Two Rockwood residents and a Brady woman were injured south of Rockwood Sunday afternoon.

According to Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Pat Salas Coleta Pearson, 76, of Rockwood was traveling westbound on County Road 234 in her 1987 Ford pickup when she drove into the path of a 1974 Chevrolet pickup driven to Olen Tubbs, 81, of Brady. Tubbs was traveling south on U. S. Highway 283.

Hunting Season Opens Saturday

Landowners and hunters are reminded that the general deer hunting season in Coleman County will open Saturday, November 4 and continue through January 7 (65 days). The legal bag limit in Coleman County is four deer, limit two bucks. No special permits are required for harvesting, antlerless deer, however, both bucks and antlerless deer must be properly tagged with an appropriate tag from a valid hunting license.

Deer populations vary from area to area and even from ranch to ranch. The either sex regulation allows the landowner the flexibility to harvest antlerless deer on his/her property in order to keep deer numbers in balance with the available food supply. It does not automatically mean that a heavy harvest of antlerless deer is needed. The recommended harvest rates of both bucks and antlerless deer, provided by the department, should be used only as a general guidelines for harvesting deer. If more intense management of a place is desired, we suggest that the landmanager survey deer populations on his/her ranch on his own. This will allow for a more accurate representation of deer numbers on the ranch. Please note that in most cases the department recommends more antlerless deer to be harvested than bucks.

The recommended guideline for harvesting antlerless deer throughout most of Coleman County is 1 antlerless deer per 100 acres. The recommended harvest rate on bucks is 1 per 600 acres.

According to Texas Parks & Wildlife when the subject is turkeys, there's good news and bad news. The bad news, according to Don Wilson, a recently retired biologist with the Wildlife Division, is that the 1995 harvest may not be particularly good, especially from the Cotulla area south. The good news is that wild turkey populations have rebounded so well that hunting should still be the best in the nation. Coleman, Edwards, Kenedy, Kerr, Kimble, Menard, Sutton and Tom Green counties all have turkey populations of around 12,000 or better, and harvest records for 1994-95 indicate the Cross Timbers, South Texas Plains and Edwards Plateau are the places to go if you want the best shot at bagging a turkey.

The turkey season runs concurrently with the white-tail deer season.

Amendment Voting To Take Place At Mountain City Community Center

Voting will take place in Santa Anna at Mountain City Community Center next Tuesday, November 7, on 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. All of Precinct 2 will vote in Santa Anna except 2 East voters who will cast ballots at the courthouse in Coleman. Commissioners had earlier in the

year decided to cut down on the number of voting boxes in order to cut expenses. Four boxes will be located in Coleman for voters in other areas of the county.

Early voting will take place through Friday, November 3 at the courthouse. According to County Clerk JoAnn Hale, about 70 voters had taken advantage of early voting as of Tuesday evening.

On the Tuesday, November 7 election day, polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Rose Bass will be election judge for the Santa Anna polling place.

The Santa Anna News had earlier published the complete amendments.

Following is a summary of the amendments to be voted on in Tuesday's election.

Proposition 1: To allow the Texas Higher Education Board to issue up to \$300 million in bonds to finance more student loans.

Proposition 2: To authorize lawmakers to exempt Masonic lodges and some other state charitable organizations from property taxes.

Proposition 3: To allow use of existing bond authority of the Texas farm and ranch finance program to include assistance for expansion, development and diversification of production, processing, marketing and export of Texas agricultural products.

Proposition 4: To allow Texas homeowners to refinance their homes to pay off as Internal Revenue Service lien, or in the case of divorce to buy out the other spouse's equity in the home.

Proposition 5: To permit the Texas Land Board to issue another \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance low-interest loans for Texas veterans.

Proposition 6: To extend the over-65, senior citizen homestead property tax exemption to the surviving spouse of an elderly person.

Proposition 7: To eliminate \$250 million in general obligation bonds set aside for the now-defunct superconducting super collider project.

Proposition 8: To allow resident of Mills, Reagan and Roberts counties to abolish the office of constable.

Proposition 9: To allow investment of money from the Texas Growth Fund in a business without the business's disclosure of invest-

