How To Cook A Thanksgiving Turkey

City Council Minutes Show City Audit Report Not So Good, Nutrition Center Needs Help

REGULAR MEETING OCTOBER 10

Councilman Jim Spillman called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. with Councilmen Morris, Pritchard and Noreiga present. Others attending the meeting were Tommy Jackson Alys Pelton, Carlos Torres, accountant Collier Watson and Jane Patrick.

Councilman Morris made the motion to elect Councilman Spillman as the presiding officer for this meeting since both the Mayor and Mayor Pro-Temp were unable to attend.

Councilman Pritchard seconded and the motion carried.

Councilman Spillman gave the invocation. Minutes were approved.

The police report was reviewed by the council. The maintenance report included routine business with several water leaks for the month.

The audit for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1995 was presented by Collier Watson.

Mr. Watson reported that it was

not a good year for the City and recommended that changes would be necessary in order to continue operation. Councilman Pritchard made the motion to accept the audit as presented. Councilman Morris seconded and the motion carried.

Councilman Morris made the motion to pay the accounts payable. Councilman Pritchard seconded and the motion carried.

Councilman Morris made the motion to adjourn at 7:56 p.m. Councilman Pritchard seconded.

REGULAR MEETING NOVEMBER 14

Mayor Kellar called the meeting to order with all council members present at 6:27 p.m.

Others attending the meeting were Carmen Donham, Betty Sue Cupps, Thelma Beloat, Cindy Hallford, City Superintendent Tommy Jackson and City Secretary Alys Pelton.

Minutes were approved as presented and the police report was reviewed.

Mayor Kellar began a discussion on the Nutrition Center with the statement that the center will not be closed if the City can prevent it. In 1993, the City of Santa Anna began paying the utilities and half of the director's salary, in order for the center to stay open due to funding cuts. In 1994, the City began paying workers' compensation insurance on the director as the Coleman County Center could no longer afford to pay the expense.

The City has always paid for the building insurance and vehicle expenses on the Senior Citizen van. Financial problems began to show

up this past fiscal year with the County Nutrition Center showing that the Santa Anna Nutrition Center lost \$257.58. The City has budgeted for fiscal year April 1995-March 1996 \$4,500 for the nutrition program, which at this time, the expenses for the program are over what has been budgeted. The Nutrition Center account has the money available to pay the loss to the County Nutrition program. Councilman Spillman made the motion to pay the \$257.58 loss from the Nutrition Center account. Councilman Morgan seconded and the motion carried.

Mayor Kellar recommended to Thelma Beloat, the new nutrition center director, that a committee be formed with a few council members and other interested parties to study what can be done for the nutrition center. Councilmen Morgan and Morris were selected to serve on that committee.

Carmen Donham informed the Mayor and Council that the senior citizens had a building contract with the City for 10 years on the nutrition center and that the contract is up for renewal. Councilman Spillman made the motion to renew the contract for 5 years.

Councilman Morris seconded and the motion carried.

Superintendent of Operations Tommy Jackson reported no major water leaks for the past month. He said the 1981 Dodge Flatbed pickup purchased from the State has been repainted and equipped ready to go to work. Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission did an unofficial "walk through" at the water treatment plant. Mr. Lowder was

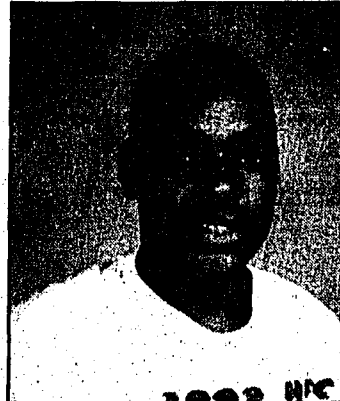

Seven members of the 1995 Santa Anna Mountaineer football team were tapped this week for All-District honors. Pictured here are those named and the honors for which they were chosen.



