#### Senator Gramm Sends Appreciation To VFD

Jill Knebel of U.S. Senator Phil Gramm's Dallas office was in Santa Anna last Thursday to present the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department a plaque of appreciation during National Fire Prevention Week. Ms. Knebel is shown in the picture above, third from left, presenting the plaque to Fire Chief Donald Strickland. Other members of the fire department shown are Edith and Freddie Dodson, Clint Day, Assistant Fire Chief Lee Ray Huggins and Syble Huggins representing the Fire Department Auxiliary. In his message sent to the local firefighters, Senator Gramm said, "Your many endeavors devoted to the mission of protecting the citizens of Coleman County during catastrophic conditions are unquestionably noble. Your courage and dedication renews my belief that the list of America's real heros includes men and women, like yourselves, who always respond to the sound of the alarm. Equally as honorable are the efforts of America's firefighters to educate our citizens of the importance of stopping fires before they ever start. I have no doubt the Fire Department's Fire Prevention Program spares numerous lives and averts the destruction of an incalculable amount of property each year." Senator Gramm said he deeply appreciates and respects the Fire Department's commitment to make Santa Anna a safer place to love, work, and raise a family. He said, "May God bless and keep you as you serve the people of this community." The VFD hopes to display the plaque in a prominent place down town so that all may be able to see it but a site had not as yet been selected.

### **Early Voting Underway On Amendments**

With early voting beginning on Wednesday in the November election, the following 14 proposed state constitutional amendments will be on the ballot for the November election:

Proposition 1: To allow the Texas Higher Education Board to issue up to \$300 million in bonds to finance more student loans.

Proposition 2: To authorize lawmakers to exempt Masonic lodges and some other state charitable organizations from property taxes.

Proposition 3: To allow use of existing bond authority of the Texas farm and ranch finance program to include assistance for expansion, development and diversification of production, processing, marketing and export of Texas agricultural products.

Proposition 4: To allow Texas homeowners to refinance their homes to pay off as Internal Revenue Service lien, or in the case of divorce to buy out the other spouse's equity in the home.

Proposition 5: To permit the Texas Land Board to issue another \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance low-interest loans for Texas veterans.

Proposition 6: To extend the over-65, senior citizen homestead property tax exemption to the surviving spouse of an elderly person.

Proposition 7: To eliminate \$250 million in general obligation bonds set aside for the now-defunct superconducting super collider project.

Proposition 8: To allow resident of Mills, Reagan and Roberts counties to abolish the office of constable.

Proposition 9: To allow investment of money from the Texas Growth Fund in a business without the business's disclosure of investments in South Atrica or Namioia. Proposition 10: To abolish the state treasurer's office and merge it into the comptroller's office.

Proposition 11: To permit open-space land used for wildlife management to be treated like agricultural land in property taxes.

Proposition 12: To allow lawmakers to exempt from property taxes personal property and mineral interests when the total that comes in doesn't cover the costs of collecting the levy.

Proposition 13: To give local governments the option to exempt shrimp and fishing boats from property taxes.

Proposition 14: To increase the property tax exemption from disabled veterans in Texas.

#### GuthrieGraduates **Border Patrol** Training Academy

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Santa Anna native, Montie L. Guthrie, IV has graduated from the Border Patrol Training Academy in Artesia, New Mexico, after undergoing an 18week course to become a Border Patrol agent. Guthrie, 25, began the rigorous course last May and has been assigned duty in the Laredo, Texas sector.

Guthrie is a 1987 graduate of Santa Anna High School and a 1992 graduate with a BS degree from Tarleton State University in Stephenville. He is the son of Montie and Sandra Guthrie of Santa

Guthrie's training at the Border Patrol Academy included intensive training in Spanish, immigration law, weapons, tactics and driving rough terrain vehicles.

The U. S. Border Patrol is a branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS). The Border Patrol's primary responsibilities are to interdict and apprehend illegal migrants and narcotics coming into the U.S. The service has jurisdiction throughout the country but operates primarily along the borders between U.S. ports of entry with Canada and Mexico.



Surface temperature is cooling, at about 70 degrees now and fish are getting a lot more active.

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




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### "Help Your Six Year **Old Succeed In School"**

At about 6 years old a child starts important of life-time skills, this is the time for a child to get his very own library card. What a boost for the ego! Your very own library card says you're almost

On your next trip to the library make the event "ceremonious" (SIX will love this). You can unobtrusively monitor his selections, but he should take the lead. He will enjoy the ritual of checking out. He won't remember the return date, but even adults forget sometimes!

Remember, Grade 1 is one of the first steps out of the home toward him taking responsibility for his own life. As he pushes outward, it won't hurt to give gentle nudges in good directions.

Books are great pastime and mind expanders as evenings get longer and we move into fall. Since he is now involved in "real work" as he calls it, this is a good time for him to start a quiet time after the evening meal for homework. He will not have much real homework yet, but he will be brining home his papers and possibly some supplementary readers or an addition sheet. These will let you check on his progress, his strengths, his weaknesses. This quiet time (not a long time, though) for extra practice is a positive beginning for structuring SIX's day. He will need this structure later when there will be real homework responsibilities. SIX will be happy to have your full attention for a bit and to "do work" like older siblings. Most of all, he

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