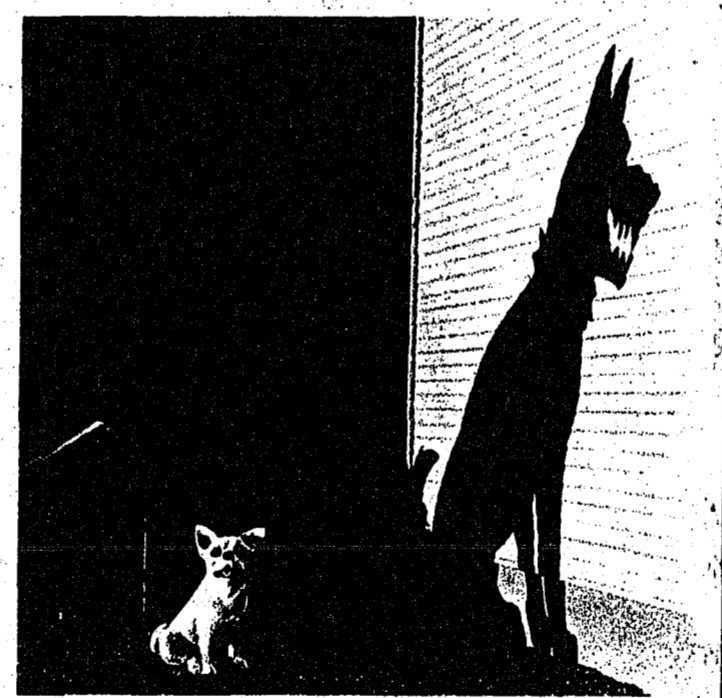

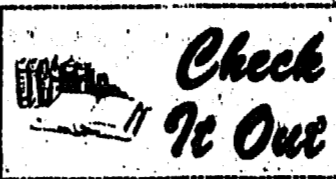

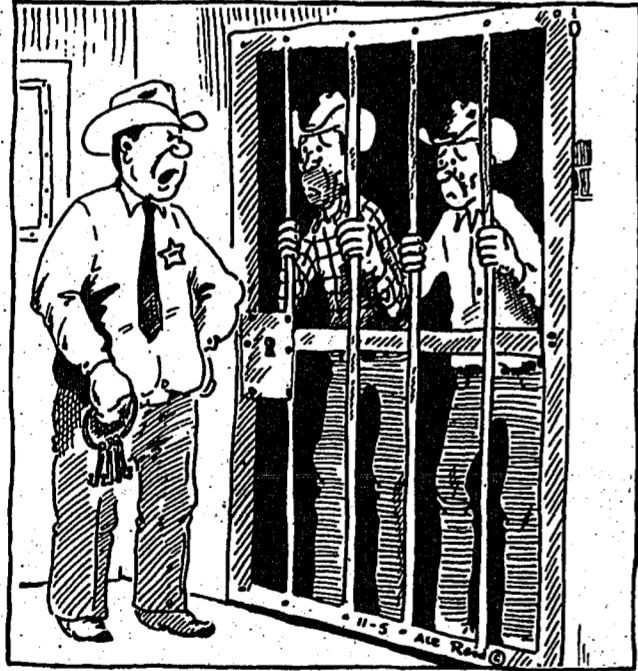

Texas' Heart Is Deep

My learning processes are being taxed here in Coleman County since my husband and I relocated from New England three months ago. And since so many Texans are not aware that New Englanders have a speech impediment, it is only fair to confess it right up front. I'm sorry to say there are certain people with whom I have not as yet been able to communicate, mainly because after I've said, "What did you say?" three times and still hear foreign sounds, I nod yes and move on. And to those persons, I wish to apologize. I am not the brightest persons you could meet having been born the seventh child of moderately intelligent parents who gave all the brains to the first six and didn't save any for me.

But I must say this is a learning experience of no small proportion. However, I've found that it's worth every bit of tribulation. People here are very kind and patient. They help and assist at every trying occasion and do it very sweetly. I've met a number of such persons and they graciously pave the way for my comfort and facility of learning. And for this I thank you.

Thomas and I attended a community function the other night and a meal was served. The ladies went about preparing the table with meals they had brought from home, placing plates, flatware, napkins and tumblers, then their specialties on the food table. When everything was ready, the women moved back and sat down, allowing the men in the group to rise, line up to the food table and serve themselves.

Ladies, I realize why you want the gentlemen to go first in line to eat. You and I know if the men find the food is not quite up to par, you ladies can quickly add a few herbs and spices and sit down to a tasty meal. I agree that you are being ingenious. This is commendable and smart! However, what about the Texas gentlemen we Northerners have heard so much about? Do these men feel like the guests since the ladies have prepared the meal and guests go first in line to honor their position? Perhaps they don't wish to disappoint their wives? "I'll tell you what, I would have been blushing embarrassed had I stepped in line before those men and had gotten the eagle-eye

because I wasn't following form! Besides, the cooks in Texas are the very best, so have no fear, Ladies. You don't need 'tasters'!

Strange how a little thing like dimming your lights or clicking them on bright during nighttime driving can mean something different in Texas. I was being followed in my car the other night by a companion cardplayer, and since my car automatically turns to high beams whenever there is no oncoming traffic, I suppose my lights changed several times in the course of my ride home. Upon seeing her the following week, she asked me if I had seen any deer. I responded in the negative, somewhat confused because I had been watching out for her in my rearview mirror and surmised that I had missed seeing some deer somewhere along the way. But no, she replied that whenever my lights turned to bright she took it that I was spotting deer ahead. New Englanders would love that piece of rustic information!

