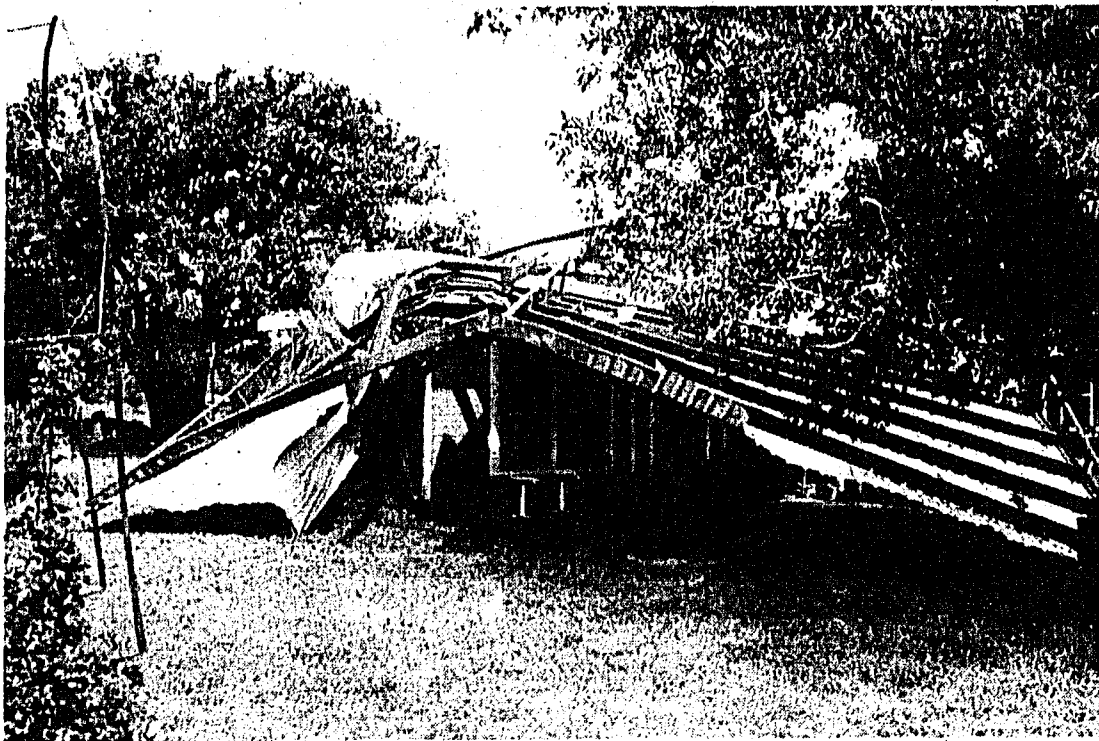

## Twister Tears Through Trickham

It was just about a year ago Sunday when winds roared through Trickham and tore up an old store building and did considerable damage to other buildings and trees in the area. This past Sunday seemed Deja-vu for Orvil and Verna Bolton who live near where the historic old building was hit last year. This time it was the Boltons' barn and residence at which Sundays' storm took aim at about 7:30 in the evening. A metal barn which was located about fifty yards from the house was picked up and wrapped around the house doing considerable damage to a porch which ran the full length of one side of the house and a sun room on the back.

Neighbors and other friends and relatives were quick to come to the aid of the couple and by

mid-morning on Monday had most of the scattered debris cleared and loose metal from the barn stacked in neat piles. However the removal of the major part of the barn which came to rest on the house would have to wait until insurance adjusters arrived. On its path to the house, the barn apparently struck a fence which was being repaired Monday so cattle could be contained. Other area buildings received some damage and a number of trees were either uprooted or lost limbs. Between 3 and 4 inches of rain accompanied the winds.

Rockwood received 2 inches of rain over the weekend and Santa Anna recorded 1.74 inches between Thursday night and Tuesday noon. Coleman reported .17".

