power line, don't even go near it! And, keep others away, too! Call WIU, the police, or the fire department immediately

4. UNPLUG APPLIANCES.

It's a good idea to turn off your air conditioner and unplug televisions, major appliances, and computers during storms. If you experience an outage, you may want to leave them unplugged until power is restored. Don't open your refrigerator or freezer unless absolutely necessary

5. BE CAREFUL WITH GENERATORS.

If you have access to a portable generator, please

do not plug it directly into your circuit breaker box. It's unsafe — especially for repair crews. Plua appliances and lamps directly into the generator.

6. PLEASE BE PATIENT.

You may see a WIU truck in your neighborhood leaving before your power comes back on. This is not unusual. We send people out to assess the extent and cause of an outage. The source of your outage might be several blocks away.

7. CHECK ON YOUR NEIGHBORS. Be mindful of neighbors who may have special needs.

8. TURN YOUR FRONT PORCH LIGHT ON. Turning on your porch light lets WIU crews know your

electricity is back on.

9. FOLLOW LOCAL News Media.

For updates on weather. conditions and power restoration efforts, check local newspapers and radio broadcasts.

9. KEEP AN EMERGENCY SAFETY KIT.

It's a good idea to keep things like flashlights, batteries, bottled water, and a battery-powered radio handy.
