The water district personnel have been assisting the City of Santa Anna in bringing the plant into compliance with state regulations. A leak on the water line to Lake Brownwood was repaired.

Paperwork is being prepared on Jim Laubhan's petition to close a section of Mountain Oaks Street. A special meeting will be called after the notice is published in the newspaper regarding the closing and rezoning of the street and property.

A proposal from the Power Lift Foundation Repair was presented to

repair the old city hall. Cost of the proposal was \$30,950.00. Council person Morris will look into funds available and matching grants to do the work.

Pallbearers will be James Simmons, Jeff Simmons, Jerry Horner, Gary Hosch, Lee Smith and Kenneth Smith.

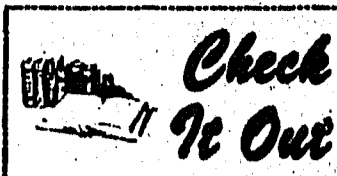

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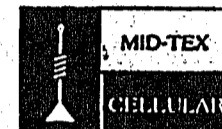
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**Lone Star Card
Prepares For
Debut In Area**

What is red, white and blue and looks like a credit card? The Lone Star Card which will replace the paper food stamps presently being used.

The paper food stamp coupons will fade into the past when the new technology of plastic makes its debut by October 1 in our area.

To convert the paperwork process to the electronic benefits transfer (EBT) takes workers from the Texas Department of Human Services and business working many hours to educate themselves and the public to the changeover.

Everything in the DHS office must be changed from policies and procedures to the office set up. While business and DHS employees in our area are working to set up the program by October 1, the program has been used for several months in Dallas and Harris counties as well as other parts of the state.

The card which helps to eliminate food stamp fraud also helps businesses. Businesses in the areas already using the card have reported a 3 to 12 increase in food purchased in their stores with food coupons.

Besides the food stamp program, Lone Star Cards will also be used by participants in the Aid for Families with Dependent Children (AFDC).

Each person or family receiving food stamps or AFDC will receive a card and a personal identification number. Each month money will be put into the account. The clients will receive a receipt showing their beginning balance, their purchase amount and their remaining balance for each purchase. Paper food stamps have been used since the early 1970s, but the new electronic benefits transfer system could completely phase out the current coupon system nationwide by 1999.

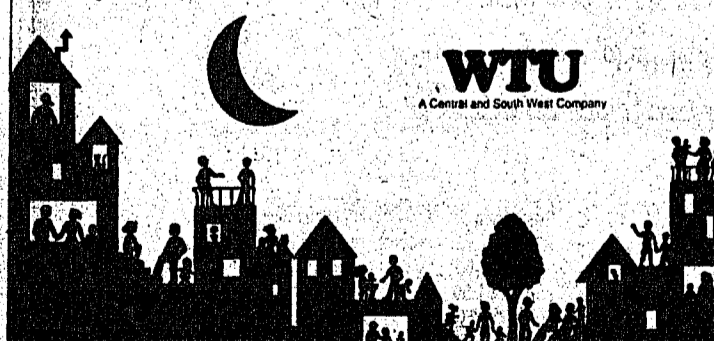

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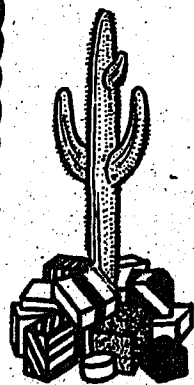
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
