Invasion Of Fall Armyworms May Put Fall Small Grain Planting On Hold

Producers who habitually plant small-grain (wheat, oats, barley) during late August and September for fall grazing are urged to wait until the first killing frost.

"The beet armyworms we've had so much trouble with in cotton this season are being joined by fall armyworms from haygrazer, late-planted sorghum and other crops to make early small grain planting a risky business," said Dr. Tom Fuchs, San Angelo-based State Extension Integrated Pest Management Coordinator. "I'm not telling people when they can or can't plant; I'm just saying if they

do plant early the price they'll likely pay will be worm damage. Every field may not be affected but the probability is high."

Fuchs said producers should check any volunteer grain in their area for worm infestation before deciding to plant. Those who are planning to proceed should weigh the benefits of early grazing versus the cost of one or two pesticides applications.

Producers across much of Texas traditionally plant small grain by September 15 to take advantage of fall rains. In the western half of the Concho Valley, fall grazing is usually only cost effective one out of five years due to low rainfall.

The fall armyworm is a familiar

pest to small grain operators, though it usually occurs when the weather cools. The worms are in the immature stages of dull-colored.

Man Arrested For Local Assault Admits To Other Cases In Area

A former Eastland County man who has more recently been living in Brownwood is being held in Coleman County Jail on charges of aggravated robbery, and assault with a deadly weapon with bonds for the two charges totaling \$120,000. According to Santa Anna Police Chief, Carlos Torres, the 40-year-old man approached a 30-year-old woman with sexual demands at a local laundromat last Thursday afternoon. It is alleged that when she refused his demands and tried to leave, the man grabbed her, bound her wrists together behind her back with rope, and held a knife to her throat. The woman fell and was able to convince her assailant she couldn't get up with her hands tied. The attacker finally cut the rope and

fled on foot grabbing her purse as he left.

According to Torres, the victim fled to seek help from her father. Torres said when he responded to a call at about 1:30 p.m. he found the woman in tears with rope still around her wrists. After hearing her story Torres said he immediately radioed for assistance by the city crew to help in the search for the assailant who was apprehended on South Jefferson at about 2:00 p.m.

Torres transported the offender to the county jail where he was first booked on aggravated robbery charges. On Friday an additional charge of assault with a deadly weapon was also filed.

Chief Torres expressed his

appreciation for the quick action of the City crew and for the City management which allows him to utilize the crew's assistance. He also had high praise for townspeople who get involved and assist him any way they can.

Other charges were expected to be filed in Brown County late Tuesday or Wednesday as a result of a three-hour interview with the suspect Monday by Det. Robert Mullins with the Criminal Investigation Department of the Brownwood Police Department. According to a published report on Tuesday the suspect confessed to several incidents in the Brownwood area.

SAISD "Acceptable" Rating Misleading

Saying that the recent annual campus ratings given Texas schools by the Texas Education Agency can sometimes be misleading, Santa Anna school counselor Montie Githrie pointed out that the ratings are based on dropout rates rather than academics.

Because Santa Anna ISD's dropout rate did not decrease during the past school year, the TEA gave it a rating of "Acceptable", which to some may not sound like much of an accomplishment.

However, since the Santa Anna school had previously decreased its dropout rate to 1% it is clear that would be hard to improve upon and improvement in dropout rate is how they are judged.

Santa Anna ISD earned very good TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) scores, ranking well above statewide averages in all three testing areas of reading, math and writing. Reading took a slight dip from last year but was still well above statewide averages.

In Santa Anna grades 3-8 & 10, TAAS scores for reading showed 81.2% of those taking the test passed while state averages are 77.5%. The previous year's local score in reading was 84%.

Math scores for grades 3-8 & 10 showed 87% passing. State averages are 64.7% passing. Math took a big jump from 65% passing the previous year.

Writing scores with testing only in 4th, 8th and 10th grades showed 100% of those taking the test passing. Last year's local score was 92.3. The state average shows 81%.

Area Hunters Ready For Dove Season To Start Friday

Mourning Dove season opens Friday morning, September 1 one-half hour before sunrise. Hunters this year will be enjoying the opening weekend since Labor Day falls on September 4 and many of them will have an additional day to hunt before returning to the work week.

Thousands of hunters will descend on sunflower fields and tanks in Coleman County this weekend, hoping their pre-season scouting has paid off. With the hot and dry conditions at the present time, tank hunting should be effective. In various reports, birds were widely scattered with the denser populations appearing in the south part of the county.

The Central Zone season runs from September 1 through October 17 with a short winter season following, December 27 through January 7. The daily bag limit on

mourning doves is 15 birds with hunting hours from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. Hunters must have their pump and autoloading shotguns plugged to a three-shot capacity during the hunting season.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department estimates that 400,000 hunters participated in the "normal" 60-day season.

