



up this past fiscal year with the County Nutrition Center showing that the Santa Anna Nutrition Center lost \$257.58. The City has budgeted for fiscal year April 1995-March 1996 \$4,500 for the nutrition program, which at this time, the expenses for the program are over what has been budgeted The Nutrition Center account has the money available to pay the loss to the County Nutrition program. Councilman Spillman made the motion to pay the \$257.58 loss from the Nutrition Center account. Councilman Morgan seconded and the motion carried.

Mayor Kellar recommended to Thelma Beloat, the new nutrition center director, that a committee be formed with a few council members and other interested parties to study what can be done for the nutrition center. Councilmen Morgan and Morris were selected to serve on that committee.
