Ettie Marie Windham Hubbard has been named Ex-Student of the Year for the 1995 Homecoming.

Following her graduation from Santa Anna High School in 1945, she began her first job in December of that year with F. W. Woolworth Co. in Coleman. Later she worked for Owl Drug Store, first at the fountain and later as a cosmetic saleslady. She married Doyle Hubbard in August of 1950.

For many years Ettie Marie dedicated her time to her four children and their activities in school, church, scouting.

In 1958, she was initiated into the Order of the Eastern Star and has served as an officer each year since that time. She has also served in many offices of the Grand

Chapter including Deputy Grand Matron to the Worthy Grand Matron of Texas. During her first term as Worthy Matron, Ettie Marie was instrumental in organizing Ballinger Assembly #338, Order of the Rainbow for Girls. She served several years as Mother Advisor, as the first Chairman of the Board and as Grand Visitor of the Grand Assembly of Texas Order of the Rainbow for Girls. Her territory included assemblies in Brownwood, San Angelo, Brady, Robert Lee and Ballinger. She said it was a joy working with girls from twelve to eighteen years of age.

She has been an active member of Baptist Churches in Ballinger and Bronte where she has been

active in junior age youth Bible School, Training Union and Youth Rallies.

In 1973, Ettie Marie began work in the Coke County and District Clerk's office as a Deputy Clerk. In 1982 she was appointed by the District Judge of the 51st Judicial District to fill an unexpired term. She is currently serving her fourth term as County and District clerk of Coke County.

She is an active member of First Baptist Church in Bronte; Bronte Chapter #1048, Order of the Eastern Star currently serving her fifth term as Worthy Matron; Bronte Chamber of Commerce; West Coke County Community Development of Robert Lee; Coke County Pageant Association's annual production of

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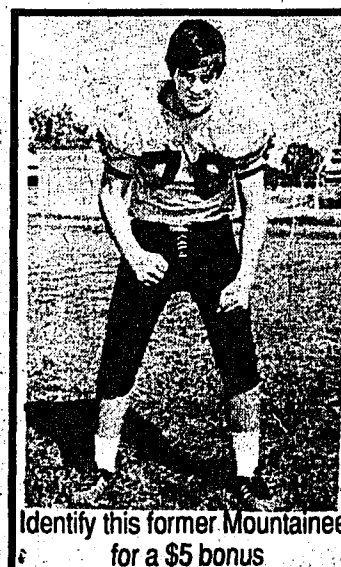

September 21, 1992, was what will probably be one of the worst days of my life, yet I was not to know that until the end of that day.

It was just a normal day. We all went to school as we always do. We went to football practice, just as we did everyday after school. Then after football practice was over, Tom, Calvin, Manuel, Timmy, Joey and I hopped into Tom's truck to go to Holt's for drinks. Timmy, Joey and I were in the back, with everyone else sitting in the front. Well, Timmy and I aren't the smartest two kids in the world (if you haven't noticed). But anyway, Timmy and I were sitting on the tool box. I decided to reach forward and touch the windshield from the toolbox. At that time I fell off of the toolbox and landed

head first onto the pavement. Since we were always playing around with each other, no one thought I was hurt. But they eventually came to look at me and noticed that my mind was somewhere else than the present time. Without hesitation, Tom and Timmy both took action. Timmy walked into the nearest house without asking and used the phone, while Tom went to David Huggin's house, which was nearby, and asked him to come see what he could do. The ambulance was called to come get me and take me to the hospital, where I was treated for a head injury. I was released the next day.

If it had not been for Timmy and Tom's heroic actions there, I could possibly have died that day. But I suppose that's what friends are for. I give my deepest respect to Tom and Timmy, for without them, I might not have been here to write this today.