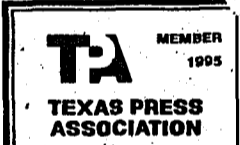

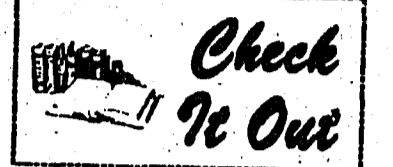

Later, while looking for an article from a 1921 edition of the News, we did run across the report of a school bond election which was held June 7, 1921. The bond issue which asked for \$80,000 dollars, part of which would be used to build a new high school and the rest for updating existing buildings, was

defeated at the polls 126 - 82. It did seem important, however, for the writer of the report to point out that 24 women voted in the election.

They were talking about the need for more school room during late August of 1920. A writer for the News told of attending the high school assembly during the first day of the new school year with 502 pupils in attendance. A number of citizens were on hand to pledge to the pupils that they would be in support of a new school building.

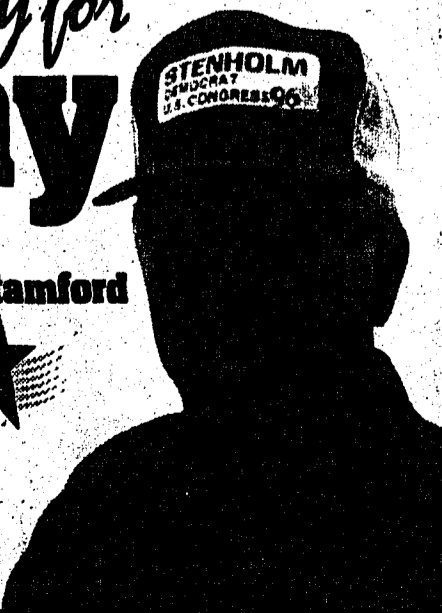

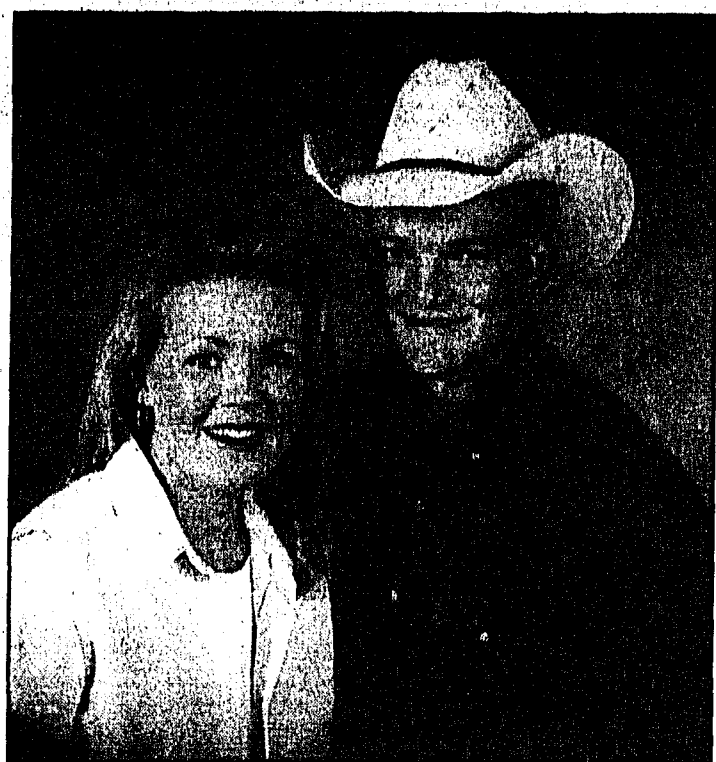

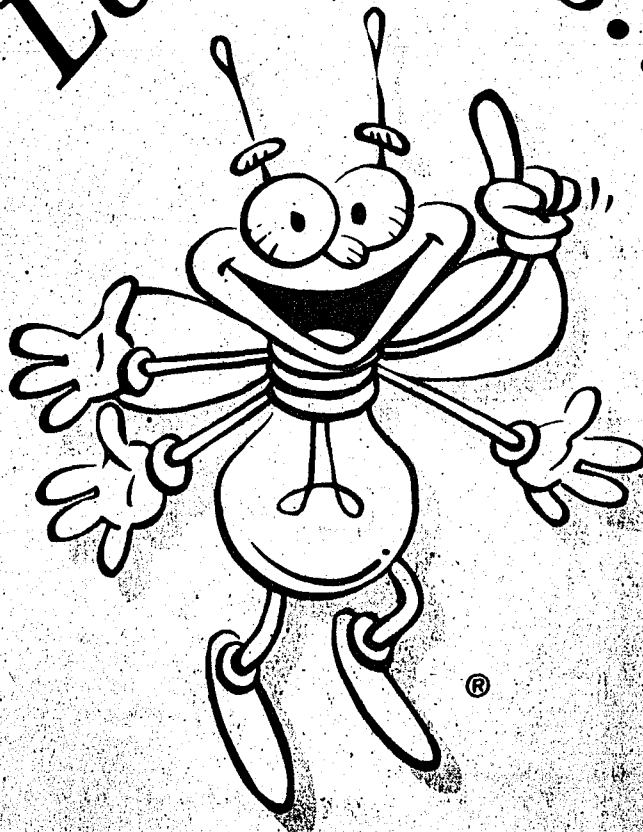

"Help Your 6-Year-Old Succeed In School"