The westward expansion movement was evidenced by long lines of wagons with words scribbled on their sides. "Gone to Texas". Many of the intrepid pioneer frontiersmen came seeking freedom from tyrannical political and religious systems. With them came the man of God or the circuit-riding minister to his fellow man. To meet that purpose, at designated times of the year, in some scenic location Camp Meetings were founded where the pioneer families could come together to hear the gospel in song and sermon proclaimed in a free and unfettered manner. Today in the midst of political, social and religious upheaval families still come together—some in covered wagons on which are written the words, "Gone to Cowboy Camp Meeting"...to seek God, His guidance & voice, for these critical and ebbing years of the 20th century. Salvation and spiritual renewal are still the need and thrust of the Cowboy Camp Meeting. The Little George Havens' COWBOY CAMP MEETING, located on a scenic tableland, the Flying H Acres, on Highway 84, between Coleman and Santa Anna, begins Friday night, June 16th and runs through Sunday, June 25th.

Some folks will stay in the wagons, like those used by the early day settlers on the western trails. In fact, the Flying H Acres is located on the Great Western Cattle

There will be tent dormitories, one for the men and another for the women; however, you must bring your sheets, light blanket, etc. (We have need of cots and roll-aways if you can bring one.) For the "tenderfoot" there are always good motels near by. HA!

We are planning parades in some of the towns and hamlets with covered wagons, carriages, surreys, buckboards, chuck wagons, etc., to announce this annual event, now in its 29th year. You who come to join us should wear your frontiersmen or western attire. It's all for fun and publicity.

Top-rate speakers and evangelists are on the program this year. Harold Council, Paducah, Ky., who was here for our 25th anniversary, will be returning. Ned Chipley, Dallas, Texas will be here for the first time; Joe Price, Mesquite, Texas, who acts as Camp Pastor and a steady for many years, will be singing in most of the services, as well as doing some preaching; Rick Ingle, Denton, Texas, has been with us as evangelist many years; Larry Taylor, Bandera, an evangelist, who will be returning for his second time.

Each evening at 8 o'clock everyone comes together under the big gospel tent, which will be a replica this year of the United States flag. The week-day morning services are at 10 o'clock.

Monday morning Shannon O'Connor, returned missionary to Honduras, will speak. The youth and the children's classes, and the men and women's prayer meetings are at 7 o'clock each evening. The famous old chuck wagon, made by a Texas Ranger, stands by the cook tent.

**LaTosha Railsback Is CAP Graduate**

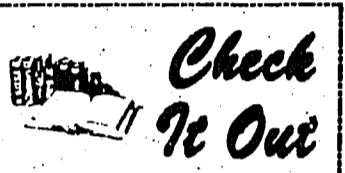
LaTosha Railsback of Santa Anna was among those recently graduating from CAP High School.

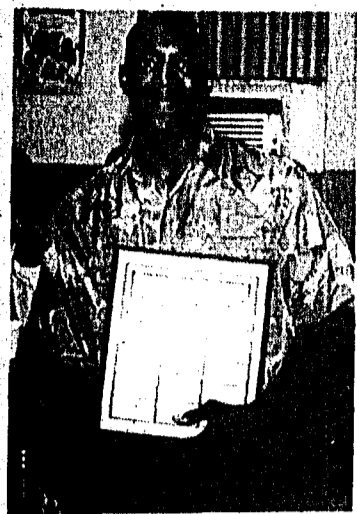

Athletes were recognized in all sports held during the year and a video was shown on senior athletes and Coach John Smith.



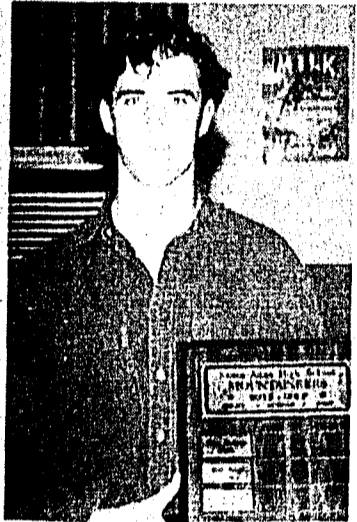

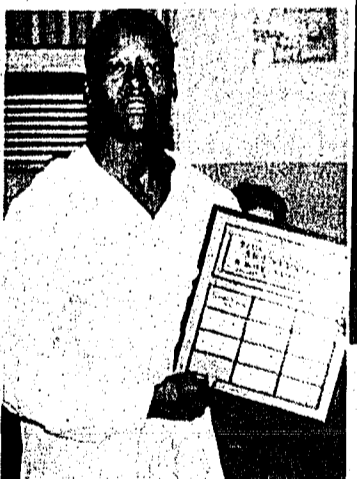