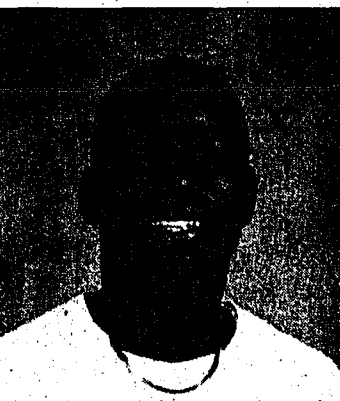

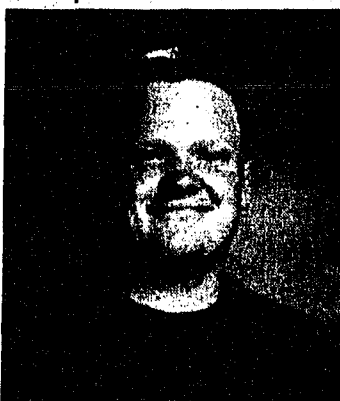

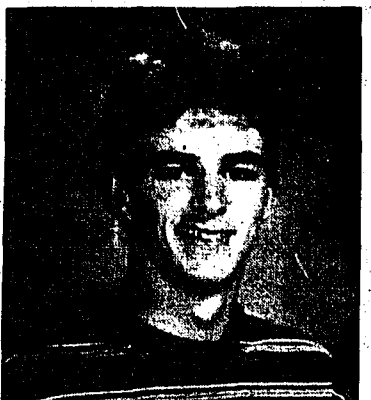

Pecan Show
The 1995 Coleman County Pecan Show will be held on Thursday, November 30. Entries for the show are due in the County Extension Office by 5 p.m. Wednesday, November 29. The Show will have three categories: Native, Commercial and Classic varieties.

To enter the pecan show, select 40-42 pecans of one variety from the 1995 pecan crop and place in a brown paper bag with your name, address and pecan variety (if you know it) written on the outside of the bag. These samples should be dropped off at the Coleman County Extension Office in Coleman along with a \$2 entry fee between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Winning articles will be displayed at Coleman County State Bank on Friday, December 1, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. The pecan show is sponsored by the Coleman County Horticulture Committee.

Private Applicators CEU Course Offered

Five hours of continuing education units will be offered to private pesticide applicators on Monday, December 4, beginning at 5:30 p.m. in the County Courthouse. This course will offer two hours in laws and regulations and one hour in integrated pest management. All pesticide license holders who have not completed their CEU credits are urged to attend as this will be the last opportunity in 1995 to obtain credits in Coleman County. All private applicator licenses issued

prior to Jan. 1, 1990 will expire on Dec. 31, 1995.

To renew a private applicators license, the applicator must acquire 15 continuing education units before those license expire. This includes two hours of laws and regulations and one hour of integrated pest management.

Everyone interested in attending is asked to pre-register by calling the county extension office by 5 p.m. Friday, December 1.

James Woodard

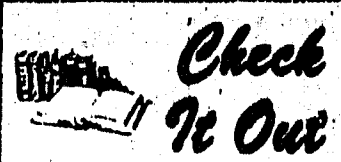
ABILENE—James V. "Dale" Woodard, 53, died Friday in a local hospital.

Time To Re-Certify For Commodities

Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. has announced that it is time to re-certify clients who participate in the TEFAP (Commodities) program. TDHS guidelines state that to receive USDA commodities, households must apply once a year in the contracted area where they live. CTO staff and volunteers will assist clients in filling out their applications at the Santa Anna Armory on Wednesday, November 29 from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The Santa Anna News apologizes for any inconvenience as a result of an announcement in last week's edition concerning the distribution of commodities this week in Santa Anna. In a telephone conversation with a party at Central Texas Opportunities office, we were told that the distribution would take place. Now, it seems, that information was incorrect.

This year, TDHS is requiring that any individual who wishes for someone else to pick up their commodities to submit proof that they are disabled. Exceptions that

may be made for elderly shut-ins. CTO will verify this information. Proof of income, copies of AFDC, Food Stamps, SSI, MAO, driver's license, utility bills, commodities re-certification are required for proof of identity, residency and income. Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. is an Equal Opportunity Provider without regard to race, color, age, sex, disability, political belief, religion or national origin.

Emmett Payne, Executive Director of CTO stated, "Although there are no commodities available for distribution for the month of November, it is our understanding that the program's continuation looks promising. We are hoping to begin getting items for distribution in December and will run news releases in area papers as soon as we know when distributions will begin again." He added, "I encourage all those interested in continuing participation in the program to get re-certified this month."