The staple drink in Texas is tea. However, on the trip down just as we were heading into Stephenville, I was feeling somewhat queasy when we stopped to eat at a roadside diner, so I ordered tea, expecting a healing cup of the hot brew. But not on your life. The waitress delivered a tall glass of iced tea with- out so much as a byyourleave. I couldn't fathom my error at first, but Thomas soon set me straight. No legitimate Texan drinks hot tea, in fact, tea is iced tea and no two ways about it!

However, I must say that Texans who have been made to leave their beloved state for a time because of career moves, business ventures or holding families together, come back the first chance given to them. Texans are loyal. Texans love their country. Texans don't feel at home unless they are in Texas. Many people from other parts relocate to a newfound home and never leave, having found their home away from home. Not Texans. Their roots run as deep as the Alamo, as Sam Houston, as Stephen F. Austin. The Oilers and Cowboys are their kin as well as the Astros and Rangers. They're true, died in the wool, intrinsically authentic, unvarnished and religiously faithful, unrefutedly genuine Texans in their American creed.

One day not too long ago, I went not into a super market, but to this particular grocery store for the first time to pick up a few things. I placed my purchases on the counter, engaging in the usual volleys of banter, and retrieving my check-book from my purse, I began writing, then realized I didn't know the name of the establishment. So I asked the clerk, "What's the name of this place?" The clerk, thinking I'd asked, "What is the date today?", replied, "The twenty-seventh." I, in turn, believed she responded that the name of the place was the Seven Eleven. I was surprised, thinking this place sure didn't look like a Seven Eleven. So I queried, "Seven Eleven?" She countered with, "The twenty-seventh," knowing full well there is no such date as the seven eleven. I belatedly realized my error looking like a complete imbecile and, trying to redeem myself, I replied, "Oh, I was asking what this market is called," looking around to see if I could catch a glimpse of the store's name.

"Ma'am?" she asked, not having understood what I said.

By that time, my newly purchased milk had gone sour. After three months, I have habituated my ear not to panic when it hears terms like 'out yonder', 'I'll say o my time', 'no, I never', 'idie', 'inshrnce', 'ha', 'wen yew tarred yew shewd go to baid', 'come back', because I know there are many words and phrases I pronounce that Texans must find difficult to swallow, and even understand. But I'm afraid I could never integrate them into my speech because I lack the knowledge of where they would fit in. I nevertheless find them very quaint!

Living with Thomas fourteen years should have eased me into the Texan language but when I met Thomas, he'd lived in New Hampshire for twenty-two years, his accent had mellowed some and his phrases were tempered with New Englandese. The first time he denied something with 'no, I never', I was incredulous! I laughed for a minute and asked him to repeat it, saying, "That is so cute! Is that Texan?" I really don't think he thought it was all that funny, but he was too much of a gentleman to say so.

And I suppose a good bit of New England has rubbed off on Thomas, but I am convinced he's only absorbed the ideal bits. When he visited Whon, his real home while living up north, he would come back to New Hampshire with an accent so thick he had to spoon it out. But he'd just smile and say, "Ah have to go home evry once in 'while an' be re-edgicated!"

I was completely bowled over by the number of people who could identify with my previous article because of their travels to other parts of the country or because they'd been transplanted here; not necessarily from New England, but coming here from any other area would create a similar barrier, although in varying degrees depending on location. It's made me feel less alone, having others to suffer with, follow the example of, or just be there should a crucial conversation need to be translated.

I wish to thank the many who expressed their kindnesses to me, their compassion and sympathy, and who might in turn require help in the future. I certainly hope our companions, Texans-all, will be the neighborly paragons for which they are so well-known and not shrink coming to our aid and minister to our culture shock, whoever and where we are!