"Fears"—all of us, adult and child, have some. In the new school environment a child may be fearful of some part of the new environment. Don't be surprised if SIX refuses to go to school after a week or two. It doesn't necessarily mean she dislikes school. Some experience unpleasant to her, such as being asked to count before the class or to pass out the milk, may be the cause. Send her on to school. Plan a special treat for afterward.
These fears are unexplained and sometimes very complex. Fear of failure and feeling of not measuring

up to expectations can also trigger not wanting to go to school or an "I can't attitude." Encouragement to foster positive self-image and a realistic set of performance standards are very helpful for this situation. At this age competition is not encouraged.

Keeping her talking about feelings and activities is important because this is the parents window to what is happening. SIX doesn't talk much about her school experiences at home. If she does, she often tells of "bad" things other children have done or boasts beyond reality of her own accomplishments. The daring classmate who misbehaves most is sure to be reported in great detail. This "tattling" and enlarging on the truth will stop when SIX is more at home at school. Feeling secure and free to talk is important; and of course nagging and prying add to the desire not to talk.

Two other annoying habits may appear: Morning dawdling and fast and sloppy. SIX usually needs 11 hours of sleep to avoid fatigue and strain. When she wakes, she usually goes to the bathroom and then begins to play. This playing causes problems. SIX must dress, have breakfast and be ready for the bus or carpool if all is to go well. It helps if her clothes are laid out—singly, not touching, so she can see very piece she will use. She will gradually begin to shift her playing habit to a dressing habit and will be able to get herself dressed before breakfast.

SIX may bring home papers she has colored, cut, or pasted that are alarmingly messy. In speedy and joyous abandon, she wants to do everything, and so finishes little SIX is also easily distracted and often shifts her eyes to watch another's activity, while her own hands continue to move.

In all these situations, patience and understanding are the parents best tool to help move on from this stage.

Parents are also reminded that school pictures will be made on Wednesday, September 6.

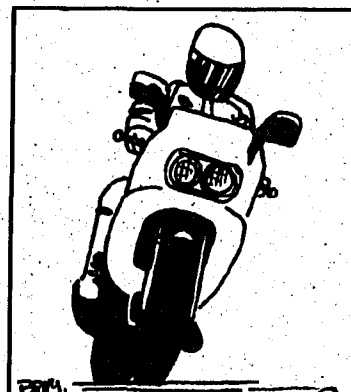
Accelerated Reading Program Receives Grant

nocturnal moths. The fall armyworm is characterized by a prominent, white inverted "Y" on the forehead. The beet armyworm has no "Y".

Insecticide control measures differ for the fall and beet armyworm in small grain. The insecticide methomyl or "Lannate" is recommended for beet armyworm in small grain. Methyl parathion or "Sevin" is effective on fall armyworms.

In both species, early detection is important because small larvae are more easily controlled with insecticides. Control measures are recommended when four or five larvae per square foot are found in combination with seedling stand loss or with foliage loss on older plants.

An average of 940,000 acres of small grain is planted across the 23 counties of District 7 each year. Of this total, 497,000 acres are harvested. The remaining 443,000 acres are either grazed out or abandoned.

Eating Armyworms...Will They Harm Livestock?

Will eating beet or fall armyworms hurt livestock? Dr. Tom

Fuchs, San Angelo based State Extension Integrated Pest Management Coordinator, said this odd query has become common since beet armyworms took over Southern Rolling Plains Cotton several weeks ago.

"Beet and fall armyworms have been infesting other crops as well as cotton," said Fuchs. "The hybrid-sudans or 'haygrazer' type forages are a favorite of the fall armyworm. I checked a couple of fields earlier this week and every stalk was infested with fall armyworms."

Fuchs said worried producers have asked if armyworms, either the beet or fall variety, are toxic to cows that ingest them while grazing infested forage.

"I contacted Dr. John Reagor, Veterinary Toxicologist at the Texas A&M Vet School," said Fuchs. "He said there is no record to his knowledge of armyworms ever harming livestock that ingest them."

Usually fall armyworms are not a problem on haygrazer. They can become serious to small grain, as temperatures cool. By fall most

haygrazer is either grazed-out or baled and never sees many fall armyworms. This year has been difficult and growing fall armyworm populations are joining the beet armyworm onslaught.
