## Local Woman Attends Worldwide SDA Conference

Patsy (Mrs. Nathan) Starr recently returned from a month's visit in Europe. The main focus of her trip was the General Conference of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church held in Utrecht, Netherlands. She accompanied her sister, Paula Owen, of Fort Worth who was an exhibitor at the conference where 2,600 delegates from around the world gathered to discuss church business with 40,000 to 50,000 visitors also attending. Mrs. Starr says that although she did not attend all the meetings of the 10-day conference she did come away feeling revived and more educated on issues facing the church in this day and age. She will always cherish it as a "once in a lifetime" experience.

Following the conference the ladies visited several points of interest in Holland (the Netherlands), Switzerland, Germany, Belgium and France. While visiting France they witnessed a number of World War II memorial activities.

She commented that one thing she especially noticed in the Netherlands was that the towns were built around a town square or as some would say, a market square, with a church as the focal point in the square and that the life of the community seemed to revolve around the church. A fascinating story related to one of the castles the women visited in Holland. Seems the De Haar castle was partly destroyed by bombing during WW II and the family abandoned it. As a result the peasants who lived around the castle, through the ensuing years, built a town there. The family later made the decision to rebuild the castle so the whole town was moved to another location.

The ladies went on to England to spend a week there before returning to the U.S. In London they visited Buckingham and Windsor Palaces, and Blenheim Palace where

Winston Churchill was born. They also visited the churchyard which was the burial place of Churchill and his wife Clementine, about a mile from his birthplace. Another memorable visit was to Shakespeare's Stratford on the Avon and the church where he was buried. Mrs. Starr said while visiting Canterbury Castle they heard an interesting story of how during WW II the English had broken the Germans' code and learned the castle was to be a bombing target. It was determined that rather than give away the fact the code had been broken, they did nothing to alert the people of the expected bombing.

Thus many lives were lost but many more later saved because of their knowledge.

Mrs. Starr who is a teacher at the local Seventh-Day Adventist School will be able to use much of the information learned at the conference, and at historical sites she visited, in the classroom now that she is settling in for another school year here in Santa Anna.

Mrs. Starr said that although she enjoyed every minute of her visit and sightseeing while on the trip which was a "once in a lifetime" experience, it also made her more thankful to be living in America.

## Sales Tax Election Saturday Mountain City Community Center

Jobs, small business revolving pool, growth, economic development and business incubators will be on the ballot in a special election the City Council has called for Saturday, August 12.

And your vote will be crucial to Santa Anna's future.

The Santa Anna City Council has called the special election to consider a proposition which will create an economic development fund by increasing the sales tax by one percent. The additional tax is being sought with one-half cent to be used for economic development and the other one-half cent for reduction of City property taxes. It is estimated that \$20,000 per year will be generated by the new tax.

Going to the polls to vote for a tax increase does not come naturally but this election needs to be carefully considered by each citizen of Santa Anna who hopes to see a brighter future for our community.

The proposition is a complex issue but its passage will produce very simple results.

It will create an economic development fund, but put simply, it will help create more jobs.

And more jobs help everyone in the community. When more people are working, more people are paying their fair share. And whether or not you need or want a new job, you also know that jobs and payrolls write sales orders and ring cash registers.

The question most often heard regarding the economic sales tax is "How will the economic money be spent?" Some possibilities are:

- Offer incentives for businesses to expand and hire additional employees.

Coleman County Telephone Cooperative members will be receiving ballots this week to vote yes or no to Expanded Toll-Free Calling to Coleman as petitioned by each of the six CCTC exchanges.

All members are encouraged to vote. According to CCTC manager, Danny Kellar, members should sign their names and return the ballots in the stamped, self-addressed envelope to the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The

- Create a low-interest revolving loan fund for small business owners.
- Create a venture capitol fund.
- Lure manufacturers or distributors to locate facilities in Santa Anna.

The possibilities are endless as long as they fall under the guidelines as set by the state for use of the tax money.

The Economic Development Tax Board previously appointed by the City Council are Pat Wright, Susie

Voss, Jim Spillman, Bobby Morgan, Montie Guthrie III and Robert Noriega. Danny Kellar was

originally appointed to the board but removed himself when elected Mayor. That spot is to be filled to complete the seven member board which is required by state law.

The board, with input from City officials and citizens are charged with administering the economic development funds.

