was not fenced. We had seen a water buffalo grazing between the cabins the day we ate our lunch and yesterday we we arrived. We really didn't want to run into a water buf

As we got outside, the fog he could see clouds like banks of fog pouring over the edge of the crater to the valiey below. It was just before sunrise and the view in all directions was beautiful. The rivers waited a few minutes until he sun rose before proceeding. The rays of the sun added an extra di-
mension to the beautiful scene by plashing pinks and oranges over he white clouds. Then it was time to head down to the crater. We headed west to catch the one way oad down into the crater and in the
vening, we would take the one evening, we would take the one
way up from the crater half mile east of the lodge. We encountered a little fog along he edge of the ridge but as soon as ne staried descending, we came out
nto the clear. From down in the crater, there seemed to be a fairly heavy cloud cover but no fog. watched them stalk the herds of wildebeest and zebras. It was com
wita pletely different feeling than when we watched leopards, lions and heetahs. It seemed more ghoulish. We only saw a few rhinos and
elephants and these were at a much greater distance than our other greater distance han our other
sightings. The herds of wildebeest and zebras were as close as any we had encountered. Both of the herds were large, but many fewer animals than our Serengeti herds.
