Happy Camper Goes Home With Heart Full Of Peace

"This is one of the happiest days I ever lived and now I can close that sad part of my life". That is what Loranzo Franklin told "Mr. O.D." when he arrived back at camp after an excursion with some special friends and this editor on a hot Saturday afternoon.

The camp we're speaking of is the recent George Havens Cowboy Camp Meeting held between Santa Anna and Coleman each summer. "Mr. O.D." is what the campers called the range cook, Derriel Warnock of Santa Anna. Loranzo Franklin is one of the most faithful among those who regularly attend the camp meeting each year.

Franklin hails from Holdenville, Oklahoma and has missed only a couple of years since he first started attending the camp meeting in about the fourth year of its 30-year existence.

At that time he was living in Stamford, Texas and attended the camp meeting with his parents and other members of the family. Franklin loved to visit around the chuckwagon at the camp and the 80-year-old man shared that it brought out a warm feeling of how he had always imagined cowboy life mig! ave been. Loranzo has an endearing smile and a happy gleam in his eye, both of which were very much apparent when he told "Mr. O.D." that his 79-year-old father was saved at a camp meeting service not too long before his death.

His has been a life that would have seemed unpleasant much of the time for someone with less faith. But Loranzo's faith and association with his many Christian friends and family members have sustained him through the hard times. Growing up in a migrant farm worker family during the Great Depression, Franklin received very little formal schooling. Later he joined the Army during WWII and was a member of the horse cavalry. With his love of the cowboy way of life, he was pleased with his assignment of caring for the horses. But an accident with a horse left him unable to do much menial work and he left the Army with an honorable medical discharge. His work experiences have mostly been that of a handyman.

And a much loved, much respected handy man is how Lucy Havens and other campers see this longtime friend. Franklin arrives each year several days before the camp meeting services are to begin, ready to do any chores that are asked of him. The late George Havens, founder of the camp meeting, called him the "Wagon Master" because of his love for the old wagons that he helps bring out from storage each year to dot the camp grounds and lend an air of nostalgia to the events taking place there. In earlier years he took care of repairs to the wagons and assisted with some building when the log cabin Pioneer Preachers Museum and the

camp's main building were being put in place. Loranzo has always deemed it his special privilege to raise and lower the American flag each day during his stay there.

A self taught artist, Franklin enjoys showing people some of his works of art that can be seen around the camp. Through the years he has illustrated a camp cookbook and done drawings for camp publicity releases. Back home at Holdenville, along with his wall paintings he has contributed his talents to brightening up exterior walls of buildings around town with large murals. He says he is also the person people call on when they want an original idea for the design of a parade float.

Franklin's exciting excursion that Saturday afternoon was brought about as the result of a conversation with Mr. O.D. He had told the cook that when he was a youngster, his large family was traveling in a old Model T Ford truck working their way back to Stamford from another part of the state. His baby brother had taken ill and as they came through Santa Anna they stopped at the hospital to get help for him. In spite of the care given him there,

the little fellow died. The family, with no finances available went about having the baby buried here, or so Loranzo remembered. His mother and father built a coffin out of a wooden box they had on the truck and lovingly wrapped the baby in a quilt for burial. The father

carved a grave marker from a piece of sandstone.

Loranzo told Mr. O.D. that through the years he and a sister now living in Abilene had tried to

find the grave in the Santa Anna Cemetery but had not been able to locate it. He had a deep wish to find it while he was still able.

and the local volunteers stayed until 2:30 p.m. fighting the blaze. They returned to Santa Anna believing the fire was under control but were called out again at 4:30 p.m. The Coleman Fire Department was called in to assist with the containment of the fire which spread to the Hank Wise Ranch and burned about 200 acres. With the help of the Coleman Fire Department and individuals with dozers the Santa Anna Fire Department spent the night controlling the blaze.

All county fire departments remind everyone to be extremely cautious during this time of extreme heat and humidity. They continue asking if you do not have to burn anything, please do not do so. If it is absolutely essential, do so in the early morning or late evening when the humidity is up. Otherwise, please do not burn.