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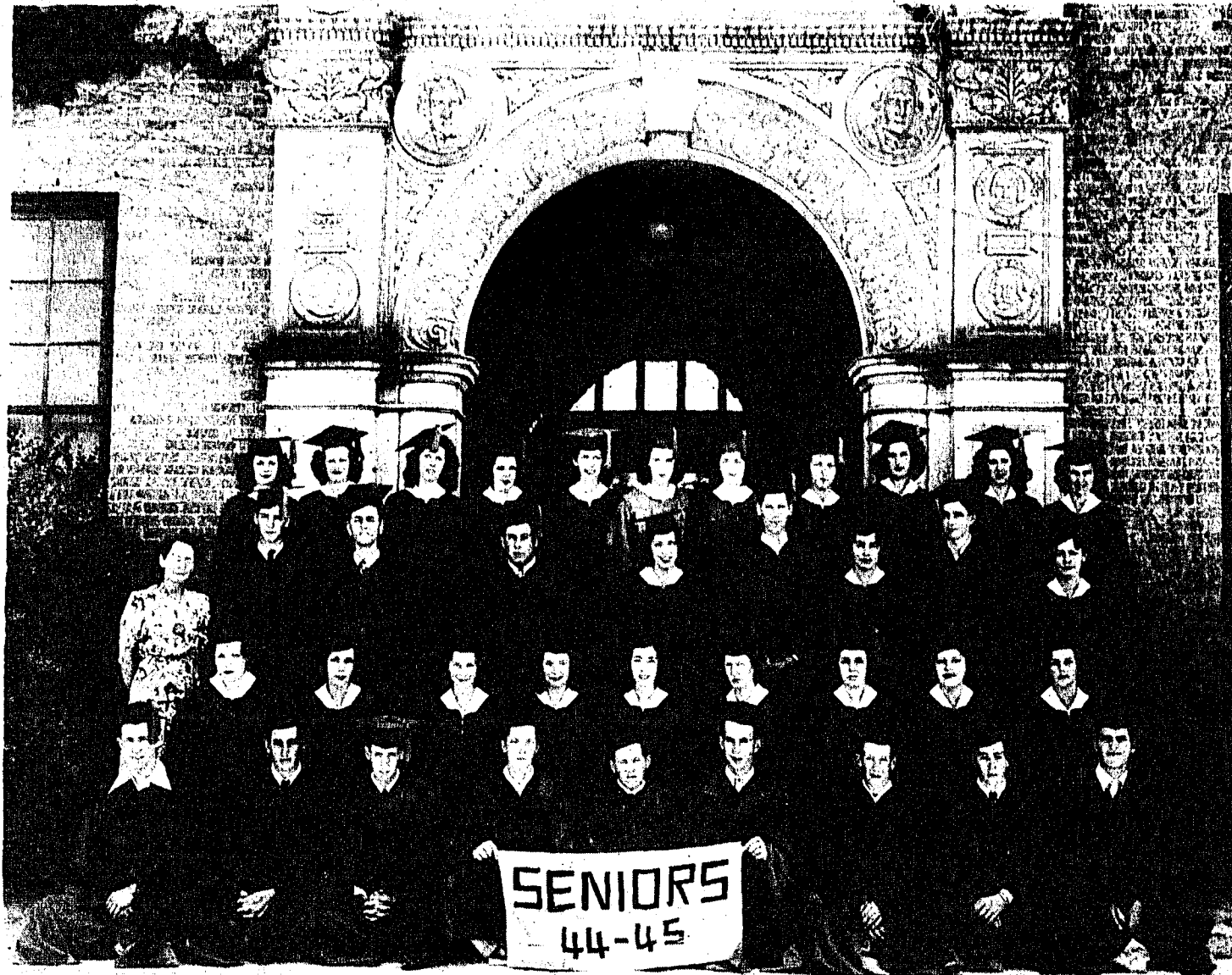

The Way We Were

Editor's Note: In 1985 the Class of 1945 met for the 40th year reunion. The following was written by Mildred Wagner Ford shortly after that meeting while reflecting on their school years. The article was first printed in the Oct. 24, 1985 issue of the Santa Anna News.

Usually on Friday morning at 9 o'clock all classes were gathered to the auditorium for Assembly. We had various types of programs. A movie star, a magician, an artist, or maybe a great sportsman may come by and speak to us. Many times one of the ministers in town would come and bring us a little sermonette and have prayer. Our ways were patterned and disciplined. Freshman sat in the southeast corner and sophomores in the southwest corner. Juniors sat behind freshman and seniors behind the sophomores. We also sat in alphabetical order in Assembly and in all our classes.

All students of SAHS were called into the auditorium by Superintendent D. D. Burns on Monday, December 8, 1941 to hear by radio the declaration of war on Japan by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. In the Southeast corner sat the wide-eyed young class of '45—Freshman of the day.

During our high school years the most drastic changes America ever witnessed took place. As Freshman we had 80 students but in a few months there were many changes in our class roll. Wartime moves by families to work in defense plants took many away to far places. Homemaking classes learned to knit and to roll bandages. Parking lots were no problem for you'd not find but two or three cars there. Tires, gasoline, sugar, shoes, etc. were rationed. In previous years it was so unusual to see an airplane that when one was heard in the distance everyone would run out in the yard to watch it. Now they were a

constant thing as men trained for war. Rockwood consolidated as we added several new members to our class as Sophomores. All sports were stopped as were any interscholastic activities. As Seniors the girls were finally allowed to wear pants but only on the very coldest days. Vacant seats in the classrooms probably meant someone has joined the Army, Navy or Marines.