If approved by the voters on Saturday, the new sales tax would

**James Lovelace**

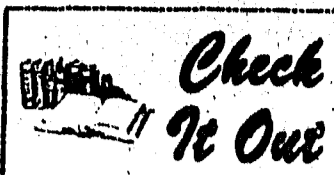
James Rex Lovelace, 61, of Pecos, died Thursday, Aug. 3, 1995 in a Tulsa, Okla. hospital.

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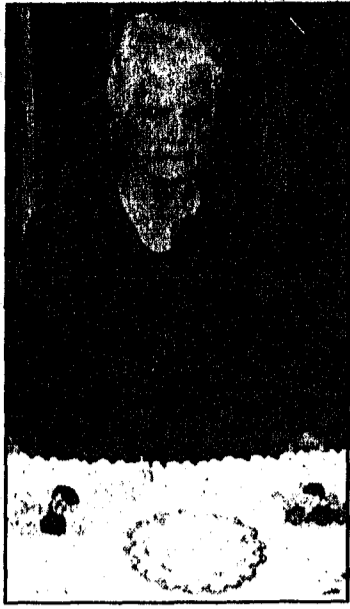
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### Maude Shields Honored With 90th Birthday Celebration

A stocker cattle and wheat program will be held on Monday, August 21 at the First Baptist Church Christian Life Center in Santa Anna beginning at 6 p.m. with a complimentary barbecue meal.  
Joe Wilson, retired Taylor County Extension Agent, will begin the program at 6:45 p.m. discussing wheat forage production, fertilization, weed control, variety selection and disease management. Dr. Steve Hammock, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, will follow with a discussion of stocker cattle management and production. Dr. Joe Pat Hemphill, DVM, Coleman, will outline an integrated pest management system for beef cattle to include internal and external parasites and resistance management. Chris Cadenhand, Moorman's Feed, will discuss stocker cattle nutrition. The meeting will adjourn at approximately 8:30 p.m.

Two hours of continuing education units will be offered to private applicators in attendance with one hour in integrated pest management. Everyone is asked to call the County Extension Office (625-4519) to register by Friday, August 18 so enough food can be prepared. 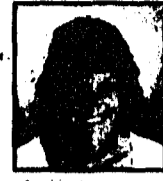

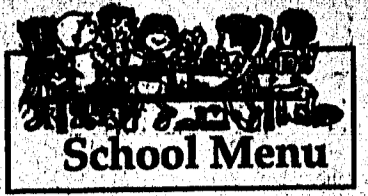

# Toll-Free Calling Ballots

PUC will count ballots and notify the CCTC and petitioners of the outcome. At least 70% of members who return their ballots must vote in favor of the expanded local calling on a per exchange basis for the service to be provided.

The six exchanges petitioning for Expanded Toll-Free Calling to Coleman are Lake Coleman, Santa Anna, Burkett, Rockwood, Valera and Mozelle. The monthly fee for any exchange voting in favor of the service would be up to \$3.50 monthly for residence and up to \$7.00 for business.

Some opposition to the petition has arisen, due in part to the fact that other than Coleman four more exchanges in the surrounding area could have been included for toll free calling under the one charge of up to \$3.50 per residence and up to \$7.00 per business.

Proponents of the Toll-Free Calling petition mention the customers calling Coleman would be able to do so by dialing four less digits (eliminates 1-915).

Voters should give careful consideration the pros and cons and then cast their vote.

As we have been reminded, no matter which side of the issue you take, your opinion won't matter at all unless you VOTE.

### Ask The Postmaster

Q: Do I have to use those extra four digits with my ZIP Code?

A: No, the use of a ZIP plus 4 is strictly voluntary. However, we recommend their use because the expanded ZIP Code makes it easier and more cost effective for postal employees to process and deliver mail using the latest in computer technology. That translates into greater efficiency, stable postage rates, and a stronger Postal Service.

Q: Why can't I get my mail earlier in the day?

A: On an average day, a letter carrier spends 2-4 hours sorting mail in delivery order and 4-6 hours on the street actually delivering the mail. The typical work day begins between 7-8 a.m. and ends between 3-4 p.m.

Some customers will naturally be at the beginning of a route and others will be at the end. When establishing delivery sequence, a number of factors are considered and effort is made to deliver mail to business first.

Q: What if I suspect some of my mail is missing?

A: A good rule of thumb is to contact your local postmaster whenever a postal problem arises. In the case of missing or delayed mail, steps can be taken to determine the delivery status. Delayed mail problems can be instigated by your local postmaster. Often delivery tests conducted eliminates delayed mail. If you suspect your mail has been stolen, the Postal Inspection Service should be notified. Their local office's phone number is listed in the government offices index of most phone books.
