

The Mozelle exchange has petitioned for Expanded Toll-Free Local calling to the Coleman exchange.

Within the next 15 days, Coleman County Telephone Cooperative will mail ballots to all customers in the Mozelle exchange. After marking the ballot, customers should sign their name and return the ballot in the stamped, self-addressed envelope to the Public Utility Commission of Texas that accompany the ballot.

Expanded Toll-Free Local Calling Service will allow you to call and be called by the Coleman exchange on a local call basis (no toll charges). All exchange(s) that pass the ballot will be added to your local calling area for a maximum monthly per line charge as follows:

First five exchanges: Up to \$3.50 for residence, \$7. 00 for business.

Each exchange over five exchanges: An extra \$1.50 per month, per exchange.

Example: the following fees would apply if seven exchanges were approved:

	Residence	Business
First five exchanges	up to \$3.50	up to \$7.00
Exchange # 6	extra \$1.50	extra \$1.50
Exchange #7	extra \$1.50	extra \$1.50
Maximum Monthly Fee	\$6.50	\$10.00

If five or fewer exchanges pass the ballot and are approved, the maximum monthly fee would be \$3.50 for residence lines and \$7.00 for business lines.

The fees associated with ELC are mandatory. If any exchanges pass the ballot, the fees will be paid by all subscribers in the petitioning exchange. The fees will be in addition to your local monthly telephone service charges, and will be in effect until your telephone company's next general rate case, at which time all rates are subject to change.

At least 70% of the subscribers who return their ballots must vote in favor of expanded local calling on a per exchange basis for it to be provided. If the ballot fails to all exchanges, your service will not change, and no fees will apply. Only exchanges that pass the ballot will be added to your local calling area. Note: If a requested exchange is in a different Local Access and Transport Area (LATA) from the petitioning exchange, it requires federal approval and may not be available for some time. You will be notified at the time of the ballot if such a condition exists, and what exchanges are affected. No fees for such inter-LATA exchanges will be charged until they are approved and provided (and they may not necessarily add to the fee), but all other approved exchanges will be billed according to the Rule. Inter-LATA exchanges are noted by an asterisk(\*).



#### Lone Star Card Prepares For Debut In Area

What is red, white and blue and looks like a credit card? The Lone Star Card which will replace the paper food stamps presently being used.

The paper food stamp coupons will fade into the past when the new technology of plastic makes its debut by October 1 in our area.

To convert the paperwork process to the electronic benefits transfer (EBT) takes workers from the Texas Department of Human Services and business working many hours to educate themselves and the public to the changeover.

Everything in the DHS office must be changed from policies and procedures to the office set up. While business and DHS employees in our area are working to set up the program by October 1, the program has been used for several months in Dallas and Harris counties as well as other parts of the state.

The card which helps to eliminate food stamp fraud also helps businesses. Businesses in the areas already using the card have reported a 3 to 12 increase in food purchased in their stores with food coupons.

Besides the food stamp program, Lone Star Cards will also be used by participants in the Aid for Families with Dependent Children (AFDC).

Each person or family receiving food stamps or AFDC will receive a card and a personal identification number. Each month money will be put into the account. The clients will receive a receipt showing their beginning balance, their purchase amount and their remaining balance for each purchase.

Paper food stamps have been used since the early 1970s, but the new electronic benefits transfer system could completely phase out the current coupon system nationwide by 1999.



#### Lone Star Card **Prepares For** Debut In Area

What is red, white and blue and looks like a credit card? The Lone Star Card which will replace the paper food stamps presently being used.

The paper food stamp coupons will fade into the past when the new technology of plastic makes its debut by October 1 in our area.

.To convert the paperwork process to the electronic benefits transfer (EBT) takes workers from the Texas Department of Human Services and business working many hours to educate themselves and the public to the changeover.

Everything in the DHS office must be changed from policies and procedures to the office set up. While business and DHS employees in our area are working to set up the program by October 1, the program has been used for several months in Dallas and Harris counties as well as other parts of the

The card which helps to eliminate food stamp fraud also helps businesses. Businesses in the areas already using the card have reported a 3 to 12 increase in food purchased in their stores with food coupons.

Besides the food stamp program. Lone Star Cards will also be used by participants in the Aid for Families with Dependent Children

Each person or family receiving food stamps or AFDC will receive a card and a personal identification number. Each month money will be put into the account. The clients will receive a receipt showing their beginning balance, their purchase amount and their remaining balance for each purchase.

Paper food stamps have been used since the early 1970s, but the new electronic benefits transfer system could completely phase out the current coupon system nationwide by 1999.

## Fishing Lake Ivie

Fishing remains slow. Best fishing is very early or late and at night.

Black Bass: Conditions-fair to good; Baits-plastic worms and crank baits; Depths-0-10 and 20-30 ft.; Locationpoints, weed beds, and main lake. Look for schools of blacks feeding on the surface. Also fish weed beds. Work points with plastic worms in the heat of

Smallmouth Bass: Conditions-poor to fair: Baits-plastic worms and crank baits; Depths-20-30 ft; Location-rocky areas and main lake.

Crappie: Conditions-poor, Baits-minnows and jigs; Depths-20-30 and 30-40 : Location-main lake and river chanels. Look for crapple in deeper water along river and creek channels, in brush at 20 to 40 ft. depths.

Channel and Blue Catfish: Conditionair to good; Baits-live bait, stink bait, blood bait and shad; Depths-20-30 and 30-40 ft. Location-flats, main lake, brush areas, baited holes, mid-way, Concho and Colorado Rivers. Trotline and rod/raels.

Yellow Catfish: Conditions-fair; Baitslive bait; Depths 10-20 and 30-40 ft. Location-main lake, mid-way and Concho and Colorado Rivers. Trotlines best results.