Wartime causes maturity, responsibility, commitment and patriotism. In due season this class graduated and took various places of responsibility. They were so busy and so involved that class reunions were hard to come by. In 1965 we had a small group to meet, but this year for our 40th anniversary our class president, now professional motivator, Oran Lewellen began to work on this reunion. Others joined in the effort and we can report a great and wonderful reunion for the Class of 1945.

WTU Customers To See Rate Reduction On October Bills

Administrative Law Judges (ALJs) have issued an interim order allowing West Texas Utilities Company (WTU) to implement new, lower electric rates for its customers.

The issuing of the interim order comes after WTU and parties to the rate review agreed to the settlement to resolve all outstanding WTU regulatory issues.

Starting with October electric bills, a WTU residential customer taking basic service will see an approximate 7% decrease on a monthly electric bill, compared to the permanent rates in effect prior to Oct. 1, 1994, when the interim 3.25% base rate reduction was implemented. This 7% decrease is based on an average usage of 1,000 kwh.

As part of the interim order issued by the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) ALJs, WTU customers will also share in a one-time \$21 million refund, which will amount to approximately a \$50 credit on a monthly bill for residential customers taking basic service and using 1,000 kwh of energy. The refund will be spread over two months and reflected in October and November bills.

"We are pleased that the ALJ agreed, after their review of the settlement, to allow the company to place the new electric rates in effect on an interim basis until the Commission can issue a final

Fishing Lake Ivie

The weather is just beautiful at the lake but fishing conditions have remained pretty much unchanged.

The best we can say for bass fishing is its fair. You can find 'em, just have to be patient and enjoy the lake while you're looking. They are in the weed beds, flats, main lake, try spinner and crank baits over the weed beds 4-10 ft. of water. Worms are producing some catches during mid-day.

Crappie fishing is fair, using minnows in depths of 2-30 and 3-40 ft. in the main lake and river channels. Use minnows in tree tops at 30 ft. along the river channel.

Catfishing is fair to good, especially for channel and blues. Some nice fish being caught on points, flats and main lake areas. Yellow catfishing is fair with trotliners using live bait having the most luck.

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order," said Glenn Files, WTU chief executive officer and president.

"WTU entered the rate case with residential electric rates that ranked on average the fourth lowest of any investor-owned utility in Texas and because of the settlement our customers will enjoy rates that are even more competitive than before," Files added.

Prior to the rate case, WTU's commercial and industrial prices averaged 10% to 20% lower than the regional average.

"With even lower rates being implemented for commercial and industrial customers resulting from this settlement, we believe our communities will be in a better position than ever before to help West Texas grow and prosper," Files added.

The settlement resolves the current proceeding involving deferred accounting treatment of the Olkkaunton power plant; the current rate case; and the pending appeal of WTU's 1987 rate case; and issues relating to a fuel reconciliation, which involves a review of WTU's eligible fuel costs and how those charges are recovered in customer bills.

Specifically, the settlement results in an annual \$13.5 million retail base rate reduction, which includes \$5.9 million in reduced rates that took effect on Oct. 1, 1994, and an additional 2% reduction in rates due to a reduction in fuel factors.

The settlement also calls for a three-year freeze on base rates.

WTU serves more than 180,000 customers in a 53,000 square mile area in 52 West Texas counties.

