Hunting Season Opens Saturday


Landowners and hunters are reminded that the general deer hunting season in Coleman County will open Saturday, November 4 and continue through January 7 (65 days). The legal bag limit in Coleman County is four deer, limit two bucks. No special permits are required for harvesting, antlerless deer, however, both bucks and antierless deer must be properly tagged with an appropriate tag from a valid hunting license. Deer populations vary from area

to area and even from ranch to ranch. The either sex regulation allows the landowner the flexibility to harvest anterless deer on his/her property in order to keep deer nume bers in balance with the available food supply. It does not automatically mean that a heavy harvest of anterless deer is needed. The recommended harvest rates of both bucks and anterless deer, provided by the department, should be used only as a general guidelines for harvesting deer. If more intense management of a place is desired, we suggest that the landmanager survey deer populations on his/her ranch on his own. This will allow for a more accurate representation of deer numbers on the ranch. Please note that in most cases the department recommends more anterless deer to be harvested than bucks.

The recommended guideline for harvesting anterless deer throughout most of Coleman County is 1 anferless deer per 100 acres. The recommended harvest rate on bucks is 1 per 600 acres.

According to Texas Parks Wildlife when the subject is turkeys, there's good news and bad news. The bad news, according to Don Wilson, a recently retired biologist with the Wildlife Division, is that the 1995 ha(ch) may not be particularly good; especially from the Cotulia area south. The good news is that wildturkey populations have rebounded so well that hunting should still be the best in the nation. Coleman, Edwards, Kenedy, Kerr, Kimble, Menard, Sutton and Tom Green counties all have turkey populations of around 12,000 or better, and harvest records for I 994-95 indicate the Cross Timbers, South Texas Plains and Edwards Plateau are the places to go if you want the best shot at bagging a

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



My learning processes are being taxed here in Coleman County since my husband and I relocated from New England three months ago. And since so many Texans are not aware that New Englanders have a speech impediment, it is only fair to confess it right up front. I'm sorry to say there are certain people with whom I have not as yet been able to communicate mainly because after I've said, "What did you say?" three times and still hear foreign sounds, I nod yes and move on. And to those persons, I wish to apologize. I am not the brightest persons you could meet having been born the seventh child of moderately intelligent parents who gave all the brains to the first six and didn't save any for me.

But I must say this is a learning experience of no small proportion. However, I've found that it's worth every bit of tribulation. People here are very kind and patient. They help and assist at every trying occasion and do it very sweetly. I've met a number of such persons and they graciously pave the way for my comfort and facility of learning. And for this I thank you.

Thomas and I attended a community function the other night and a meal was served. The ladies went about preparing the table with meals they had brought from home, placing plates, flatware, napkins and tumblers, then their specialties on the food table. When everything was ready, the women moved back and sat down, allowing the men in the group to rise, line up to the food table and serve themselves.

Ladies, I realize why you want the gentlemen to go first in line to eat. You and I know if the men find the food is not quite up to par, you ladies can quickly add a few herbs and spices and sit down to a tasty meal. I agree that you are being ingenuous. This is commendable and smart! However, what about the Texas gentlemen we Northerners have heard so much about? Do these men feel like the guests since the ladies have prepared the meal and guests go first in line to honor their position? Perhaps they don't wish to disappoint their wives? 'I'll tell you what', I would have been blushingly embarrassed had I stepped in line before those men and had gotten the eagle-eye American creed.

secause I wasn't following form! Besides, the cooks in Texas are the very best, so have no fear, Ladies. You don't need 'tasters'!

Strange how a little thing like dimming your lights or clicking them on bright during nighttime driving can mean something different in Texas. I was being followed in my car the other night by a companion cardplayer, and since my car automatically turns to high beams whenever there is no oncoming traffic, I suppose my lights changed several times in the course of my ride home. Upon seeing her the following week, she asked me if I had seen any deer. I responded in the negative, somewhat confused because I had been watching out for her in my rearview mirror and surmissed that I had missed seeing self, I replied, "Oh, I was asking some deer somewhere along the way. But no, she replied that whenever my lights turned to bright she took it that I was spotting deer ahead. New Englanders would love that piece of rustic information!

The staple drink in Texas is tea. I really don't think he though it was all that funny, but he was too much of a gentlemen to

And I suppose a good bit of New England has rubbed off on Thomas, but I am convinced he's only absorbed the ideal bits. 

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


