State Representative Bob Turner (D-Voss) made a visit Monday morning to the Santa Anna News office to announce his intent to seek re-election to the Texas House of Representatives, District 73.

Turner said that since Senator Bill Sims has not announced his plans for his political future, he would not seek the Senate post but is not ruling out a possible race for the Senate in the future.

Bob Turner is currently serving his second term as State Representative for the 73rd District. He is retired from the U.S. Army and currently serves as Executive Director of the Coleman Development Corporation and raises sheep in Coleman County. He has been married for 37 years to the former Ann Holt, and they have three grown sons, Gary, Sam and Darrell.

The Miles Bulldogs were looking to end a 16-game losing streak last Friday night when the Santa Anna Mountaineers traveled to Miles for a non-district game. The last game the Bulldogs had won was in 1993 against the Mountaineers.

The Bulldogs were deceived into thinking they were going to come out victorious at halftime of the game when the score stood in their favor 19-6, but the Mountaineers rallied in the second half to keep the Bulldogs scoreless and to score 14 points for themselves putting the final score at 21-19 in the Mountaineer's favor.

Miles jumped ahead 6-0 shortly after the game began as Rusty Swain returned a punt 50 yards for a touchdown. Swain passed to Brian Fedor twice for TD's before the half.

In the second quarter Chris Lewis ran in from the two yard line and it was followed by a kick from Josh Lewis to make the score 19-6.

Ryan Keeney ran the ball in from the one-yard line with 0:03 remaining on the clock in the third quarter to bring the score to 19-13. Josh Lewis' kick was good.

During the fourth quarter Chris Lewis once again took the ball and ran it in from the 3 yard line with Josh Lewis adding the extra point to make the final score of the

evening 21-19.

Coach David Robinett recognized quarterback Tim Abernathy for his throwing and running game and defensive safety Shane Watson for his big plays of the game. Also Chris Cheaney was recognized for his 60-yard pass reception.