Back at home that night Mr. O.D. and this editor wife resolved to help our new friend with his quest. Before inquiring at the courthouse, we happened to think to look in the book of cemetery inscriptions published by the county historical society. We could find nothing in the Santa Anna Cemetery, not even in the listing of persons known from other records to have been buried there and for whom no marker exists. That Friday night as we tried to decide what steps to take, Mr. O.D. remembered that even though **CONTINUED PAGE 5**


Rosary was said at 7 p.m. Monday, July 8, 1996 at Davis-Morris Funeral Home.

James McSwain Named 1996 **Texas Principal** Of The Year

Editor's Note: The following is a reprint of an article which appeared in the June 14 issue of the Texarkana Gazette,

Texas High Principal Dr. James McSwain has been named 1996 Texas Principal of the Year and is eligible for national Principal of the Year competition.

"Every once in a while an educator comes along who is truly gifts in inspiring students and teachers to reach for excellence. Such an educator is James McSwain," said Superintendent Gary Collins in a letter to the awards committee. "Each year he 'adopts' one or two students who are in danger of 'falling through the cracks' and assigns himself as their mentor ... "

The award is given each year by the Texas Association of Secondary School Principals, from nominees selected by the 20 TASSP regions. Each region nominates its top choice for high school principal, high school assistant principal, junior high principal and junior high assistant principal, and McSwain was selected as 1996 Secondary Principal of the Year by the Region VIII Service Center in Mount Pleasant.

Dr. McSwain said he believes in always treating people with respect and making educational decisions with the best interests of the students foremost in his mind.

"The most critical attribute to my success in collaboration is a genuine love for the people I work with and the students I encounter-even when some of them do not want to be loved and may not always be very loveable," he wrote in his TASSP nomination form. Dr. McSwain has worked as



was buried in Santa Anna, he spoke of a river or creek somewhere in the area where they made camp and prepared for the burial. This led us to look in the book at smaller rural community cemeteries. And there it was, in the Whon Cemetery, listed in unmarked graves known to be recorded for that cemetery. Jimmie Lee - Oct. 13, 1932 - son of J.L. and Maggie (Ray) Franklin. The hand carved sandstone marker was apparently long gone. When we arrived at camp that

Saturday morning for Mr. O.D. to cook breakfast, we could hardly wait to give Loranzo the news, knowing how pleased he would be. And he was. Two of his old and dear friends, Tommy and Cleo Justus of Dallas were visiting with him when I gave him the news. The three of us began making plans to take him to the cemetery after breakfast. We had to leave Mr. O.D. behind at camp as he was committed to prepare a large

There were several graves in the small cemetery marked by flat stones with no inscriptions. We visited beside each unmarked grave but when we stopped at the one farthermost in the back of the cemetery, Loranzo was completely at peace with the feeling that this was were the baby Jimmie Lee was laid to rest. From a rock pile at the back of the cemetery he found a larger stone to place at the grave. We took some pictures while he reminisced. Arriving back at camp he headed straight to Mr. O.D. to tell him what we had found. Mrs. Lucy (Havens) also had to be told right away.

That day Loranzo began to carve another grave marker with a small lamb on it. In a day or so the stone broke. After his sister arrived from Abilene and was told the story, she and her husband, (Tom and Jeanie McClelland) along with Loranzo paid a visit to the office of Santa Anna News. They indicated they would like one day to place a permanent marker at the small grave.

Loranzo went home to Holdenville with even more peace in his heart knowing he had found little Jimmie Lee's earthly resting place.

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

Even though we spent a scant eight hours in the crater, it was as if we had a complete safari in just one day. We saw almost every animal we had previously seen. Some were not as close but some were even closer. Since Jeanie is an elephant and cat person, we spent much of the day looking for elephants, lions and cheetahs. One of the most startling sight we saw was a large pack of hyenas looking like they were tired of waiting for a lion kill to clean up after and were out looking for a sick or injured animal to kill on their own. Hyenas, possibly because of their ugliness, gave us an eerie feeling as we watched them stalk the herds of wildebeest and zebras. It was completely different feeling than when jackals and vultures. The chief and many of the ranking men elders were away from the village attending a political meeting, leaving one of the chief's sons in charge. 