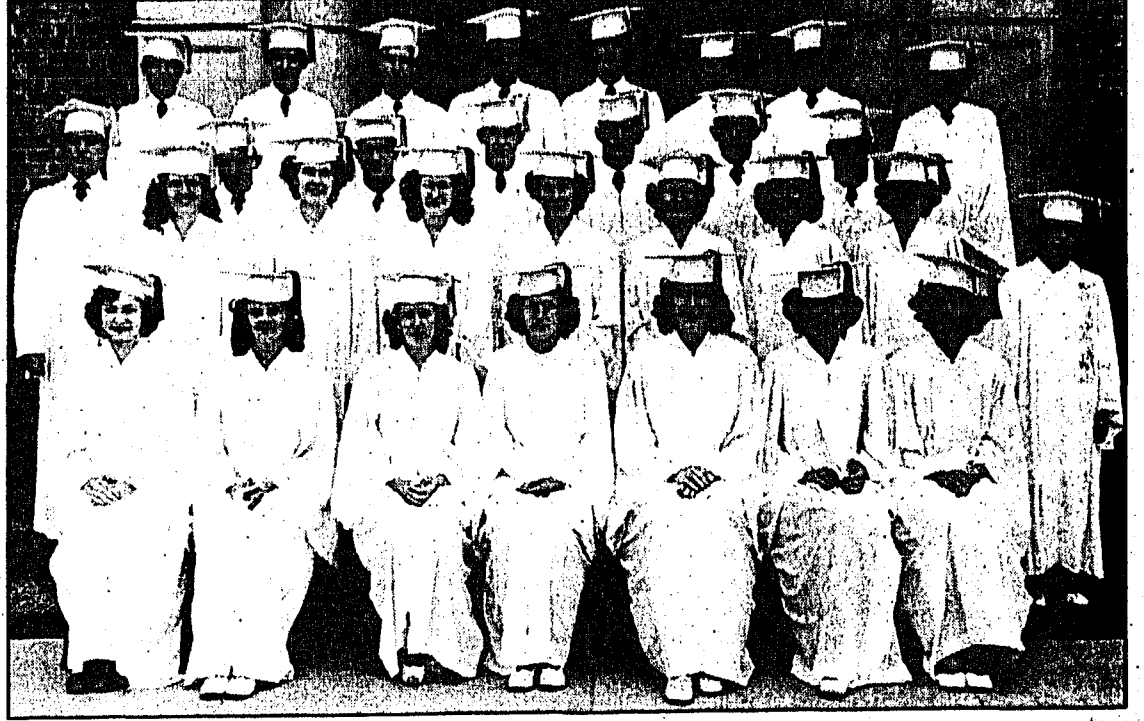

This application is filed in accordance with Sections 2.251, 2.252(a), and 2.255(a)-(c) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA) and the PUCT Substantive Rule (PUCT SUB R.) 23.31(c)(1).

Television may help increase children's vocabularies and supply them with facts, it seems to have a dampening effect on creativity. Why? The passive nature of television viewing is the important factor, especially if television becomes a substitute for socializing with other children or adults. Get the child involved in the real world, interacting with real people and real places—and most important, in doing. Some alarming statistics:

*The average American child devotes more time to TV before entering first grade than she spends in school during the first six grades.

*By the time a student is 18, she will have spent nearly two years in front of a television.

Families can engage in a variety of real activities in their home. There's lots to share, work and also play. Later, as winter approaches and children spend more time indoors—television is a powerful rival to reading. To get the most and the best out of time so spent, have each member of the family suggest programs for viewing. Open a discussion about which programs to watch, watch them together, and later discuss what was seen and enjoyed, planning, looking and discussing together improve attention and understanding.

Carrier Alert Program A Proven Lifesaver

It happens on almost any given day, somewhere in the United States. A Postal Service letter carrier saves the life of a customer. It goes far beyond the call of duty, but for rural and city letter carriers it's all part of a tradition of service that began more than 200 years ago.

Perhaps more than any other provider of service to the public, letter carriers play a familiar role in the daily lives of their customers. For many, particularly the elderly, the letter carrier can be a source of comfort, someone who'll watch over them while delivering the daily mail. Over the years, in communities throughout the country, rural, city and highway contract letter carriers have prevented countless tragedies by responding to situations that arise on their routes, such as fires or medical emergencies.

In recognition of the unique relationship between letter carriers and their customers, the Postal Service formalized the Carrier Alert program.

Under Carrier Alert, letter carriers watch for an accumulation of mail in the mailboxes of elderly and disabled customers. Unretrieved mail is recognized as a warning sign that something may be wrong. If the letter carrier suspects that a customer is in danger, Carrier Alert puts a response system in place so proper authorities can be notified to check on the individual's well-being and a family member or friend can be informed.

Private Applicator Training And Testing To Be Held Monday

A private applicator training and testing will be held on Monday, October 9, beginning at 5 p.m. in the Coleman Junior High School Cafeteria. The training will last approximately four hours with the test administered by TDA immediately following the training. By passing the test and mailing \$50 to the Texas Department of Agriculture, a producer can obtain a private applicator license good for five years enabling them to purchase restricted use and state limited use pesticides for agricultural production.

For those producers who have a certificate issued prior to Jan. 10, 1990 that will expire on Dec. 31, 1995, TDA will allow on a one time basis for you to retake and receive a new license. Once the new license is issued, 15 hours of continuing education credits will be required over the next five year period to renew that license.
