

Stenholm Accepting **Applications** To Service **Academies**

WASHINGTON, D. C .-- Congressman Charles Stenholm is currently accepting applications for young men and women in the 17th Congressional District who are interested in attending one of the nation's service academies.

This December Congressman Stenholm will have the opportunity to nominate area citizens for appointments to the four U.S. academies: the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Co.; the Military Academy in West Point, NY; the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md; and the Merchant Marine Academy in Kings Point,

Persons interested in the possible nominations should contact the Congressman's San Angelo office as soon as possible. The deadline for completed application files is Dec. 1, 1995.

To be eligible for an appointment, the applicant must meet certain requirements. The requirements are: American citizenship, good SAT or ACT scores; outstanding high school record; and good physical condition, including excellent eyesight. There is a very limited number of waivers for non-pilot candidates whose eyesight is less than 20/20.

Aside from academic achievement Rockwood Baptist emphasis is also placed on character, church and community involvement, extracurricular activities and/or part-time employment. Applicants must be single with no dependents and at least if years! of age, but not past their 22nd birthday, upon admission into the academy on July

> Be Anxious For Nothing Philippians 4:6

These four words, taken by themselves, seem impossible to achieve in our complex, troubled world. The word Paul used for anxious means a distracting care to be troubled about, drawn in opposite directions, a fretting, worrying frame of mind."
When Paul expressed his desire to see the Corinthians "without care," he did not mean that they need not be careful about life and living but that they should live above the fretting, mistrusting attitude of mind. William S. Gilbert, poet of the nineteenth century. gave us this questionable advise:

> When your lying awake with a dismal headache, And repose is taboo'd by anxiety, I conceive you may use any language you choose To indulge in, without impropriety.

But for the child of God, the secret of a tranquil heart lies in Paul's advise. By prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, we need to make our requests known to

In Much Ado About Nothing, Shakespeare informs us: "What though care killed the cat, thou hast mettle enough in three to kill care." But we do not have mettle of our own to kill worry and disquietness within. Our victory is in the promise: "You will keep him in perfect peace, Whose mind is stayed on You" (Is. 26:3).

Nothing can be guided by troubled care, resulting in a downcast countenance and a joyless spirit. Why sink by the struggles we have, when by faith we can be more than conquerors over all that is alien to the calm and restful heart of Him who is our peace?

> Grant us Thy peace throughout our earthly life. Our balm in sorrow, and our stay in strile; Then when They voice shall bid our conflict cease. Call us, O Lord, to Thine eternal peace.

State Representative Bob Turner had this to say about the hearing, "I am surprised that the Feds are holding this hearing in Austin, when their plans to reintroduce wolves. involve the Big Bend area. Last

time I checked, Austin was a long way from Alpine and a long way from the people who will have to live with the USFWS's decision. I have followed the federal government's wolf reintroduction efforts in other parts of the country. It appears to me to be nothing more than a way for someone to justify their job or get a research grant. In this day of increased demands for our monetary resources I cannot begin to understand the logic behind spending money we don't have on wolves we don't want that are not endangered in the first place. In may mind, this is just further proof that the federal endangered species program has its priorities completed





Pursuant to Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT or Commission) Procedural Rule 22.52(a)(1), notice is hereby given that West Texas Utilities Company (WTU) has filed an application for a Certificate of Convenience and Necessity (CCN) with the PUCT to construct 2.84 miles of 138-Kilovolt (kV) transmission line and an associated substation south and east of the city limits of Coleman, Texas in Coleman County, Texas.

This application is filed in accordance with Sections 2.251. 2.252(a), and 2.255(a)-(c) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA) and the PUCT Substantive Rule (PUCT SUB R.) 23.31(c)(1).

The proposed transmission line will provide service to a new substation which will increase the capacity of the interconnection between WTU and the City of Coleman and provide for a new delivery point for Coleman County Electric Cooperative. The proposed line is situated south and east of the city limits of Coleman, Texas in a rural area of Coloman County, Texas. The proposed line will join WTU's existing Ballinger to Santa Anna 138-kV transmission line at approximately 300 to 700 feet west of County Road 114 and 1100 feet north of the intersection of County Road 114 and the Santa Fe Railroad (approximately 3 miles south and east of the City of Coleman, Texas). The line will then extend north on the west side of County Road 114 for a distance of approximately 9,200 feet to the intersection with County Road 196. The line will turn to the northeast, cross County Road 196 and continue for a distance of approximately 1,700 feet. The line then will turn to the northwest and follow an existing fence line for approximately 3,400 feet to a point where it will turn back to the north for approximately 300 feet to FM568. The line will continue across FM568 for approximately 400 feet to a new substation located approximately 400 feet east of the Coleman Cemetery.

The estimated cost of the project is \$ 1,581,000.