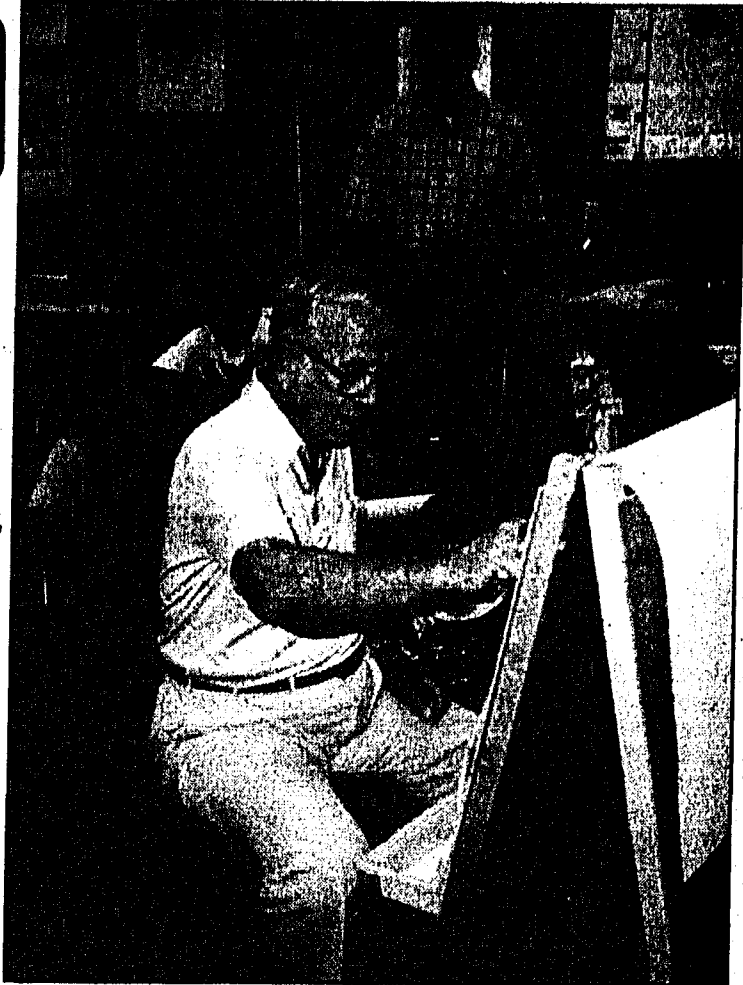
Evant put the game away late in the fourth quarter when Neil Ellis dove in from the three yard line.

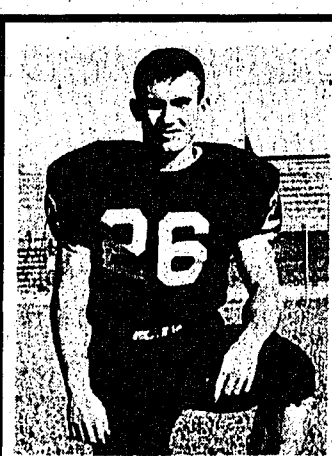

Amistad Fuel Company, Box 35, Rockwood, Texas 76873 has applied to the Railroad Commission of Texas Surface Mining and Reclamation Division for a partial release of reclamation bond on the Little Bull Creek Mine, Permit No. 7A.

Permit Number 7A is a renewal permit that was approved by the Commission on August 1, 1995. The initial permit for the Little Bull Creek Mine was approved by the Commission on February 20, 1979.

The Commission currently holds a performance bond in the amount of \$725,283 for reclamation of Permit 7A. The application for partial release of the performance bond is based upon Amistad Fuel Company's completion of Phase I on 136.6 acres, Phase II on 249.6 acres, and Phase III on 109.0 acres. The completion of Phase I includes backfilling, regrading and drainage control. The completion of Phase II includes revegetation. The completion of Phase III includes stabilization of rills and gullies, demonstration of satisfactory water quality, the successful completion of all surface coal mining and reclamation activities, the expiration of the period specified for operator responsibility, and successfully meeting all reclamation requirements of the Act and the permit. The 434.9 acre permit area includes 336.6 acres disturbed by mining and associated activities.

Phases I, II and III of the reclamation have been accomplished on portions of the permit area in accordance with Commission regulations and Amistad Fuel Company's approved reclamation plan. The approved postmine land uses are pastureland and water resources on the disturbed areas and grazingland on the undisturbed areas of the permit area. The results achieved, as they relate to the approved reclamation plan, are: reestablishment of a native grass mixture, including Kleingrass, sideoats grama, buffalograss, and KR bluestem; development and maintenance of greater than 70 percent ground cover; and construction of permanent surface water impoundments to support the pastureland land use. On the Phase III areas, the 70 percent ground cover has been maintained over the five year period of extended responsibility. Phase I was completed in May, 1991. Phase II was completed on June 29, 1994. Phase III was completed on 109.0 acres in October, 1994.

The amount of the performance bond that is currently posted is \$725,283.00. As a result of the last Railroad Commission of Texas bond evaluation, the RCT staff recommended a revised bond amount of \$533,661.00. Section 807.313(a)(1) of the Coal Mining Regulations allows the Commission to reduce the bond amount by up to 60% after backfilling, regrading, and drainage control has been successfully completed. Section 807.313(a)(2) allows an additional 25% bond reduction after successful establishment of revegetation. Section 807.313(a)(3) allows the final 15% of the original bond to be released after successful completion of all surface coal mining and reclamation activities. Amistad is requesting 60% bond reduction on 136.6 acres, an additional 25% bond reduction on 249.6 acres, and the final 15% bond release of 109.0 acres.

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
